REVIEW: Cinderella

After another hugely enjoyable pantomime, it is appropriate for the Bugle to say thank you to everyone involved - from the writer and producer. musical director, choreographer and electricians to the smallest member of the cast. From the costume makers. scene-painters, coach builders and prop makers to the ticket-sellers, scene shifters, dressers and ice cream sellers to the getters-out and putters-back of the raised flooring and chairs and the people who swept up after every performance.

Not all of these are Youlgrave people, but they all help to bring in visitors to join us villagers in letting their hair down in a traditional and (for the older ones) somewhat nostalgic fashion.

In such a team effort it is invidious to pick out particular individuals - but let's be invidious. The costumes were

marvellous, as usual. The talented principal girl and boy clearly have grease-paint in their blood. Our own Mick Partridge probably has it all over the place and Jeremy Bacon's more feminine side was a revelation. Ted Shimwell is everyone's favourite granddad and forgot his lines with as much aplomb as Mick Partridge, Ralph Wilson and others supplied them. Nick Stacey's flute (and, this year, other instruments) made a welcome addition to the texture of the music.

But it's the overall effort and the teamwork that impresses. Not many villages of our size have two annual events that bring in coach-loads of people. And perhaps two is enough. But nobody can say that we are a snooty lot who keep themselves to themselves. And it was nice to see some new, young faces on the stage.

In July 2008 it will be nine years since Youlgrave last had a Carnival. Being one of the four committee members who organised the last carnival, it is brilliant news that we may, once again, have a Carnival in the village.

I think it is disappointing that in a village the size of Youlgrave we could not attract any more committee members, so the four people left

(myself, Sylvia Birds, Annie Hodkinson and Caroline Atkin) had to call it a day and the last carnival was in 1999.

Youlgrave Carnival was originally started in 1932 by Youlgrave Bowls Club, and in 1982 Youlgrave Community Group over. The took tradition of the carnival

as been a monumental day in the year. Living in Youlgrave all my life, it was THE day of the year. The village would be lined with crowds, the local pubs would be bursting at the seams, everyone would dress up, local businesses and organisations would decorate a float. There would be stalls on the playing fields selling everything and anything. The sun would normally come out for us too! There would be marching bands, carnival queens, princesses and rose queens, who would travel from miles around. The week before the carnival day, there would be activities, like the wheel

barrow race, pillow fight, six-a-side football, rounders, quizzes, kids sports, etc. etc.

The finale of the whole day would be the marquee on the playing field, with a spit roast or barbecue and local bands playing to the crowds.

I'm sure if you were to ask most older people in the village they would tell you a few stories of past carnivals way before my time.

One reason behind this fabulous day

was for the locals to get together and have some fun, but the main reason was to raise some money for local charities and bring some much thoughts and get involved. All needed revenue to the village!

> Hopefully if Carnival happens again. it would be brilliant if local businesses and organisations could all get together and help,

then everybody can benefit.

If we could get a representative from each local business or organisation and share the work, the carnival could, once again, be a day in the life of Youlgrave to be proud of.

Rare opportunity to hear Brahms sung in English

The Brahms German Requiem is normally sung in German. It is therefore an opportunity not to be missed to hear this wonderful work performed so accessibly in English – and virtually on our doorsteps – by Bakewell Choral Society at Lady Manners School, Bakewell on **Saturday 5 April**.

The completed German Requiem, first performed in 1869, was written by Brahms in memory of his mother who had died in 1865. Brahms choice of texts from the Holy Scriptures does not follow the orthodox requiem mass but celebrates the triumph of the human spirit over death and

demonstrates that he was more philosopher than theologian.

The choir will be joined by two soloists: Elise Dye (soprano) and Oliver Dunn (baritone). Elise, a graduate of the University of Montana, USA, is currently studying for a MMus at the Royal Northern College of Music. Elise has a wide repertoire, having toured the States performing jazz, and has appeared in light opera and recently received particularly positive reviews for her performance of Poulenc's Gloria.

Oliver, also studying as a post graduate at RNCM, has performed

extensively across Britain in works ranging from Handel's Messiah to the Lion King. In March last year, he sang the part of Jesus in the Choral Society's performance of Bach's St Matthew Passion. Both soloists appear by kind permission of the Royal Northern.

In addition to accompanying the

choir, the two distinguished pianists. Gillian Bithel and Beate Toyka, will play Rachmaninov's Suite for two pianos. Graduates of the Royal Academy of Music in London and currently members of the Derby Piano Quartet, they both

divide their time between performing and teaching.

This marvellous musical feast, starting at 7.30pm, will be completed by a selection of motets by Bruckner which will include his setting of Ave Maria.

Tickets for this event cost £10 (students and children go free) and they are on sale at Bakewell Bookshop, from choir members and will be available on the door. Free transport from the centre of Bakewell and some of the villages can be obtained by contacting Vern Johnson 01629 584941.

Employment - higher minimum wage and more holidays!

From 1 October 2007 the new amounts are:

National Minimum Wage

Aged 22+ £5.52 per hour; Aged 18-21 £4.60 per hour; Aged 16-17 £3.40 per hour

Paid Holiday: 4.8 weeks per year. That's 24 days per year if you work 5 days per week (this *includes* 8 Bank Holidays). If you work less than 5 days per week the amount is pro rata

Check your employment contract - it may give you better than this - but remember it can't give you less. You are entitled to receive holiday pay at a normal weekly rate but not including overtime or commission. The Citizens Advice Bureau is able to advise on a large range of employment issues.
