Last call for Alport public telephone box?

BT has announced plans to remove the red public phone box at the foot of Alport Hill, one of only two public payphones left in the parish.

Describing it as a measure to "realign payphone provision to meet consumer demand", BT points out that calls from payphones have more than halved in the last three years and that 60% of them no longer cover their costs. The payphone at Alport is one of 16 in the Derbyshire Dales that are earmarked for closure.

However, Youlgrave Parish Council, Harthill Parish Meeting Chairman Peter Pimm and District Councillor Andrew McCloy have all signalled their opposition to the proposal, saying that despite the increased ownership of mobile phones the public phone box is still useful for the large numbers of visitors to and through Alport. They also claim that its allegedly low level of use is partly due to BT making it a card-only phone, when a cash phone would almost certainly result in more calls.

Under Ofcom directions, BT is obliged to consult the local community for its views when a phone box is to be removed. To make yours known contact the Parish Council, Parish

Meeting or District Councillor. Alternatively, write to BT Payphones, PP 05A23, Delta Point, Wellesley Road, Croydon, CR9 2YZ or email btp.authorisation.team@bt.com, identifying the phone box as 1PCO, Alport, Bakewell DE45 1LG. Consultation ends on 6 September.

A few years ago the traditional red telephone box at the bottom of Stoneyside was permanently removed, leaving just the one remaining box at the top of Holywell Lane in Youlgrave.

We are exploring the possibility of collectively buying the following to negotiate a good discount:


- **loft insulation** (should be 10 1/2in thick and can reduce your heating bill by a third, average cost of £200, free for over 70s, grants available)
- **ground source heat pumps** taking heat from the ground to heat your home. For every unit of electricity used to pump the heat, 3-4 units of heat are produced. Can heat your home to a maximum of 60 degrees. Average cost £8.000-12.000.
- solar panels to heat your hot water. Average cost £3,000-5,000.
- **biomass boilers**, self-loading boilers using wood chip or pellets. Average cost £5,000-14,000.

These renewable energy installations are not cheap, but will knock hundreds of pounds off your fuel bills. With fuel bills soaring the payback time is getting shorter. Grants are available.



Awards for Youlgrave D of E youngsters

On 26 June, nine young people from Youlgrave's Duke of Edinburgh Award Unit were presented with awards at a County presentation ceremony in Matlock.

Five of these were the first from the group to complete the Silver award, with the other four gaining their Bronze. These young people had to undertake three activities under each of the following headings: skill, physical pursuits and service. They chose a variety of activities from climbing, dancing and football, video-making, Youth Theatre and cookery, to helping with Youlgrave Music Festival, Brownies and at Youlgrave School.

The Bronze group have learnt navigation skills and camp craft, which led to two expeditions taking place. They had to walk 15 miles over two days, carrying all their own equipment and were totally self sufficient. At the

Middleton by Youlgrave wind turbine approved

News that the area's first wind turbine has been approved by the Peak District National Park has been welcomed by Sustainable Youlgrave.

At a meeting last month, the Authority's planning committee granted permission for a 20 kW Gazelle machine at Mount Pleasant farm in Middleton by Youlgrave.

The turbine will be about 60 feet high and will stand near the existing buildings. It will provide about 80% of the energy used by the estate and is part of the estate's wider renewable energy and energy-saving package. This also includes insulation, an air heat pump, sustainable woodland management for wood fuel, as well as home-grown food.

The application was supported by the Friends of the Peak District and Sustainable Youlgrave. There was only one local objector. During the planning meeting, a committee member said the proposed turbine was "gracefully designed and sensitively sited". Similar sentiments were echoed by several committee members.

However, the application was initially recommended for refusal by planning officers. Sustainable Youlgrave pointed out that the officer's report failed to adequately recognise the benefits of the wind turbine, including an omission of the global green policies that have been adopted nationally. The group said that the report heavily exaggerated the visual impact and visibility, contrary to the officers' own landscape architect's report, which wasn't explained at the meeting.

After a site visit earlier in the day and

debate at the meeting, the officer's recommendation of refusal was rejected by planning committee members who instead approved it, 9 votes to 3.

John Youatt, Chair of Sustainable Youlgrave and a retired planner of many years experience, said that it was time that such machines were recognised more widely as objects of grace and desire, not treated as eyesores. "A broad cross-section of the UK public accepts well-designed wind turbines in their own right," he claimed. "The particular proposal was well conceived, an excellent example of the mixture of energy efficiency and new carbon-free energy that almost everyone advocates."

He also said that further sites will be discussed as part of Sustainable Youlgrave's proposed communityowned green energy company's ambitions.

Reminiscences of Midsummer Day

This account of Midsummer Day celebrations in the village was written by the late **Lily Wragg**. Thank you to John Marple for supplying it.

Midsummer Day – what magic in these words, as we look back almost 70 years!

Only those who have been born and bred in this village can fully realise the meaning o f Midsummer Day in Youlgrave. So much to do and see: tap dressing, band playing, club walking and the final attraction cricket field and the Hurdy Gurdies!

A whole year bound up in a day - Midsummer Day. What eager hands and feet rushing about for moss and flowers, climbing the hillside, knocking at the doors. "Please, have you got any red daisies?" "Please have you got any pinks?" And so on.

And how we asked each other: "Which tap are you helping?" The one, of course, your father helped to dress. And the taps! Top Tap, Bank Tap, Frank Evans Tap, The Cross Tap and the Bottom Tap. What a thrill when we were allowed to stick in the Indian corn on the border!

So to bed the previous night, tired out but with dreams of a marvellous day on the morrow – Midsummer Day – confident 'Our Tap' would get the first prize.

The day arrived. What a busy morning. Second best clothes to get out, shoes out of their boxes from under the bed and the little drawer in the bedroom unlocked, from which a tissue paper parcel was taken – 'The Club Sash'. How we gathered round to look at the lovely green sash worn by members of the Foresters Club, and after many instructions, not to mess our clothes (they were our second best), not to climb walls, etc, we went to see the Club Walk.

What a thrill! The Changing of the Guard at Buckingham Palace could have given no bigger thrill. The band in their uniforms, the lovely banner of the Foresters Club, then the men in their bright green sashes, with their little fingers clasped as they walked in twos. There was one special figure in the procession, my father in that lovely green sash mustn't miss him! Service in Church followed the procession and dinner in the huge tent. What a dinner! How they sang its praises. To us children it was a Royal Feast just to hear about it. Procession again after tea, then – a very important occasion for us children meeting Aunts, Uncles and Cousins, because this meant so many relations, so many pennies for the Hurdy Gurdies. We were rich on Midsummer Day, if it only amounted to sixpence and very often went home not having spent up. How we looked at those pennies, one of the three days in the year we had money of our own. A birthday penny, a

bright penny in our stocking at Christmas, and a Midsummer Day penny!

After all, our pleasure on the cricket field was not in spending all our pennies but rather in seeing all the things: Coconut Stall, Aunt Sally, Try Your Weight, Shooting Gallery – not spending a penny to win a pound but getting real enjoyment for our penny.

Lily Wragg was born in 1897 in Youlgrave. Her father was Enos Yates Wragg, a quarry labourer, who married Thursday Garratt. They had 8 children and Lily was the sixth child. Lily Wragg lived in the house between the Post Office and Thimble Hall. She was Housekeeper to Miss Wheeler, the Frenct Teacher at Lady Manners School.

And so, tired out but happy, we wended our way home. It didn't matter if Our Tap hadn't won the first prize.

A year today we would be dressing it again and we might win first prize then. It would be Midsummer Day.

SUSTAINABLE YOULGRAVE REFLECTS ON BUSY YEAR

Sustainable Youlgrave (SY) held its second AGM in the Reading Room last month. About 25 people attended. Chairman John Youatt thanked members and sponsors for the work and money that made the campaign possible. SY has at least 90 email-registered supporters. Thanks also to all the organisations that have supported us with grants totalling

£27,000. In particular, he recorded Jeni Edward's contribution as Treasurer and for her organisational work. We welcomed John Orchard as our new treasurer and new committee members Mike Edwards and Suzanne Pheasey to share representation of Middleton.



Summary of the year

SY commissioned pre-feasibility studies into wind energy and anaerobic digestion. Nine local farmers are interested in an anaerobic digester. We're working on a prospective sustainable woodfuel project and we support a mini-hydro project at Alport. Individuals in the valley have installed, or asked for permission to install, a wind turbine, an air heat pump, a ground heat pump and solar panels. We have tried to reach all residents in the valley. The percentage response has been higher than some similar projects we know of. SY is an active

partner in the emerging Parish Plan, since there are common projects such as lift and car sharing. Future plans include our determination to set up a 'community owned green energy company' which, if successful, would be partnered by a community trust to spend a proportion of any profits generated. This would complete the work of the current voluntary

association. The annual report and technical appendices are available by email from the address below.

Energy saving

The AGM concluded with a presentation by Shona Thomas of the Notts & Derbys Energy

Efficiency Advice Centre. She explained the many ways in which energy can be saved and the role of the energy partnership. Among the useful gadgets she brought along was a 'Powerdown', which automatically switches off your computer and all its peripherals, plus a device to tell you how much power your property is using and which appliances use the most. Sustainable Youlgrave is planning to purchase a couple of these devices and loan them out free of charge to local people who want to check or reduce their domestic energy consumption.
