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## THE **BOMBING OF YOULGRAVE**

After its failure to take command of the skies over southern England in September 1940, the German Luftwaffe began a systematic campaign of night time bombing of the cities of the Midlands and the North of the country. Many of the industrial centres of wartime production of aircraft, munitions factories and naval dockyards took a heavy battering and, shortly before Christmas 1940, the steelworks of Sheffield were the target. The enemy planes were helped by the full night light of a bomber's moon and the next morning Sheffield was a sorry sight. In Youlgrave we watched and listened, little realising that shortly our village was to become the inadvertent target of a misguided raid on the night of 23<sup>rd</sup> December 1940.

Marjorie and I were not long married and were living with her parents at Ash Lea in Coldwell End. I was working for the DP (Du jardin Planté) Battery Company at Bakewell, prior to my joining the Royal Air Force as a radar mechanic. We had recently acquired a copy of the game of Monopoly and that evening our busy buying and selling of Mayfair and Old Kent Road was suddenly interrupted by the sound of what seemed to be a heavy thunder shower. We dashed to the back

door to find the Westcroft hillside behind the house ablaze with literally hundreds of incendiary bombs. As I opened the door the handle was shaken from my hand by the percussion shock of a high explosive bomb which, as we were to later discover, had demolished part of Conksbury Farm, half a mile to the Northeast.

Some composure gradually returned and we discovered that our next door but one neighbour's house was ablaze with an incendiary through its roof. Albert Brassington fought the blaze while his wife brought their daughter, Maisie, to Ash Lea for safety and sweet tea. My mother-in-law served the comforts on the Monopoly board and it bears the stains of liquid spilled by trembling hands to this day.

As auxiliaries at the First Aid post in the Primitive Methodist Chapel, we set off down the road, calling first at my parents' house next door at Craig-y-Lea. As I ran up the yard, I was almost garrotted by a telephone wire brought down by the bombs, but was relieved to find that my parents had taken refuge amongst the coal and garden tools of a concrete-roofed outhouse and, though bewildered, were quite safe. Incendiaries were burning around the house, one in the stockyard behind, within three or four yards of a haystack. I dug sods and soil and managed to extinguish it without further damage.

Further down the village, we found that the steep roof of the chapel had proved to be its saviour for there were two incendiaries burning away on the path below. Another had pierced the roof of a coalshed, tenanted William Brassington, brother of Albert, and was being brought under control. We

waited for casualties, but thankfully none appeared, save a young teenage boy by the name of Seville. It seems that when the lads of the village had decided that the raid was over and that there were no Germans about, they had turned out in force to extinguish fire bombs still alight and to acquire a few souvenirs. In this action our casualty had badly burned his fingers.

Returning to work on the following morning, 1 found that the works of the DP Battery Company had suffered a near miss when a string of four high explosive bombs had gone off in the marshy ground by its reservoir at Lakeside. It was then that I realised that the works had been the true target for the raid. The company's main products were batteries for motor torpedo boats and submarines and batteries for degaussing minesweepers dealing with magnetic mines dropped in the Thames Estuary and the entrances to many east and south coast harbours. German intelligence had clearly instructed the bomber crew to look for the reflection of the moon on expanses of open water to-the south and west of Bakewell. Thus, on a flight from the Southwest, the navigator had clearly mistaken the dams of the River Bradford, south of Youlgrave, and those on the River Lathkill, north of Conksbury Farm, for the works reservoir at Lakeside, Bakewell. The bomb aimer had wasted all his incendiaries at Youlgrave and dropped his biggest bomb at Conksbury, leaving only a string of smaller explosives for the real target.

It could have been a tragic Christmas.

#### From the Cookhouse Door

#### Christmas Chocolate Trifle with Praline

For the trifle Line a serving dish with chocolate sponge cake spread with

chocolate nut spread and moisten with a cream liqueur (Bailey's

Irish Cream, or similar).

For the custard Make up a 1 pint packet of custard powder, adding 2 dessert spoons of cocoa powder and

pour over the sponge. Put on one side to set, covered with a plate to prevent a skin

forming.

For the praline Place a heavy based pan over a medium heat and add 2 dessert spoons of granulated sugar

and two dessert spoons of sliced almonds. Stir with a wooden spoon until the sugar has

melted and caramelised then spread out on a baking sheet to cool and set.

<u>To Complete</u> Spread the trifle with whipped cream, roughly crush the praline and sprinkle over the

trifle.

This makes a lovely change for that special occasion . . . Merry Christmas.
