It is at this time of the year that we remember all the men and women of the armed forces and other services who gave their lives for their country in two world wars and other conflicts since.

In a year that has been difficult for so many different reasons, it has been even more so for the families of those service men and women who have either lost loved ones, or have had a loved one injured while serving their country.

A week ago, the Royal British Legion launched the 2008 Poppy Appeal and members of branches throughout the country, along with other volunteers, started knocking on doors or standing in the streets with their collecting boxes and poppies, whatever the weather, in the hope that you will give generously in support of those service personnel and their families who need our help.

Last year the Youlgrave and District branch collected the sum of £2,237.33 for the appeal. This was achieved with the help of the ladies section of the Royal British Legion and local businesses and others in Youlgrave, Stanton in Peak and

PARISH COUNCIL MAKES DONATION FOR MEMORIAL

Youlgrave Parish Council has made a small donation towards a permanent overseas memorial for the Sherwood Foresters Regiment, following a regional appeal.

The Sherwood Foresters have been connected to Derbyshire and

Nottinghamshire since 1742, but their greatest contribution was during the First World War when they raised 32 Battalions, 17 of which saw active service on the Western Front. During this period some 140,000 men served in the Regiment (more than the whole of the British Army today!), mostly drawn from


parishes throughout the two counties. Of the number who served, 11,409 gave their lives, and many more died at home after the end of the War as a result of their wounds or ill treatment as Prisoners of War. Despite numerous overseas war memorials, there is not one for the Sherwood Foresters, so a location has been secured near the Tyne Cott Visitor Centre, Passchendaele, Ypres, in Belgium. The memorial will be made out of Derbyshire stone and its

manufacture, transportation and installation will cost £14.000.

Youlgrave Parish Council joins Derbyshire Dales District Council and many other local authorities in making donations towards this worthy cause.

Bangbutt re-visited

West African village school finally opens – with help from Youlgrave

Bangbutt-Youlgrave Primary School is now officially opened! To everyone's surprise, the clinic and latrine block were also finished in time for the opening ceremony. In spite of being the rainy season, not a drop of rain fell on 29 September 2008. High above the school, perhaps 30 feet, fluttered a Sierra Leone flag side by side with a Union Jack, on the highest bamboo poles we had ever seen.

Traditional Sierra Leonean celebrations of singing and dancing followed, with much excitement and great enthusiasm. Children gathered in the school hall and sang their welcome. This was followed with a musical drama by eight young girls. Their story showed the sadness of many girls without school uniform, who then feel unable to attend school. Hopefully in time this can be remedied.

This second visit was different. No longer the unknown, but returning to visit friends made previously. In Bangbutt for four nights, we had more time to explore, visit families and 'chat' to them, through an interpreter. We visited four other villages, precariously riding pillion on motor bikes, along rocky paths dotted with puddles 8 inches deep! Many in these villages have benefited from the goats bought for Bangbutt, have taken part in the tailoring training and have experienced the Learning Circles.

Visits were made in Freetown and Magburaka (capital of Tonkolili district, covering Bangbutt) to Ministries of Education and Health, the District Council Offices, VSO and the United Methodist Church Education Department. All promised help and resources. We will



see, but they will all be chased up!

We also visited primary and secondary schools, and the Blind School in Freetown. We had a busy time, learnt a lot, made many new friends and came away sadly, not wanting to leave.

We left with a thousand thanks from our friends in Bangbutt and all the dignitaries attending the opening ceremony. They wanted to thank all of Youlgrave and our other supporters for the help we have given to them to reestablish their country after the devastation of civil war.

We still have more to do. School equipment is very limited. Never enough books for each child. No English Readers. No furniture or equipment for the clinic. At least one more year for financing the Learning Circles. And when all this is done? Next we move on to another village?! As long as we in the West manage to live in relative luxury, compared to our friends in so many other parts of the world, we must continue to do our best to help others. We are so very, very lucky. We must never forget that...

Sustainable Youlgrave: the next step

Sustainable Youlgrave will shortly be commissioning a consultant to carry out a full feasibility study into the viability of setting up and running one or more anaerobic digestion (AD) biogas plants in the Bradford Valley.

The aim is to generate biogas or electricity and heat from on-farm organic waste (and possibly off-farm wastes) for use or sale, and produce safe farm digestates to displace artificial fertilisers presently in use. Farmers are under increasing regulation regarding the application of raw slurry to their land where they are situated in Nitrate Vulnerable Zones (which restrict the nitrate application and spreading dates). This in turn creates storage and spreading issues for farmers. The competitive tender enquiry has been sent out to four consultants. The successful one will contact all working farmers in the Bradford valley to find out those interested and gather relevant data from them about their farm system and operation and other local off-farm wastes, before analysing them against all other

associated aspects and constraints. The study will consider local transportation, appropriate types of AD plant, identify possible plant sites, consider plant operation, regulations and the economics of finance and carbon.

Anaerobic digestion, as defined by the Renewable Energy Association, is a natural biological process carried out by bacteria in the absence of air, by which organic material is broken down into stable fertiliser and useful biogas. These anaerobic bacteria are an integral component of nature's waste management and are commonly found in soils and deep waters, as well as in landfill sites.

During August, Sustainable Youlgrave organised a group visit to Ludlow for local Peak District farmers interested in knowing more about AD. They visited a pioneering site run by specialists Greenfinch, which deals with much of South Shropshire's organic green waste. It was a highly interesting and useful visit, prompting much positive debate.

The Allotment Slot

As people become more aware of what they eat and their desire for fresh locally grown food, the interest in renting one of approximately 50 allotments in the village is increasing, WRITES SANDRA HARROP. In the 'Allotment Slot' we hope to interview a different local allotment holder each month, ask them about their plot and to pass on any tips or advice. In this first interview, a long standing Youlgrave allotment holder talks about his Coldwell End plot.

How long have you had your allotment? Nearly 35 years.

What do you grow every year? Cabbage, peas, leeks, runner and broad beans, brussels sprouts, parsnips, early potatoes and onions.

How many hours do you spend on your allotment? At least one hour a day.

What will be on your table this Sunday dinner time that you have grown? Cabbage, leeks, runner beans, broad beans, parsnips.

Is there anything you wouldn't grow again and why? Cauliflower - I never get them big enough before they turn to seed. I get a lot of carrot fly so I don't grow carrots.

What's the easiest and hardest things to grow? I always grow Hurst Green Shaft peas, Scarlet Emperor runner beans and Bunyards Exhibition broad beans. Leeks are easy to grow as they have no enemies. Anything is hard to grow if the weather is against you, especially if it's frosty. One year my runner beans were frozen on the 6th of June!

Have you had any disasters? Mainly weather made disasters. This year I had plenty of flowers on my runner beans but because it was continually wet, there weren't as many bees around to pollinate them and therefore I've only had a small crop.

What is the best advice anyone gave you? Put compost on top of your root crops, not under the row where the worms

will attract moles. If you put it on the top of the row the birds eat the worms. Rotate all root crops every year but don't rotate onions – if you get a good patch for your onions stick with it.

What's the best tip you would give someone starting an allotment? Keep at it! It's an all year round job. Dig your grass back in, but not weeds, as the grass puts goodness back into the soil. Store your onions in a wooden shed, condensation forms in zinc roofed sheds.

What changes have you seen over the years? In the early years about 99% of the land at the top allotments was fully dug. Now only about 25% of the ground is dug. There used to be lots of people working on their allotments in the evenings, now there are only a few people about.

What are the ups and downs of having an allotment? The ups are plenty — the food is fresh and safe, you know it's from all your hard work. An allotment keeps you active; you're in the fresh air, seeing friends and fellow allotment holders. The downside is that it is nearly a 365 days a year job, you can't walk away from it and leave it until spring; there's always a job that needs doing.

Have you any funny stories of life on the allotments? There are lots of stories I could tell but had better not.

What do you do if you have too much of a particular fruit or veg? I've got three grown up children who have families. Or freeze it.

What three essentials are there for a good allotment? Good neighbouring allotments who don't let the weeds grow. Good soil. Good weather.

Who is your favourite TV gardener? Carol Klein now, I always watched Geoff Hamilton.

What are you doing now in your allotment? Putting the spring cabbage out.

How to go 'green' when choosing a new car

Sustainable Youlgrave's JOHN YOUATT offers some tips.

Prompted by last month's article on car sharing, here's an approach to choosing a car.

It's unlikely that fuel costs will fall in the foreseeable future, if ever. The market for large bodied, low mpg/high carbon emission cars has declined a lot recently. This is partly because of the cost of fuel, partly because of the changes to VED – your tax disc; and partly because of the economy at large.

I've been looking for a replacement first car (for bigger loads and longer journeys) for some months. At the same time,

I've wondered whether Jean and I can justify a second car (for short journeys) - or share use or ownership with others, as the article suggested.

For a first car

I concluded that a reasonable compromise is a 'band B' car. These are small to mid sized cars that emit less than 120 grams CO₂ and no particulates; and achieve around 60 mpg. There are over 70 models listed on the VCA* website. Five of these (at least) are remarkable:

- for capacity, the Ford Focus Estate tdci 1.6;
- for quality and power, the Golf 'blue motion' 1.9 tdi;
- for easy loading (low cill/high headroom) yet smaller, the Ford Fusion tdci 1.6 and up market, a BMW 1 series e8 or a Merc A class..

Your tax disc will cost £35. Do we really need look anywhere else?

For a second family or shared car

There's a growing number of all-electric vehicles with 4 seats and enough range for local trips. I'm not in a position to recommend any, but you can look for yourself on websites such as www.nicecarcompany.co.uk. All-electric is zero carbon if charged with green electricity; and of course there's low running costs.

The key to success is the best batteries – lithium-ion. I'm going to find out more. Or if you want to see the real future, hydrogen from wind, go to -
