Betty Smedley (1916-2008)

Betty was born Elizabeth Rowland in 1916 at Conksbury Hall. She was one of three children born to Robert and Eliza Rowland. Betty's first job was in service in Birmingham, and later Middleton Hall for Lord Cavendish. She eventually left and joined her sister Hilda at the Bakewell Poor Law Hospital (now Newholme). It was here she realised her ambition for Nursing. In 1937 she and Hilda commenced training to be Nurses at Derby City Hospital, followed by a course in Midwifery.

In 1941, at Youlgrave Parish Church, Betty married Horace Smedley (Hal), a motor engineer from Bakewell. However, being wartime, Hal was called up to serve in the RAF, and Betty took up a post as a Staff Nurse at Newholme Hospital. In 1943 their daughter Hilda was born, and Betty became a full time mother. She was now living in



Youlgrave at Auburn Cottage, and although Betty was away from official nursing she helped around the village where any nursing was needed.

In 1965 Hilda left home to train as a nurse and Betty went back to nursing, this time at the Whitworth Hospital,

where she continued until she retired in 1976. Being a Senior Citizen did not stop Betty nursing; she was again dispensing nursing care in the village even into her 80s.

In 1983 the Monday Club was formed, of which Betty was a founder member, and became actively involved up to the last week of her life. In 1992 Hal died and was sorely missed by Betty, who was

a devoted Wife, Mother, Grandmother and Great Grandmother. In October 2008, Betty went home to her Lord. She will be greatly missed by all her family and her many friends.

RECORDING MIDDLETON MEMORIES

A small group of people with a shared interest in the past have embarked upon a venture to discover and record spoken memories of life in Middleton and Smerrill.

People who have lived a considerable time in the parish will be contacted to see if they would like to participate. The first recordings will be taken from older parishioners whose memories reach back furthest and are therefore more precious. Some residents have lived in Middleton all their lives, but others who have moved away will also be traced.

The group has obtained financial support from the Parish Council and Village Hall Committee to buy sound recording equipment. Volunteers will be trained in interview techniques which have already resulted in many successful projects throughout the UK. The recorded material will be made available to the public, and the group hopes to arrange some social events in connection with the oral history.

Dear Editor,
I've been researching the history of my house (known as Haddon View on Alport Lane in Youlgrave - immediately on the left of the garage, opposite the school) and would like to ask if any *Bugle* readers can help.

The house is estimated to date back to the mid-1700s, but searches at the County Hall Local Studies Library and Derbyshire Record Office have revealed little information about it. The best source of information so far has been back issues of *The Bugle*, which indicate that the house, together with Thornhill House next door, was previously a pub. The pub was called successively the Marquis of Granby (from 1829), the William the Fourth (from 1846) and the Thornhill Arms (from 1887). If any readers have any information on the house before those dates, such as previous names, the year in which it was built or any other interesting information, I'd be very grateful if they would get in touch.

New affordable housing for Youlgrave

Plans are being drawn up for a development of nine affordable houses in Youlgrave, on land off Conksbury Lane, between Hall Farm and Conksbury Avenue.

The proposals follow the Parish Council's Housing Need Survey undertaken in Youlgrave last year. An open day for residents to examine the plans and make suggestions is being organised for next month – see local posters nearer the time.

Architect Derek Trowell has been taken on by Peak District Rural Housing Association to design Youlgrave's new affordable houses, which are expressly for local people in need.

Energy-efficiency measures are integral to the new units, and Derek Trowell has already designed some impressive houses. In November I was invited to Nottingham University to look at their Eco Housing Project, and in particular the 'BASF House' (BASF is a German chemical company) designed by Derek*. The requirements, specifications and materials to be used for each house are dictated by the needs of the whole project and the companies sponsoring each build.

The project compares different building materials, backup heating systems, grey water solutions (for instance, using rainwater for the washing machine) and the effectiveness of solar and wind energy systems. And the total build, with its high-tech, cutting edge technology, has to come out as 'affordable'. Which, in the case of the BASF house, translates as 'small'?

The architect has a very difficult job and the BASF house has much to commend it.

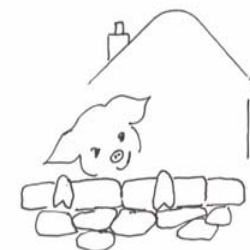
Almost anything is possible, it would seem. The discussion remaining appears to focus on 'Do we want it here?' To what extent should buildings be 'in keeping'? And what does that mean anyway? What effect will nine environmentally-friendly houses have on global warming, anyway? Ultimately, our challenge is how we can modify and improve our little cottages to drastically reduce heating bills.

But Youlgrave is a living village, and while we must respect and protect the integrity of the older parts of the village, we definitely have space to flirt with the future for the sake of some innovative, exciting housing for our young – that should cost next to nothing to run!

The initial provisional street layout for the new Youlgrave development looks impressive, with some unexpected features, like a laundry house and vegetable gardens. Internal design is more of an open book. Derek will be available at the open day in January and would particularly like to hear the views of possible future residents on what they see their needs being within the houses. What would you like? What would you need? What's your dream?

Understanding changes to the planning laws



Recent changes in planning guidelines have had a significant effect on what we can now do to our properties without official permission. In the first of a series of three articles, a local architect explains what the planning laws now allow you to do to your dwelling without official approval.

PERMITTED DEVELOPMENT (PD)

Acts of Parliament govern what a local planning authority can control (in our case it's the Peak District National Park Authority, based in Bakewell). One of these laws is the Town & Country Planning (General Permitted Development) Order, generally known as **PD rights**, which sets out what can be done without Planning Permission.

It's a complicated, legal document which at the best of times is not easily understood. PD rights are a concession to the public and also reduce the planners' workload, but you should be aware of the PD limits, otherwise the planners may take an interest after the work is done. Unauthorised building work may be liable to enforcement action, so knowledge of your PD rights is essential before starting building work – it's a lot cheaper to sort things out on paper first!

A new edition of these PD rights came into effect on 1 October 2008 and the main changes are summarised briefly here. (Note, however, that a Listed Building has **no** Permitted Development Rights, so approval must be obtained for any change, internal and external.)

This guide relates to our National Park location – PD rights are slightly easier outside it.

The interests of neighbours are taken into account within the PD rights, in relation to overlooking, loss of daylight and privacy.

If it's not PD then you'll need to apply for Planning Approval. In any case, you'll also need Building Regulations approval (see below).



EXTENSION OF A DWELLINGHOUSE (including a house or a bungalow, but not a flat or flats)

PD is not allowed at the front or at the sides, except for a small porch (see below).

An extension is PD at the rear if it's single-storey only and extends not more than 4m beyond the rear wall (if the dwelling is detached) or not more than 3m (if the dwelling is a semi or in a terrace) and not higher than 4m or (if within 2 metres of the land boundary) the eaves must be no higher than 3m. In either case, the eaves must be no higher than the eaves of the existing dwelling.

A 2 storey extension is not PD in the National Park.

There is no limit on the length of extension along the back of the dwelling house, but it mustn't extend beyond the line of the side wall(s) and there is a limit on the total ground area covered by buildings, enclosures and containers (eg an oil tank) on the dwelling's curtilage, including the extension.

They must not exceed 50% of the total curtilage – excluding the ground area of the 'original house' as first built after 1 July 1948 or as at that date if built before then. It's certainly complicated! So your PD rights may already have been used up by previous additions and you'll need to seek planning permission.

There will be more on outbuildings, etc, in a future issue.

Cladding of external walls is not PD in a National Park.

Any PD work (except a conservatory) must use materials for the exterior

which are of a similar appearance to the exterior of the existing dwellinghouse – beware, as 'similar' is vague and could cause problems, so it's best to consult the planners first.

A porch to an external door on the front, side or rear is PD if it's no bigger than 3 square metres ground area measured externally and no higher than 3m above ground and not less than 2m from a boundary adjacent to a highway.

NOTE

i) A PD extension might be queried by purchasers when you sell the dwelling ("have you got approval for this?"). Will you be able to prove it's PD? It's easy to do if you can get a letter confirming this from the planners, preferably before you start building, by showing them a drawing.

ii) Any extension/alteration, whether PD or not, will require Building Regulations approval from Derbyshire Dales District Council in Matlock or from a private registered Building Control agent. The

Regulations are complicated and deal with structure, fire safety, ventilation, insulation, etc, including the effect on the existing building. You need proper drawings to start with. A conservatory less than 30 square metres floor area does not require Building Regulations approval, but this must have at least

30 sq m = 323 sq ft

75% of its roof and 50% of its external walls glazed, otherwise it's not officially a 'conservatory' and so will require Building Regulations approval.

iii) If your proposal doesn't comply with PD limits you can apply for planning permission. The application

fee is currently £135, plus professional fees for producing drawings and filling in the forms. The application period is officially two months.

There were free cotton shoppers, carbon calculators and light bulbs and information about recycling, composting and renewable energy from wood fuel. Andrew Hubble exhibited pictures of two local ground-source heating schemes he has recently installed. Sally Wheal from the Peak Park's Ranger Service helped us work out the size of our carbon footprints.

Youlgrave School produced an exhibition (specially commissioned for the event) of children's paintings and poetry on the theme of the environment. Youlgrave Cinema showed a series of short films on climate change – Mark Shearing transformed the village hall



stage into a superb small film studio.

Maggie Ford from Bankside Wildlife Garden offered tours of the estate, while Haddon trout fishery (a slightly bigger estate) brought information about their proposed mini hydro scheme (thanks to Warren Slaney). The Bangbutt Committee provided a Developing World perspective (thanks to Barbara Scrivener).

Youlgrave Water put their product on the line and offered a blind tasting. Could you tell the difference between Youlgrave Water, Severn Trent and the bottled stuff? The results are eagerly awaited and will be reported – fearlessly – in a future issue of the Bugle, once Youlgrave Waterworks has worked out what it all means! Our photographic competition (on the theme of climate change and the environment) attracted a small but high class field - and was won by Tricia Donnison.

Drinks, snacks and locally-sourced lunches were provided by Jean Youatt and Glenys Moore in the social room. They did a roaring trade all day and kept

PEAK FEAST is a small vegetarian bakery based on Moor Lane in Youlgrave that produces a range of cakes, as well as supplying various cafes and coffee shops in the area. It specialises in gluten-free and wheat-free cakes and also vegetarian and vegan savoury meals, flans and pies.

Sue Cook and Jo Healey took over the business in the summer, and as well as the usual Victoria sponge and coffee cake they now also offer some rather unusual options, including kiwi, lime and ginger cake, and gooseberry and elderflower.

The range of vegetarian, vegan and gluten-free savouries includes mushroom and puy lentils braised in red wine, plus homity pie. And if you are planning for a few weeks ahead you will also be interested to know that they produce a rather fine Christmas pudding.

LATEST BENEFIT CHANGES

Housing Benefit and Council Tax Benefit: Since October any maintenance payments which you receive will be disregarded. This means you could get increased benefit. If you are an existing claimant you will get any extra automatically. If you have previously claimed benefit and been turned down, you should apply again immediately.

Incapacity Benefit: Since October Incapacity Benefit will be replaced by Employment & Support Allowance. If you are already getting Incapacity Benefit you will not be affected before 2010. New claimants who are unable to work because of sickness or disability will have a 12 week assessment period intended if possible to help them back into employment which is suitable to their situation.

Benefit Check: Pick up a form from your local surgery. This will enable the CAB to check your situation and help you get any benefits you may be entitled to.

The Allotment Slot

This month 'Allotment Slot' interviews Jenny Simpson. She and her family have a plot on the 'top' allotments.

What's on your dinner table this week that you have grown? Parsnips, turnips, duck and chicken, Yorkshire pudding made from our eggs and some soft fruit.

How long have you had your allotment? I shared half with my uncle for 8 years and have had a whole one for about 3 ½ years.

What do you grow every year? Just about anything I can, onions, cucumber, flowers, 5 different lettuces, 3 types of cabbage, lots of fruit, all kinds of beans, a pumpkin for Halloween, carrots, Jerusalem artichokes, mini turnips, Swiss chard.

Anything you wouldn't grow and why? Large turnips because they are really cheap in the shops and shop ones taste just like home-grown ones unlike other veg where the home grown ones taste much better than shop bought.

What are the hardest things and the easiest things you've grown? Hardest are parsnips, easiest are weeds.

Have you had any disasters? None really, other than weather wise disasters. I plant when the weather is right though, not just when it says so on the packet.

What's the best tip someone has given you? Don't get your manure from 'Upty' cos it's full of thistles.

What's the best tip you would give

anyone? Always store your runner bean poles and pea sticks inside in winter. And CD's on a piece of string make good bird scarers.

What changes have you seen over the years? A lot more women have allotments now than they used to have.

What are the upsides and the downsides of having an allotment?

The winters are too long and the summers too short.

How many hours do you spend here? Anything from an hour a day in winter (I have chickens to look after) to up to four hours in summer.

Any funny stories? One year I was digging up the vegetable patch and found six 'Matchbox' toy cars that my son had buried a year before.

What do you do if you get a glut? If I can't freeze it or jar it then I'll try to swap it. A lot takes place.

What are the 3 essentials to a good allotment? Time, patience and more time.

Who is your favourite TV gardener? Alan Titchmarsh. I used to like Geoff Hamilton, he once said "If you've got a patch – stick a vegetable in it". I agree with that.

What are you going to do now? I'm going to feed and water the chickens and make sure they are all present and correct. I've got two roosters that I'm going to get rid of so I'm going to sort them out.

Bangbutt Harvest Appeal and the 'Learning Circles'

Thank you very much to everyone who has returned their Harvest Appeal donation for Bangbutt. To date, we have received £235. For anyone who hasn't managed to get round to it yet, we'd love to receive it as soon as possible as we need to send out our next £2,500 commitment for the 2008-2009 Learning Circles.

These Learning Circles are amazing, as Lottie and I experienced during our recent visit to Bangbutt. Nine other villages are involved in the Project, as well as Bangbutt. Twenty five villagers, roughly equal numbers of both sexes, are chosen or volunteer to take part from each village. Many of them are young adults who have missed out of education due to the war. They meet in their specially built 'Learning Circle' huts twice a week, usually in the evenings after finishing work on their farms and round the village. Through discussion they decide on a topic for the session, go through a series of strategies, and then work out and enact a role play.

We saw three such role plays: a fire arsonist at work; a family of a husband, two wives and two daughters, only one daughter being allowed to go to school; and finally a vivid drama of how the HIV/AIDS virus can attack people. At the end of the sessions, some of the participants stood up and told us how they had benefited from these sessions; how they now have confidence to stand up and speak for themselves; how they realize the benefits of working together in a group to sort out problems; how they can now

write their names and are learning the alphabet in both English and Temne, their local language. Many of those who stood up and spoke were women, young and old.

Sadly, some of the other funders of these 'Learning Circles' have had to withdraw funding early so, to date, we are not sure whether the Project can continue for the full four years as planned. However, we know Bangbutt's 'Learning Circle' will continue until July 2009. Hopefully, further funding can be found to allow the work in 2009-2010 to continue. During this vital fourth year, Micro Credit schemes are introduced to the villagers, which encourages them to become more independent and hopefully less if not completely, dependent on us. That will be the time when we can withdraw from funding in Bangbutt, although continue as friends, and turn our help to another village or area. We came back this time from Bangbutt with many written and spoken requests for financial help from many other groups!
