Annie Brandon (1916–2009)

Annie was born in Youlgrave on 26 February 1916, the first child of Beulah and Herbert Wheeldon.

She spent her early childhood in Smithy Lane, Middleton, with her younger brothers Jack and George.

The family moved from Middleton to Youlgrave in 1937. Although she spent most of her life in Youlgrave she was a Middleton girl at heart.

Like many of her generation, Annie spent some years in service; first at Cales Farm, where she developed a love of animals, and then at the Old Hall in

Youlgrave. Annie always enjoyed dancing and it was through this that she met her husband Frank. She gave a lively account of returning with Frank from a New Year's Eve dance in Maggie Ford's film 'Made of Clay'.

Her first son, Donald, was born in 1937 before Frank went to war. Like so many, she had to bring up a young child while her husband and brothers were abroad on active service. During these war years she coped admirably and nursed Frank back to health on his return. After the war the family moved into their cottage on Bankside and in 1946 their second son Michael was born.

Annie loved her home and was devoted to her family. She worked hard and was proud that they were always able to enjoy an annual holiday. After their sons left home, Annie and Frank went on more adventurous holidays abroad and enjoyed dancing again.

Despite an increasing struggle with

arthritis, Annie was determined to maintain her independence after Frank's death in 2000. Her appearance and quiet manner belied a strong character. She continued to live in the family cottage on Bankside until

December 2008 when she moved into residential care in Suffolk to be closer to her sons Donald and Michael. She had lived in the cottage for 62 years.

Annie died unexpectedly but very peacefully on 7 September at Chilton Meadows Residential Care Home in Stowmarket. Her funeral was held in Ipswich

on 22nd September 2009. She was a devoted wife, mother and grandmother and will be sadly missed by all her family and friends.

What is the D of E Award all about?

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme is open to anyone aged 14-25 who wants a challenge and to try something new. It has four sections: skill, physical, volunteering and the expedition. The time spent on each section and the length and time of the expedition increases with each Award - from Bronze through to Silver and Gold.

In Youlgrave we have a group primarily aimed at young people in the village (and a few of their friends) who want to have a go at the scheme. We train the young people in expedition skills, including navigation, campcraft, etc, to ensure that they are competent to undertake expeditions. We also help them choose their activities for their other sections. We meet on Mondays in the Scout & Community Hall, 7-9pm.

During the summer we had a group of six carry out their Silver Duke of Edinburgh Award expedition. They only had a week between their practice and qualifying trips, due to their other commitments, so this added extra pressure on them. For these expeditions, the group had to carry all their kit including tent, stoves and fuel and food for three days. They had to navigate and walk over 30 miles and carry out a purpose which was presented at a later date. Unfortunately one member of the group had to drop out after the first day due to an infected and very painful toe. The others however were very cheerful, very tired but proud at what they had achieved as the leaders met them coming down Kinder Scout into Edale and their finish point. This group have a few other sections to finish before they gain their Silver Award, but most of them are

to the Gold Level and even more of a challenge!

We will be starting another group o f f i n November, so if you are 14 (or will be by 2010)



and would like to more about the scheme, we will be having a meeting for you all and your parents to let you know more about it on Monday 12 October, in the Scout & Community Hall, starting at 7pm. Please come along and hear about it - we will not be asking you to commit that evening!

We would be really keen to get more adults involved in this group. James Parker has recently moved and is due to be married and Mark Shearing has recently become a Dad congratulations to them both! If you have an interest in the outdoors, or feel you could help in another way please aet in touch.
