Youlgrave Village Market a great success

Youlgrave's first 'Village Market', held last month in the Reading Room, proved to be a big hit with a superb turn out.

It was opened by Eddie Oldfield, chair of the Horticultural Society and Reading Room Committee, who said he was impressed with the wide variety of stalls. They included spinning and knitting, photography, woodturning, sewing, card making, art, pottery and jewellery, as well as cakes, buns, jams and chutneys. The room seemed to be crowded from the word go, and a steady stream of customers walked and talked their way round the impressive displays, ending up with welcome refreshments. All the stallholders said they would come back next time, and one or two newcomers agreed to offer their wares. There were only a couple of post-its put up on the Recycle Board but both received responses – so it is obviously worth remembering to note your swaps, wants



and sales on the board next time.

The plan is to hold a Village Market every two months in the first instance, with the next one on **13 March** in the Reading Room.

Apart from craft and home-made produce, it is hoped that as the year progresses, surplus fruit and vegetables from gardens and allotments will be offered for sale. There was a query about allotment holders being able to sell their surplus, but the Parish Council has confirmed that it is permissible so long as it is just that – i.e. surplus to domestic needs and not grown for trade or business. It's a shame to see good local food going to waste!

SAFER NEIGHBOURHOODS FORUM MEETING

RE-ARRANGED DATE: Wednesday 10 February

Youlgrave Village Hall, 7pm

Come along and raise and discuss any issues or problems within the Youlgrave and Stanton area. The panel will be made up of police officers, PCSOs, Special Constables and partnership members such as local councillors. This is your chance to say what you feel are the main issues in your area, such as anti-social behaviour or nuisance vehicles. The panel members then prioritise these issues for the next three months and set about tackling them. James Wilfred (Wilf) Lincoln (1928–2009)

James Wilfred Lincoln (Wilf) was born in 1928 at Unstone, near Chesterfield, and served an apprenticeship at Markham Engineering Works after leaving school. This is also where his love of football started and he played for Chesterfield College and Markham works. After leaving Markham's, Wilf worked at Doughty's Mining Company from where he travelled around the country servicing and repairing hydraulic pit props.

Wilf was also a keen cyclist, and it was during one of his rides into Derbyshire that he met Ella – later to become his wife. Ella ran the Dronfield Wheelers Club and their two cycle clubs met for a day at Monsal Head in 1950 when Ella literally fell for Wilf as he purposely tripped her up whilst walking into Monsal Dale!

Around the same time, Bert Marsden, the Manager of Youlgrave football club, brought in

a number of Chesterfield lads to play for his team – and Wilf was amongst them. A good player, Wilf had trials with Port Vale and Burnley, and in order to secure him Bert offered Wilf a house for £1 a week on the condition that he

played for Youlgrave. Wilf readily agreed. On 8 March 1952, Wilf and Ella married at Dronfield Church and moved into 4 New Road, Youlgrave, fulfilling his promise to Bert and becoming Captain of Youlgrave football club.

Whilst captaining Youlgrave, the team won numerous cups in the Matlock and District League.

Wilf still travelled daily to Chesterfield and Ella continued by bus to Sheffield, but after a few months Wilf took a job at Friden brickworks and Ella at the village Co-op. Whilst playing in the Elton Cup in 1954, Wilf was knocked unconscious and it was feared that Ella, pregnant at the time with daughter Janice, would give birth at the pitch side. However, Janice was not born until two weeks later, and was joined two years on by sister Susan, completing the Lincoln family.

In 1961, Wilf and Ella bought a plot of land

from Jack Brassington and built their bungalow in Brassington Close. With help from Jack and Ray Carter, they moved in in 1962. Wilf loved his home and garden and was very proud of both.



YOULGRAVE YOUNG PEOPLE NEED YOU

Since September 2007, a small group of volunteers has been running a Youth Club in the Scout Hut, for 8-13 year olds. We've had some very pleasant Tuesday evening sessions, with lots of different activities, as well as visitors and speakers, some of them from our village. However, we're gradually coming to the conclusion that we're trying to satisfy too wide an age range in one session - 8 year olds and 13 year olds just don't want to do the same things. Understandably, the older ones gradually drift away.

So we're wondering about the possibility of offering a less structured, more relaxed group for our young people as they move into secondary school, probably meeting after the youth club on Tuesdays, for an hour or so. If we find there is a demand for another group, we will need more helpers. We sometimes find it difficult to staff one club with our volunteers, never mind two. The average age of our helpers is surprisingly high - we would love to have some YOUNG people joining us, men and women, offering perhaps a couple of evenings each term. Our club members respond so well to young adult helpers, who can bring along new ideas, new skills and energy, and share their interests.

Another way you could help would be to come along and lead one session for us - say about an hour. Your job or hobby or sport or skill might really interest the youngsters at a Youth Club session. We'd love to hear from you about what you can offer. Working with young people can be very satisfying and worthwhile, and our village children deserve our effort and attention and support.

PLEASE consider getting involved with the Youth Club, at whatever level and in whatever way suits you. The children, and the volunteer helpers, need you. Contact Barbara (636601) or Glenys (636477) to discuss.

Wilf worked for Youlgrave Waterworks alongside Joe Thornhill and designed the original storage tank built to retain the excess water from the Harthill Moor spring. This enabled people at the top of Youlgrave to have a constant water supply.

Upon retirement from football, Wilf took up golf and represented DSF Refractories in many tournaments, playing at Gleneagles in Scotland on several occasions.

Following retirement in 1990 he and Ella spent some of their happiest moments travelling the country, firstly in their caravan and later their motor home. They particularly liked to visit the Lake District, Scotland and Wales, but also ventured abroad into France.

Alzheimer's struck when Wilf was 68, but it didn't stop his travelling and he and Ella visited Canada twice. He was canoeing there on his 70th birthday. They also visited Italy and other parts of Europe. Despite his increasing memory loss, Wilf greatly enjoyed these holidays.

The Alzheimer's affected Wilf for 14 years, but many happy times were still spent during that period, particularly with the family – daughters, four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Wilf died on 22 September 2009 at Ashcroft Nursing Home in Chesterfield, where he had spent some years as his condition worsened.

Ella and the family wanted to donate something to the Wesleyan Reform Chapel where Wilf's funeral was held. Ella asked Ray Carter to build a lectern, but Ray refused any payment for his time in memory of Wilf. Ella and the family are much indebted. A dedication service will be held on Sunday 7 March.

Plant a tree for a bee

Youlgrave Bee Group would like to encourage everyone to plant bee-friendly plants in their allotments or gardens, but what on earth can you plant in February? Well, now is the ideal time to look at planting **trees and shrubs** while they are still dormant, especially fruit trees and fruit bushes. Bees love the flowers and the pollinating action makes sure you have plenty of fruit. What could be better!

Trees and fruit bushes come in shapes and sizes to fit most gardens and can be espaliered against walls to save space. In this area, blueberries need to be planted in tubs and kept well watered, but they reward care. If you only have a window box, however, why not plant some winter flowering heathers for colour? They also provide a lifeline for bees if we get a sudden warm spell, which can wake them up when there is very little food available.
