Lead stripped from Church roof

Over £1,000 worth of lead sheets have been stolen from Youlgrave Church, after thieves got on to the roof during the night.

It happened during the small hours of Sunday 9 April, with lead removed from

the chancel roof and also stripped, but not taken, from the south porch roof. Over the last two months 12 similar incidents have occurred at churches across Derbyshire, including Darley Dale, Crich, Middleton by Wirksworth, Mappleton and Osmaston.

The Police were called to All Saints after indentations in the ground were noticed the following morning. They

say that the thieves would have had to use 30ft ladders and probably a van, and are appealing for witnesses.

The chancel roof had been renovated only two years ago and church-goers and residents had helped raise £70,000 towards repairs.

It was revealed that the stolen lead from All Saints had been marked with invisible DNA-tracing liquid, so-called 'smart water', so if the offenders are captured with the lead they can be directly linked to the crime and the lead returned to the church.

Police officers are also visiting scrap yards to encourage owners to report

anyone they suspect of trying to sell stolen metal. Metals like copper and lead are still a valuable commodity for thieves touring the area, looking for opportunities to steal and sell scrap, and buildings like churches and schools are at risk.

A 22-year-old man from Alfreton has been arrested and charged with theft after being stopped with a quantity of lead in the back of his car. It was directly linked

to a recent theft from St Helen's Church in Darley Dale.

If you have any information that may be of use, or if you see any suspicious activity around Youlgrave Church in the future, report it to the Police by calling 0345 123 33 33 (24 hours). Or if you suspect a crime is in progress immediately call 999.

Caring for birds

Dear Editor

A common element in our dawn and evening chorus at this time of year is nesting birds' alarm calls; the same poor parent birds chattering almost constantly from first light until dark in desperate attempts to lure away from their fledglings domestic cats. Some cat owners do take care and curtail their charges' hunting adventures during the birds' breeding season. Could more owners possibly follow suit? After all, pet cats are fed, but some then go out and kill but not eat their prev.

Another avian concern is that ground nesting birds are being wiped out by the modern practice of cutting for silage several times in spring; silage being more nutritious than hay. Until this change to grasscutting earlier than Lammas, which was the traditional time for hav cutting hence the term 'Lammas land'. I understand that nesting lapwings were numerous in this area but now have almost vanished.

Can anything be done? I once saw a farmer carefully ploughing around a lapwing's nest: which wouldn't have won him any prizes for ploughing but he should have got a gong from the RSPB! Might it be feasible for lapwings' nests to be located and marked, and so avoided when cutting grass fields in spring?

Parking in the village: the rights and wrongs

The issue of where you can and can't park on public roads within Youlgrave is one that excites considerable debate and is almost constantly under the spotlight. Like so many other local villages, we've got narrow streets and often no pavements, numerous properties without any off-road parking and lots of people (including visitors) trying to find somewhere to leave their vehicles.

It's not surprising that there's confusion and occasionally disagreements, so following some recent problems a meeting was held between representatives of Youlgrave Parish Council, the Police and Derbyshire County Council Highways department to consider ways forward. It was agreed that it might be helpful for residents if it was explained exactly what the law says about parking on the public highway, and in particular that it is illegal to block the highway or reserve parts of it for your own personal parking.

- The 'highway' usually refers to the carriageway, footway and any verge.
 For instance, the cobbled area adjacent to Fountain Square is part of the highway and does not belong to householders.
- It is an offence for any person, without lawful authority or excuse, to wilfully obstruct the free passage along a highway.
- 'Obstruction' includes anything that prevents passing and re-passing along the highway. It is also not necessary for the whole of the highway to be blocked for the offence to be committed. The offence is obstructing the highway, not other highway users, so it is not necessary to prove that anyone was actually obstructed. The obstruction has to be 'wilful', so you will often be asked to move and if you do not then this will be used as evidence of your 'wilful' obstruction in court. This has

implications for any person who chooses to place obstacles such as flower tubs, sign boards, milk churns or any other obstruction outside their properties if they impinge on the highway.

- The Highways Authority may serve notice under the appropriate section of the Highways Act to deal with the removal of obstructions. The police also have the power to enforce the legislation if this is deemed necessary. Enforcement action would be a last resort if advice was not heeded.
- Flower tubs or planters in areas such as Fountain Square certainly enhance its attractiveness, but they <u>do</u> constitute an obstruction of the highway and should be removed. There is, however, no problem with hanging baskets or window boxes providing they are securely fixed.
- In addition, it is not legally possible to reserve a section of the highway for your own use, even if it is outside your own house. It is all public highway.
- The question is often asked: "Cars are always parking outside my house. Can I stop them?" If these vehicles are legally parked, taxed and not causing an obstruction they are entitled to park there, even though it is outside your house. But please be considerate towards neighbours and other residents, wherever you choose to exercise your legal right to park.

Villages like Youlgrave were not designed for present day vehicle usage, with often multiple cars per household and increasing levels of vehicle use, so we must all show consideration and common sense when it comes to parking and how we use the highway. Thank you for your cooperation.

I am slipping into a reverie when I suddenly catch sight of darting streaks of brilliant blue skimming across the surface of the pond. I look more closely and see that there is group of damsel flies enjoying the sunshine – and the goodies on the surface of the water. Over the years I have often seen dragonflies, and indeed this pond has quite a few dragonfly larvae ensconced in the weed waiting to pounce on the newly hatched tadpoles, but this is a first sighting of damsel. The bank at the side of me is a mass of forget-me-nots, as well as supporting the last showings of cowslips which seem to be thriving. Visitors to the garden are slowly increasing, though it's rare to run into other people if you fancy a peaceful hour or so in the garden. Youlgrave Bee Group: JOIN IN!

If you go to www.youlgravebeegroup.blogspot.com you will find up to date information about the bee group, a page for the identification of bees and lots more. You can add your comments too.

In the April Bugle the Bee Group asked if you would like to count bees and let us know how many you'd seen. Well, it got back to me that counting bees isn't easy, so here's a tip or two:

- 1. <u>Listen</u>. On a still sunny day go into the garden and first of all listen: you can hear bees buzzing, especially bumble bees who seem to make quite a lot of noise. If you can hear bees, go and find out where they are.
- 2. <u>Look</u>. Often bees will find a favourite plant cotoneaster bushes are one of those at this time of year. By following the noise you will find where bees are gathered in your garden; or it may be down the dale, or in the churchyard, or anywhere else around the village.
- 3. <u>Count</u>. This can be difficult because bees move around all the time. People who watch flocks of birds count them by estimating how much space about 10 or 20 will take up and then estimating how much space the whole flock they can see is taking up. Bees are much the same. So look at a small area of the plant or tree, see how many bees you can see there, then estimate how many may be on the whole plant. For honey bees it may be in the tens, for bumble bees it will be less.
- 4. <u>Let us know</u>. Either fill in the form you collected from Hollands butchers, or go on-line to the blog and fill in the counter for the number of honey bees or bumblebees you have seen. If you give us your address too, we can map the village to find out where the bees like best.

Only a few people can work on the Youlgrave Bee Group beehives, but the whole village can help and support the bees. After all, they're what it's all about. Thank you.

100 Years in August 2010

YOULGRAVE OR YOULGREAVE?

My ancestor, Joseph Gilbert, was High Constable for High Peak for 33 years. In all his administrative lists (Jury Service, etc) he spells the name – in beautiful handwriting – *Youlgreave*.

In a very rare book entitled 'The Derbyshire Miner's Glossary' by James Mander, the word Grove or Groove is described as "the works that miners make in the mine by sinking shafts, driving drifts, cuttings, sinkings, driving, sumptings, etc. Grove according to one authority at that time is in Belg. written 'groeve' - so the word grave or cutting into is linked to the word 'engraver' in stone, brass or wood. 'Grovelling' means working in the mines, and 'groundling' from working in the ground; and at that time in the Mendips they called the miner a 'Grovier' from pits called Groves in which ore and minerals are found."

This book is fascinating as it lists all the old mining terms and gives their linguistic origins.

As a child, I used to listen enthralled to the older generation speaking the 'Pommie' version of the old Derbyshire dialect which, after all, is the language of the old lead miner. There's a famous Defoe reference — "lean lank person somewhat of the colour of lead, itself emerged from the bowels of the earth speaking in an unintelligible manner" (Defoe could not understand him!). But the roots of the old dialect are the Old Saxon, Old High German, Norman French and Norse contributions to our language.

A Pommie person greeting another says the immortal words 'Eh-up, Serrey?' – Hallo, what do you know? This must surely come from the French savoir – to know. The older generation called Youlgreave – Yowgri.

The various spellings through the centuries would depend on the clerks and dialect of that time. *Zolgrif* and *Jolgrau* are surely Germanic and French inspired according to which language or alphabet dominated at that time. The *Youl* could have referred to caulk.

Recommended reading: another fascinating book on Peak Country mining is the 'Politics of Social Conflict' by Andy Wood 1520-1770.

Native crayfish found in River Lathkill

Native white-clawed crayfish have once more been found in the River Lathkill, almost 20 years after the original population was wiped out. Subsequent attempts at reintroduction have ultimately failed, due to a virulent disease brought in by invading American signal crayfish. So this apparent re-establishment of a relic population is all the more extraordinary. A survey is planned for the autumn to identify the numbers and locations of the crayfish. If you do go looking for them please tread very carefully – Haddon Estate has a 'no wading' rule for fishermen and the small creatures can easily be crushed by well meaning rock turners. It should also go without saying that the crayfish must be returned immediately, unharmed.
