YOULGRAVE POST OFFICE TO CLOSE IN JANUARY

It has been announced that Youlgrave Post Office will close its doors for good at 12.30pm on Wednesday 12 January 2011, after protracted attempts to find a buyer for the business failed.

Roger Easton, Youlgrave's Subpostmaster, said that it was with deep regret that he had decided to take the decision. "I am truly sorry that it has not been possible to keep this office open."

Roger, 67, who lives at the post office with his wife Jennifer, announced his intention to retire several years ago and since then has been looking for potential buyers for the business, but despite some interest no offers have been forthcoming.

"Jennifer and I sincerely hope that there will be a future for the Post Office in Youlgrave," he said. "We would like to take this opportunity to thank all those people in Youlgrave and the surrounding area who have supported the Post Office while I have been Subpostmaster here."

Roger and Jennifer have been at Youlgrave Post Office on Fountain Square for almost 14 years.

The proposed closure of Youlgrave Post Office follows a similar pattern in other rural communities in Derbyshire, the most recent example being at Grindleford where the outgoing Subpostmaster declared that the business simply wasn't viable.

New book celebrates the Brown Hare

Youlgrave photographer and artist, **Christine Gregory**, has published a superb new book celebrating the Brown Hare.

Richly illustrated with 150 of Christine's own photos, taken locally, the book gives a rare insight into one of the UK's most loved but now most threatened species. It's published to coincide with the International Year of Biodiversity and it highlights the rapid and extensive loss of the hare's habitat that has taken place all over the country. Christine reflects on the impact of modern farming methods and the effect that the disappearance of traditional grasslands has had on the hare and other species.

"I am entranced by hares," explains Christine, "and I care about their survival. I've been watching, tracking and photographing them for a number of years and I wanted to share the wonder of these creatures with other people."

Profits from the book, which has been printed with the support of a grant from the Peak District National Park Sustainable Development Fund, are being donated to Derbyshire Wildlife Trust. *Brown Hares in the Derbyshire Dales* is published by Lepus Books at £15 and copies are on sale locally at Youlgrave Post Office or at the public event at the Reading Room on 11 November (see box left) to which everyone is welcome.



Christine will be giving a talk about the book, and how it was developed from ideas through to fieldwork, on **Thursday 11 November** at **Youlgrave Reading Room**, from **7pm–8.30pm**. There will be plenty of opportunity to discuss the environmental issues raised by the book and copies will be available to buy. Entry costs £1 and includes refreshments. Any profits will go to Sustainable Youlgrave.

The Brown Hare – some facts

- *The population has declined by 75% since the Second World War.*

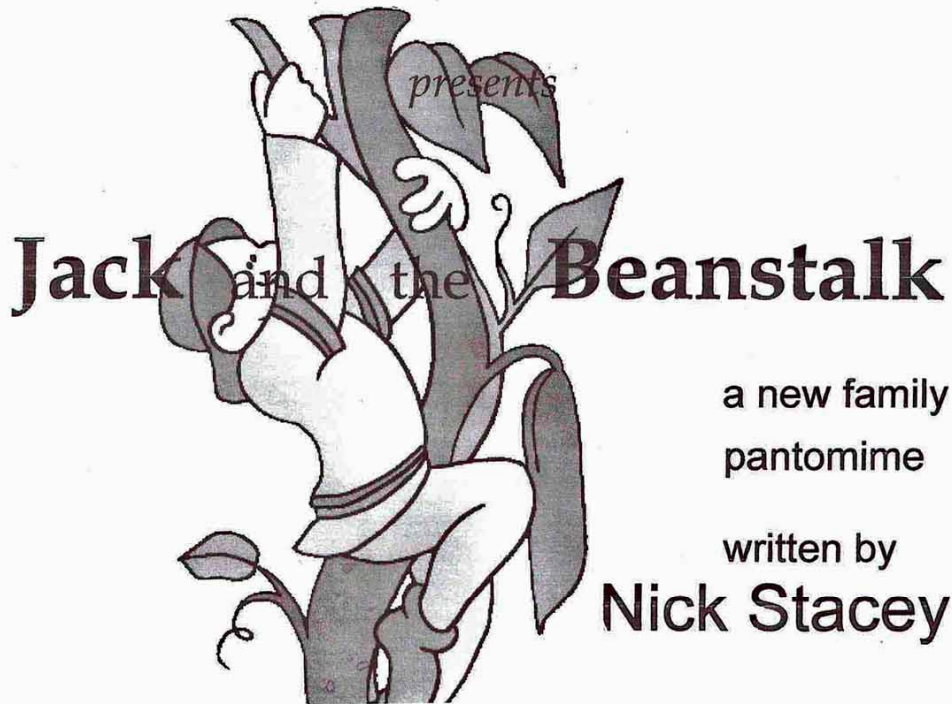

Youlgrave Guides celebrate Centenary

At 20:10hrs on 20/10/2010 half a million Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, senior section and leaders from around the UK renewed their Guide promise marking the end of the Centenary year. Girls and leaders from Youlgrave joined with girls from our division for a fun packed evening at the Sheffield Ski Village. The Guides enjoyed skiing and bowling while Brownies and Rainbows tried tobogganing and crafts - it was an evening to remember.

Youlgrave Guides have celebrated the year in numerous ways: a sleepover at Warwick Castle, taking part in the international camp 'Peak 2010' at Chatsworth and joining with about 900 other girls and leaders for a County Celebration at Lea Green were three memorable events. The Guides have had the chance to meet other Guides (and Scouts) from all over the world, to try a huge range of activities from high ropes and climbing, canoeing and raft building to reikki and international crafts, dance and drama. All have tried something new and challenging.

One of our senior section members was selected to join as a volunteer at 'The Young Women's Forum' for a few days in October in Oxfordshire. About 300 young women from 145 countries joining together to discuss and take action on the Millennium Development Goals, a series of eight time-bound targets covering key areas such as "universal education" and "maternal health" which are all pivotal to combating extreme poverty. However, many of these targets are currently not on course and will not be achieved if real action isn't taken. This shows one of the ways Guiding has moved on over the last 100 years.

Three of the older Guides joined in with a region water weekend at Trent Lock where they enjoyed canoeing, sailing raft building and generally getting wet. We enter a team of four girls in the Kinder Challenge, a competition run by Derbyshire scouts where the teams have to walk over a course of about 10 miles over difficult terrain. Youlgrave Guides became the first team of Guides to complete the course, not bad considering two of them were only 10 years old!

The main event for the unit at the moment is making a celebratory DVD, looking at the Guiding memories of women from the village who have been Guides either here or elsewhere. We are extremely grateful to those who have been or have agreed to be interviewed and share their experiences with us. We are still keen to find out more about the history of the 1st Youlgrave Guide Unit and would

be interested to hear from anyone with information. We are also keen to see and, with permission, reproduce photos of Guiding here in the village. In particular, there is a picture in the 'Spirit of Youlgrave Book' of some Guides by the Reading Room around the time of King George V's jubilee. If anyone has any information on this please could you help us. We have been very lucky to have been awarded a Heritage Lottery Grant for this project and will be inviting everyone to the Village Hall in Spring 2011 for the Premiere. (Contact Penny on 636125.)

As Guiding begins the next 100 years, so the lives and challenges of today's girls are continuously changing. In our unit our challenge is to keep up with these young people and to keep the ethos of Guiding alive and relevant for the next generation and beyond.

Christmas Child Shoe Box Appeal

Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: October 2010

October came in with a real mixture of summer and autumn weather. Glorious sunshine on the second was followed by torrential rain on the third. I saw my last flock of swallows and martins over the village on 27 September, though I saw a flock at Monyash on 2 October.

A very fat hedgehog was very active in the garden up to 15 October, making the closing of our gates impossible on one occasion and driving down the drive difficult more than once as we didn't want to run it over! It seemed to be interested in the fallen apples, presumably because of the slugs that were enjoying them.

On the second I saw a kingfisher, three dippers and a grey wagtail in the Dale, but had to wait until Lathkill Dale before I saw a dabchick. There was an interesting report from Coldwell End of tadpoles not turning into frogs. On the Wildlife Area below the children's playground on Alport Lane, there were still three species of flowers in bloom on the 15th, together with funnel and boletus fungi. Hay rattle seed has been sown in two close mown rectangles to help control the rougher grasses and give more delicate wild flowers a better chance. These seeds need to be frosted before germination so the timing was rather good. Inspection of the bird boxes showed two probably successful nests, but no activity at all in the other eight. Two of last year's successful boxes had been badly pecked by woodpeckers and will need metal plates.

I cut my lawns for the last time, I hope, on the 15th. The 16th was a

glorious day, starting with the first proper frost. In the Manifold valley I saw my first redwings of the winter, small tortoiseshell and small copper butterflies and was able to pick enough sloes for two pints of sloe gin.

The planet Jupiter has been very obvious in the sky throughout the month. It has tracked across the moon and is now well to the right. You can see a line of three or so moons with binoculars. There was a brilliant moon and heavy frost on the night of the 24th/25th and I saw a tawny owl, very close, while driving along Alport Dale. This morning, the 25th, I saw fieldfare at Piccory Corner.

There were sparrows, blue, great and coal tits and green finches in good numbers on the bird table with dunnoek and robin scavenging underneath. Any observations would be very welcome for next month's article, particularly sightings of redwing and fieldfare around the village, kingfisher, dabchick, dipper, water vole and grey wagtail in the Dale, birds of prey or anything else of interest.
