# George Norman Wilson (1925-2011) OBE DL

Norman Wilson was born in Youlgrave, just 100 yards from the house where he and his wife, Jan, lived all their married life and where they brought up their two children, Genevieve and Ralph. Norman was hugely knowledgeable about his village and indeed his county, an encyclopaedia of information on everything from geology and history through to politics and people. His contribution spanned many levels as it did many decades, but he never lost sight of the importance of his home community.

After a short course at Queen's University, Belfast, Norman volunteered for aircraft duties in the RAF in 1944. He trained in Britain and the USA, then after leaving the Service for a few years returned to flying with the outbreak of war in Korea. In 1954 his single-jet engine fighter crashed on take-off and he was seriously injured. After he was well enough to be discharged from the Service he returned to Youlgrave to convalesce, which in Norman's case meant getting stuck into community work. He joined the parish council and before long his aptitude and energy saw him rise swiftly through the ranks of local government. His subsequent record of public service over the next 40 years was simply outstanding.

He was an elected Member of Bakewell Rural District Council (the predecessor of Derbyshire Dales District Council) for eight years. He also served on Derbyshire County Council for 36 continuous years, still the longest term of any Member, and also held the unique record of twice being its Leader (1967-69 and 1977-81). In 1968 he instituted the first-ever County Council



Civic Service – now a mainstay of the local authority's calendar – and of course made sure that the great and the good from around the county came to Youlgrave's All Saints Church and took refreshments afterwards in the Village Hall. Norman was also a County Magistrate between 1967-73 and later was awarded the ceremonial title of Deputy Lieutenant for the County of Derbyshire.

At more or less the same time, and for three decades, Norman was a Member of the Peak District National Park Authority, then known as the Peak Park Joint Planning Board, and its Chairman from 1977-81.

But Norman was also busy on a regional level, for instance as Chairman of the East Midlands Standing Council of Planning Authorities, and held several national positions. He was President of the British Stone Federation and a Member of the Executive Committee of

the Association of County Councils. In 1996 he was awarded an OBE for services to local government and national parks.

#### Community commitment

It's easy to imagine that Norman's day to day energies would almost totally be taken up by his work for the County, National Park or elsewhere. But he felt a deep commitment to Youlgrave and its people and he gave his support to countless village groups. He was a Parish Councillor, Director of Youlgrave Waterworks, the President of the Youlgrave Branch of the Royal British Legion and Chairman of Youlgrave Welldressers. Indeed, his involvement with welldressing stretched almost four decades. He worked on Jim Shimwell's Holywell, coming along each year with his own particular stool and bag of specialist tools (many of them adapted, it was thought, from his time studying medicine as a young man). He worshipped in the village his whole life, attending Sunday School at the Wesleyan Reform Chapel before being asked to sing in the Church choir at All Saints - his voice was that good - and becoming the Morning Reader.

Norman was also a lynchpin behind the Village Hall and in 1962 wrote and produced the first-ever Youlgrave Pantomime ('Babes in the Wood') in order to raise funds for the hall's muchneeded renovation. It didn't take long for it to become a regular fixture in the social calendar. Norman wrote and produced the first five pantomimes, deliberately weaving in scenes set in rich Derbyshire dialect to delight the local audience and no doubt puzzle the odd visitor. Fittingly, his wife, Jan, took over this role in 1977 and for the next 32 years wrote and produced what has

become not just the longest-running but also one of the greatest of Derbyshire village institutions. Norman continued to support Jan, producing the posters for each production and as President of the Village Hall.

Norman was an effective communicator and an accomplished author. He wrote an authoritative account of Youlgrave's long and proud history of welldressing ('tapdressing' as he preferred to call it). He also researched and wrote the Bugle's special commemorative publication that looked back at the lives of Youlgrave men and women in the Second World War; and he co-wrote the definitive and highly acclaimed account of the Mawstone Mine Disaster.

#### Family man

Norman was also a proud and caring family man, an inspiration for Ralph and Genevieve as they grew up in Youlgrave. Despite his disability, he led them on 'scoots' out and about the local countryside, often stopping his mobility scooter to chat to friends and neighbours along the way. He could turn his hand to making anything in his workshop in the cellar; and although coming to computers relatively late in life, he soon outstripped his children in computer know how and could be found expertly editing his home-shot films. He was an expert teacher who, according to Genevieve, taught her and her brother everything they needed to know about rawle plugs, foraging in hedgerows, the importance of doing a job properly and the conditions required for fog!

Norman was an inspirational character in so many different ways and made an exceptional contribution to public life – both on the wider stage and here in Youlgrave.

# A tribute to Norman Wilson and Malcolm Nix

**Norman Wilson** was not only a dedicated Welldresser, who worked on Holywell for over 40 years, but an archivist and author who documented the development of welldressing and the influence that Youlgrave has on the art. Norman chaired the organisation for 36 years, stepping down in 2000.

Malcolm Nix designed the Fountain welldressing between 1977-89. Here he continued a tradition of innovation. Under him, our work was always led by the design. We constantly explored the use of new materials to give the precise effect that Malcolm was looking for. Anyone who worked on the Fountain well at that time will tell you of late nights splitting straw with scissors or placing individual butter cup petals on the clay.

His inspiration came from many sources. His 1978 design featured Samson and the lion. It was bordered by a temple complete with cracks which, as the week progressed, became more pronounced as the clay dried out. In 1986 using the words 'To set at liberty those who are oppressed' (Luke 4.18) his design depicted a prisoner of conscience, in celebration of 25 years of Amnesty International. A figure lays slumped over a desk, his Picasso-like face broken and tear stained, above is a bird-cage symbolising the denied freedom. Malcolm's designs were always passionate.

Ironically Malcolm is also remembered for a Fountain design that wasn't his. To celebrate 150 years of 'modern' Welldressing, Malcolm approached renowned and respected artist John Piper to design the Fountain Well. So it was that in 1979 we executed one of the most striking designs ever to grace the village.

Malcolm Nix was an artisan craftsman. There was very little that he could not turn his hands to and the quality of his work can be clearly seen in the house that he restored on Bankside. In retirement he moved to northern France.

A private memorial will be held on 20 March at the Showroom Cinema in Sheffield.

#### **NEWS IN BRIEF**

#### **Community transport donation**

Youlgrave Parish Council has donated £150 to Bakewell and Eyam Community Transport (BECT) in recognition of their ongoing good work in the village, especially the services they provide for older residents. BECT currently provides over 3,000 passenger journeys a year for people in Youlgrave, helping them with trips to shops, medical appointments and so on. BECT Chief Executive, Edwina Edwards, told the Bugle: "Although Bakewell and Eyam Community Transport receive some funding from Derbyshire County Council we are always fundraising. We are extremely grateful for the financial support of Parish Councils such as Youlgrave as this allows us to make up the shortfall. The generous donation enables us provide an excellent service for the people of Youlgrave."

#### Post Office prospects rosy...

As the Bugle went to print the future of Youlgrave Post Office looked much brighter, with Post Office Ltd giving their formal approval to proposals to relocate the business in new village premises, subject to final checks. The present post office will remain open for the time being. Full details in the next issue of the Bugle.

## ... but fish and chips finished

The Happy Plaice mobile fish and chip van is no longer visiting Youlgrave on a weekly basis. Proprietor Paul Else said that after the cost of fuel and staffing had been deducted the business was making a loss visiting Youlgrave, and he regretted that he had no choice but to pull the service. He thanked his Youlgrave customers and said that he was still available for one-off events.

# New community fruit orchard takes shape

Youlgrave is predicted to be a little bit more fruity in 2011, with the arrival of a Community Fruit Orchard.

Following an evening presentation in the Farmyard last year on the benefits of growing your own fruit by Lynne Thornley, a retired RHS Lecturer from Broomfield Agricultural College, we were inspired to establish a local community orchard to create a supply of fresh, local and seasonal fruit.

We share a plot with the Youlgrave Bee group on the Parish Council allotments at Coldwell End, and over a few late summer evenings last year we cleared the site and dug out a bed which this year will be home to a selection of soft fruit bushes. We also plan a modest collection of apple, plum and other traditional orchard trees on the plot.

As the nights drew in, activity turned to planning the next year and

fundraising and we were delighted when our recent application to the Derbyshire Community Foundation for funds to purchase trees, bushes and basic tools was granted in full.

Funds are only part of the story, of course, and our secret weapon is the time and manpower donated by our team of friendly volunteers. Gardeners will know that February and March are the months to get new fruit trees into the ground and we shall be busy over

the next few weekends doing exactly that. Extra hands and new faces are always warmly welcomed and if you'd like to join us to help out.

# Youlgrave Guides film wins Oscar (we wish!)

You are all invited to the world premiere of 'Youlgrave Guides - Who are We' on Friday 25th March, 7.30pm, Youlgrave Village Hall, FREE!

At the beginning of 2010 the Guides had a discussion about how our unit was going to celebrate the Guiding Centenary and so the idea of making a DVD was born. We wanted to try and create an image of where 1st Youlgrave Guide Unit has come from, but also capture the memories of women in the village who have been a Guide either here or elsewhere. We wanted to show how Guiding has changed and what the girls get up to nowadays.

After a great deal of form-filling (thanks to the Bugle Editor for his help with this) we were finally awarded a Heritage Lottery Fund Grant which made it possible. We have been able to buy some great equipment and to employ a fantastic couple of professionals to work alongside the Guides. GlassBall Art Projects have taught the girls how to use the cameras to produce over 50 hours of film, plus they taught the Guides interview techniques so they could interview 20 people - aged 11 to 96! We spent several evenings at the Level Centre Studio at Rowsley where all the girls had a go at editing and realised just how difficult it was going to be to cut it



down to make a 30 m i n u t e film!

One of o u r younger leaders has written the the me music and our very talented group of girls have recorded it. We



have worked with Derbyshire Guide Archivist to learn more about Guiding history, but most information has come from our interviewees — so many tales and stories of their time in Guiding.

The end result is a film which our unit is very proud of and wants to share with everyone. The 'Premiere' will take place on Friday 25th March in the village hall. It will be preceded by some entertainment from the Guides and refreshments will be served. The evening is free but tickets are required and available from Penny McCloy 636125.

We would like to thank everyone who has helped to make this possible, especially the ladies who agreed to be interviewed and also the Heritage

# **Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: February**

My appeals for sightings of waxwings in the village have at last been successful. There was a flock back in the cold weather, so Youlgrave didn't get left out. A solitary collared dove egg was found at Coldwell End. A sign of Spring or just an incompetent bird?

The Bee group honeybees have been visiting my winter heathers and have been bringing in vellow pollen back to the hives. If you see honeybees in the garden please let me know. On the 10th I walked through the Playing Field Wildlife Area, down to Alport and up the river as far as the third dam. Groundsel, dandelion, snowdrops, chickweed, hairy bittercress and spring whitlow grass were all in flower. The last two are tiny, four-petalled white flowers and there were lots on the Playing Field car park. Hairy bittercress has a divided leaf and spring whitlow grass has a simple leaf. If you see hazel catkins or lamb's tails it's worth looking closely at the twigs to find the tiny red female flowers that will form the hazel nuts. The catkins are pollen-producing male

flowers only. I saw greenfinch, blackbird, house sparrow, jackdaw, collared dove, wood pigeon, great, blue and coal tits, Canada geese, robin, magpie, chaffinch, moorhen, mallard, wren, dipper, coot, dabchick and starlings (small flock) in that order. There can't be many villages where you can see dippers so close to home. Goldfinches and bullfinches have been common in the garden and there was a redwing on next door's lawn for several days. Large pheasants have been frequent visitors and I have had one siskin on the feeder. These are quite unusual visitors to our garden. Further afield I saw a red kite on Beeley Moor on the 16th.

Last month I described how to use Orion as a guide to finding other constellations. If you follow the line of the belt upwards and to the right to the Pleiades and keep going you will come to the large 'W' of Cassiopiea.

Please keep the sightings coming in.

# Youlgrave Bee-Friends



# AGE Helping you prepare for the Digital TV Switchover

Age UK Derby & Derbyshire has begun working with other charities and voluntary groups to prepare older people for the switchover, which starts in our region on 30 March 2011. The appointment has been made on behalf of Digital UK, the independent body in charge of switchover. Age UK (formerly Age Concern and Help the Aged) is the largest independent local charity providing direct services to older people and is mobilising local charities across the Derbyshire area to hold events and presentations, giving advice on how to switch over to digital TV.

#### So what is the digital TV switchover?

TV across the UK is going digital. The existing analogue TV signal will be switched off and replaced with a new, stronger digital TV signal.

#### Why is switchover happening?

Switchover is happening so that Freeview services (digital TV through an aerial) can be extended to people who cannot currently get them, including those who receive their signal from a relay transmitter – like many of us in Youlgrave who get our TV pictures via the Stanton Moor transmitter.

Digital UK will soon be holding road shows across the Central TV Region to provide further face-to-face advice for anyone who needs it. The Switchover Help Scheme, run by the BBC, has also

been set up to make it easier for older and disabled people to switch to digital TV and they will be writing to eligible people in the area. People are eligible for the scheme if they are aged 75 years or more, have lived in a care home for six months or more, get (or could get) certain disability benefits, or are registered blind or partially sighted.

The Help Scheme provides older and disabled people with all they need to switch one TV to digital, such as easy to use equipment, installation by an approved installer and a 12-month aftercare service. There is an allinclusive cost of £40 for the standard option, or for people on certain incomerelated benefits, it's free, For more information call free on 0800 40 85 900 or visit www.helpscheme.co.uk

#### Support for local community groups

Support to Groups includes free briefing sessions to enable your staff and volunteers to feel confident to give switchover and switchover Help Scheme advice to people they support. The Small Grants Programme funds events, activities and initiatives that get switchover and the Help Scheme information to as many people as possible. #### Village Market Recipe Corner

At February's Village Market the Produce Stall had lots of locally grown Jerusalem Artichokes for sale and purchasers were asking for recipes. Here is one which you may like to try.

#### Provencal Jerusalem Artichokes

- 450g Jerusalem artichokes scrubbed and cut into chunks
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 150ml white wine
- A handful of chopped black olives
- 1 tsp dried thyme
- 1 clove garlic crushed and chopped
- 1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley
- 2 tbsp breadcrumbs black pepper

Put the artichokes, oil, wine, olives, thyme and garlic into a saucepan. Pour in enough water to cover all the ingredients, put the lid on and simmer very gently for 25 minutes. Remove the lid and boil away the liquid until you are left with an oily sauce. Add the parsley and breadcrumbs and, stirring from time to time, let them absorb the remaining liquid and brown.

Good warm as an accompaniment, but better eaten at room temperature; a tasty lunch dish with a tomato salad, bread and cheese.
