The new landlord of Youlgrave's Bull's Head Hotel is Mark Brosnan (pictured right), who is running the business with wife Linda and daughter Sharon. Extensive refurbishment and redecoration has already taken place, including new upholstery, and future plans involve converting the B&B rooms to en-suite and renovating the upstairs function room so that it can host regular live entertainment. Mark also says that the room will be available for free hire by local community groups. Improvements to the kitchen are almost complete, after which the pub will offer a full and varied menu, with as much produce as possible sourced locally. Delight and relief as future of Youlgrave Post Office secured

It has been formally announced that Youlgrave Post Office will be re-locating to Parkers stores on Church Street, Youlgrave. Post Office Ltd, which is currently going through the formalities of consulting on the branch re-location, says it hopes that the switch of premises will take place in early June.

Roger Easton is retiring after 14 years as Youlgrave's Sub Postmaster and the village post office will cease operating from its present location on Fountain Square. Instead, the new post office will be incorporated into Parkers shop and Andrew Parker will become Youlgrave's

new Sub Postmaster. He told the Bugle that he will be finishing the meat side of his business on 14 May, but he will try to keep the shop open as much as possible during the re-fitting and renovations.

Parish Council Chairman, Andrew McCloy, said he was both delighted and relieved that Youlgrave was retaining its post office. "It's good news for the long term future of our community," he said. "I urge everyone to continue using our post office, as well as our other village shop, garage and pubs. Once they disappear they seldom come back, so it's essential we support them."

Your help is needed to stop illegal HGV movements

Youlgrave residents have expressed concern at the recent increase in HGVs exceeding 7.5t travelling through the village.

If you see a large vehicle that you believe is over this limit immediately inform the Police Call Centre on 0345 1233333 and report the registration number and the direction of travel. This is important if the vehicle is heading up through the village in the direction of Long Rake, as this may well be its destination, and it gives officers the chance to speak to the driver at this location and deal with them appropriately. This will have a more immediate effect than the registered keeper receiving a letter some days later and will make the driver think twice about using the village as a short cut, or blindly following SatNav.

However, not all large goods vehicles are over 7.5t and indeed some vehicles that are over ARE allowed access if delivering/collecting within the village.

A vehicle accessing Long Rake from the west does not fall within this remit as the approved route to and from the location is via the A515 and NOT via the A6.

One way of deciding whether a HGV is over 7.5t is if the vehicle has more than two axles (or sets of wheels). Should you see a vehicle of this description passing through the village towards the A6 this can still be reported, but it is unlikely that the vehicle will be apprehended at the time. However, the registered keeper will still receive a warning letter from Trading Standards should the vehicle prove to be over the 7.5t limit.

Your assistance is appreciated in trying to keep Youlgrave safe and HGV free.

Youlgrave Parish Council Chairman's Annual Report

In recent months the Government has made much about promoting Localism, empowering communities and the notion of the Big Society. Reflecting on the activities of the Parish Council over the last 12 months, I would like to highlight all the hard work that has gone on behind the scenes to make sure that Youlgrave continues to be a thriving and attractive place.

Perhaps most visibly, the Parish Council manages the playing fields on Alport Lane, one of the largest village sports grounds in the whole of the Derbyshire Dales. We arrange the mowing and other maintenance tasks, look after the pavilion and hire it and the grounds out to local football, cricket and bowls teams. The fields are also regularly used by the school and for community events like the Carnival, plus we have encouraged the development of a wildlife site and are looking to enhance the range of play and exercise facilities.

At the other end of the village the Parish Council looks after the Coldwell End car park and toilet block, the maintenance of which is almost entirely paid for by visitors via an honesty box. Next to it are the allotments, another key responsibility of the Parish Council. These well-used plots have been enhanced over the last 12 months by new bee hives and a small community orchard, thanks to the hard work and enthusiasm of new village groups and which the Parish Council is pleased to support. Elsewhere, we pay for the annual upkeep of 19 benches dotted around the parish for the public to use.

But in addition to playing fields, car parks and allotments, the Parish Council also does a lot of unheralded work behind the scenes which helps bind the

community together and improves the way we live. This last year, for instance, we extended our public liability insurance policy to cover Youlgrave Carnival and Welldressing, giving full protection to these two important community events – and in one fell swoop saving both organisations large sums of money. We have badgered the District Council into providing more regular and effective street cleans; we have taken senior County Council representatives up to Long Rake to show them the dangers that local residents face when negotiating that sometimes dangerous stretch of road; and we have told the Police that HGVs thundering illegally through our village cannot be tolerated any longer.

The Parish Council also takes principled decisions which, although not always universally popular, it believes are in the community's long term interest. Our planning application to build eight local needs affordable houses off Conksbury Lane was based on a proven need and is intended to provide attractive, energy efficient homes for local people. We gave considerable thought to both the application and the wider subject, and although I acknowledge that some residents don't back the specific proposals, the Parish Council remains determined to do all it can to ensure that our young people and families stay in the village and we maintain a healthy and balanced community that embraces all ages and backgrounds.

Although we kept the Precept unchanged this year, we made another small donation to Bakewell and Eyam

Community Transport in recognition of the service they provide to our residents, in particular our elderly ones. We also gave £100 towards a digital projector bought by and for the community and we continue to be an annual sponsor of the Bugle. The Parish Council also lent its support to a Village Plan project to tidy up (and in a couple of instances carefully repair) Youlgrave's historic well tap sites, plus a new interpretation panel and notice board outside the Reading Room.

The Parish Council continues to have close contact with the Peak District National Park Authority. We are a statutory consultee on all planning applications made in this parish and try to respond positively on behalf of local residents – although how much notice the planners take of our comments is sometimes open to question. More positively, we participated in their annual Parishes Day once more, engaged fully in the Conservation Area Appraisal process, and via the Village Plan group we hope to have a continuing dialogue with the National Park and other local authorities about future planning and decisions that affect the village and

wider area.

Finally, I would like to personally thank every one of Youlgrave's parish councillors for their hard work and commitment over the last year. They give their time and energy for free – from unpaid working parties on the playing field to long evenings poring over figures and paperwork – so that Youlgrave remains a progressive, respected and successful parish. They deserve recognition and your full support.

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Harnessing the power of the sun

A growing number of local householders are now fitting solar roof installations. Sustainable Youlgrave's **John Youatt** explains what it involves and why he and Jean have decided to take the plunge.

What do terms like solar thermal and photovoltaics really mean?

Solar thermal is the capture of heat into fluids in tubes placed on roofs transferred to a tank. *Solar electric* or *photovoltaics* (PV) is the conversion of sunlight and daylight (refracted sunlight) into direct electric current (DC), through silica cells in panels on roofs or on the ground. 'On-grid', the current is then converted into alternating current (AC) at 240v, to be used on site, with any spare sold to the national grid at a guaranteed price. 'Off grid', the direct current can be fed to batteries.

Heat pumps and air conditioners are compressors (like fridges) that squeeze the heat out of air, ground or water to give you hot air or hot water at up to 55 degrees, to heat domestic hot water or central heating systems (or cool air!).

The purchase of any solar energy system is an investment in the future that demands (for now) a subsidy, either from taxation, or from energy companies. Government ministers decided that energy captured at small scale and locally should be paid for with Feed in Tariffs (FiTs) or with a payment for heat called the Renewable Heat Incentive.

How does it work in practice?

A company with a certificate installs approved panels or a heat pump for you. A Government-backed contract guarantees you a price for every kilowatt you generate and another price on top of that for every kilowatt you sell back. The figures were agreed at a level to make most installations pay back within 8 years, with a 20 or 25 year life (panels and the contract).

Am I allowed to put panels up without planning permission?

Most panels and pumps do not require planning permission. Some cases, such as listed buildings, do require permission.

Do I need a south facing roof?

South facing unshaded roofs at about 30 degrees pitch are ideal for PV or hot water. Another option is to install an array on supports in a field or garden.

Is anyone else doing it in our valley?

John and Judith Orchard in Youlgrave were amongst the first with solar thermal and PV. Peter Cavendish is applying for permission for PV panels on a building in the grounds of a listed building. At least two farmers and four more households are considering, or have ordered, solar PV. There are at least two air source heat pumps and two ground source heat pumps in our valley.

Who will offer impartial advice?

I am happy to advise locally. The Energy Saving Trust and others offer lists of approved products and installers online. The industry is well regulated. There's open competition between suppliers. You can buy with confidence.

How much would an average installation cost and return?

The maximum rate for PV is capped, at 4 kW, at 43.3p per kW plus 3p minimum. Our quote at 17 New Road is just under £12,000 for 3.5 kW (12 Sanyo all black panels). The predicted income, FiTs plus savings, is £1,400 pa, thus paying back the investment in about 8 years.

Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: March

There have been some very interesting bird sightings this month. Grove Place early in the month recorded siskin, redpoll, reed bunting and goldcrest, plus the more usual bullfinch, goldfinch, greenfinch and chaffinch. On the 10th I saw dipper, dabchick, tufted duck and heron in the Dale. The smart yellow wagtails in the Dale are actually grey wagtails; yellow wagtails are even more yellow and more likely to be seen on the higher limestone areas. Three buzzards soared over the village on the 12th. On the 22nd curlew were heard, brimstone and small tortoiseshell butterflies were in the garden and a blackbird was collecting nesting material. On the 23rd I saw fresh water vole poo above the pack horse bridge below Braemar Lane. Has anyone actually seen voles lately? Dunnocks continue to sing and are now joined by chaffinch, wren and robin. Chiffchaffs were heard at Wingerworth on the 24th and I would be very interested in reports for Youlgrave as they are usually the first warbler to arrive

and their "chiff chaff" call is very easy to identify. There have been a couple of mandarin ducks in the Dale. The village bees have been bringing in large quantities of yellow pollen, possibly pussy willow as they have been visiting these, and there were plenty of bees about to hatch. On the 24th I had a reed bunting in the garden. These are a long way from their usual habitat and are very smart with their stripy brown bodies and black heads. On the 25th, five buzzards were soaring and calling over the allotments. Wild flowers are still quite scarce, but red deadnettle, chickweed, hairy bittercress, spring whitlow grass and dandelion are all flowering. Lesser celandines are starting to bloom, which are a lovely sign of spring unless you are too proud of your lawn.

My thanks to all contributors. Reports of water vole, dippers nesting and chiffchaff song, please! But of course any wildlife notes are very welcome.

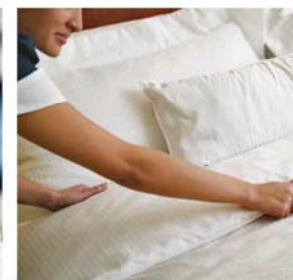
Yesterday an author came in. He told us lots of stories. It was great.

The Year of the Bee

Swarm watch

The Youlgrave Beekeepers are, like their bees, beginning to stir as spring gathers momentum. Our task over the next few months will be to check the hives at frequent intervals to make sure the bees are healthy and happy and to encourage them not to swarm. Like most of nature's patterns, however, bees seek to reproduce themselves by moving around and in the spring they produce new queen bees and the hive full of bees will split in two – half following a queen to a new home, the other half remaining put. A bee swarm is not usually dangerous as the bees fill themselves up with honey for their move and don't usually feel the need to attack anyone. However, if you see a swarm hanging like a bag of bees on a branch or clothes line or other settling place, please phone a member of the bee group (Ian Weatherley 636350, Judith Orchard 630202, Jeni Edwards 636550) who will come and collect it safely.

Bee Friends

Nearly all the flower seeds have now been sold. The last few will be at the Village Market on 9 April. The Village Market Produce Stall will, hopefully, have bee friendly plants for sale over the coming markets. If you have a surplus of seedlings or cuttings please bring them along before 10am on the morning of the market and they can be sold (this applies to all seedlings and cuttings, whether bee friendly flowers, or vegetables or others). Next step in the Year of the Bee is the Carnival. There will be a competition and prize for the best container of bee-friendly flowers, so start thinking about what you could enter. If you could make your container with wheels (old pram, wheelbarrow, etc) it might take part in the Carnival procession, otherwise they will be displayed on the field. More details to follow.

Local businesses receive prestigious award

Two Youlgrave businesses have been awarded the Environmental Quality Mark by the Peak District National Park Authority.

Woodturning at Christmas Cottage and April Cottage Holiday Accommodation had to satisfy a number of

criteria to show that they support sustainability within the Peak District. For Woodturning at Christmas Cottage, this included ensuring that native wood was sourced within the Peak Park and that products are displayed locally. For April Cottage, it entailed providing recycling facilities, recommending clients walk from the door to cut down car use or use the bus to Bakewell, eat at the three village pubs, stressing that local produce is used in their kitchens and making them aware that the butchers sell locally-sourced products and the post office has a supply of



walking guides. Efforts have been made to make sure the facilities are as 'green' as possible, for example keeping packaging to a minimum and using low energy light bulbs to fit with a 'reduce, reuse and recycle' environment awareness message.

"We are very pleased to have been presented with these awards", said Matthew Lovell, who submitted both applications. "This is a fairly new initiative, and we are keen to be seen to be supporting the Peak Park in this."

The award runs for two years, after which time a new application must be submitted.
