The Year of the Bee - continued

Youlgrave Bee Group has just completed it's first year of bee-keeping and I guess the thing we have learned most is how much there is to learn! We, or rather the bees, have managed to produce some honey this summer. It was for sale at the Carnival and the



August Village Market, but in limited quantities: that was partly due to the weather and partly due to inexperienced bee-keeping. Hopefully, next year with more of the village growing bee-friendly plants and more of us gaining experience, as well as more of our members obtaining their own bees, there should be more honey... The end product is very much a partnership between beefriendly villagers and bee keepers.

Talking of next year – although I get cross when charities send their Christmas catalogues early, I have to ask you to think about next spring right now, because now is the time to plan and plant the 2012 early food for bees. Bulbs such as crocuses are good, as well as wallflowers and early flowering perennials such as pulmonaria. To check on whether the plants you are planting are bee friendly look at the list on our blog at www.youlgravebees.org.

And finally – calling all bee-friends – there is an invitation for you to get more involved now and in the future. If you would like to come and observe while members of the bee group do one of their regular inspections, you are very welcome. Dorothy Sandell (1923 – 2011)

Dorothy died at Walton Hospital in July after a short illness. She was born in the cottage behind the George Hotel where she spent the rest of her, nearly 89 years – and as her parents could trace their Youlgrave (Dorothy disliked the 'greave' version) ancestry back several generations she has always been a Youlgrave person through and through. Dorothy Wardle, as she was until her marriage, was the youngest of four

siblings, all of who spent the majority of their very long lives in the village. Charles and Harold have died over the past 12 years and her devoted sister Marie survives her and is now 93.

Dorothy, often known as Dot, left Youlgrave school at the age of 14 and worked at Orme's shop in Bakewell. In her youth she enjoyed socialising, a bit of flirting (by her own admission) and a lot of dancing, something which was to remain a passion for the rest of her

life. In fact, dances played a large part in her life until her health failed in the last few years and she was regarded as very talented, something which she would never admit to! After World War Two broke out she was directed under war work legislation to Friden brickworks where the work was harder and dirtier but her pay doubled. The dances continued throughout the conflict and were improved by the influx of soldiers from far and wide.

In 1946 Dorothy married Harry, a 'foreigner' from Bakewell who had served as a royal marine commando. The wedding was at Youlgrave parish church with the reception at the George Hotel.

They moved into the cottage with Dorothy's mum and in 1947 a son, Trevor, was born. The home became a haven for Trevor and all his pals and they had a lovely and free and easy childhood with Dorothy and Harry supporting all their activities.

Harry was a friend of Norman Wilson and when Norman inaugurated the village hall pantomimes in the early sixties both Harry and Dorothy became very involved

> in these productions. Harry usually took on prominent roles, often alongside Tom Rhodes ('Mighty Fine') but Dorothy did what she liked best and stayed in the background beavering away and making the costumes. This later continued with the Hollywell Players, whose first was production Hobson's Choice. Dorothy never did like publicity and would work

tirelessly at everything she did but would be 'off like a shot' if the spotlight moved in her direction.

Dorothy's other great enthusiasm apart from dancing was sewing and dressmaking and she did countless small jobs for local people, often without charge. She also made beautiful costumes and on several occasions produced top of the range wedding outfits for the bride and bridesmaids.

Harry died in 1974 and Dorothy had to rebuild her life, something she did with great courage. She was a long term member of the Mother's Union and an even longer term member of the WI, often attending events and conferences. Early

in her marriage she worked as caretaker at the Reading Room and she also helped Harry with his chimney sweeping business (on the bookkeeping and admin side) as well as doing her sewing. Later she became both caretaker and head cook at the school, where she got to know many generations of children, many of who remained friends for life.

After 'retirement' at 65 she spent several happy years childminding for her friends Tracey and Martin and this close friendship continued when they moved to Cheltenham. Later she worked as a housekeeper at Abbeyfield, now Granby House, and filled in as a paper deliverer and a deliverer of meals-on-wheels (although the latter was voluntary). She was probably older than many people she was helping! She enjoyed cooking and was famous for her sausage rolls and scones, which she never pronounced as 'scons'. Somewhere in the middle of all this she also delivered the post.

In the last four years she suffered from anxiety and depression and life became a trial for her. She loved the safety of her cottage and she got by with the loving help of so many friends in the village who took her out and invited her to events. She liked going to WI events even though she could contribute less and less and she enjoyed the Tuesday Group at Middleton, as well as shopping trips on the community bus, trips with Granby House and also Darby and Joan. She and her sister Marie were devoted to each other and supported each other faithfully. She loved watching TV and in particular 'Strictly come Dancing'.

Dorothy was a friendly, helpful and down to earth person who would help anyone and was always generous. Despite her talents she was very modest and would never boast. She will be very much missed by her family and friends. A true Youlgrave lady.

Dorothy & Youlgrave Village Hall

Dorothy had been one of the many helpers in the late 1950s early 60s who had helped to get the hall cleaned up after it had been refurbished. She then went on to become Norman's Wardrobe Mistress for the concerts which helped to raise funds for the hall and also for the first pantomimes which he wrote. She continued to be involved with the pantomime costumes until about three years ago – what a wonderful record!

She was a most enthusiastic member of the WI, and again helped for many years with the annual Well Dressing Teas, the profits from which again went to the upkeep of the Village Hall.

The donations in her memory, totalling £600, by her wish have also gone to the Village Hall, a last wonderful gift for which we are very grateful. We shall never forget her.

BUGLE LETTERS: REACTION TO VILLAGE GREEN APPLICATION

Dear Editor
It is with dismay that I read the article in the July/August issue of The Bugle entitled 'Protecting Youlgrave's Green Spaces'.

To the best of my knowledge the field known as 'The Alley' has been privately owned for successive generations of the Upton family. It is only thanks to their generosity and good grace that residents local to the field have been able to use it, with their permission, for various activities as listed in the above mentioned article.

The article written in the Bugle seems to me to confuse two distinctly separate issues:

- 1. The social housing application.
- 2. The need for a village green.

If I may, I would like to tackle these two issues in order.

Social Housing: As the Bugle itself states planning permission has been granted for the social housing to be built. The fact that a small group of local residents are now proposing the try and change the categorisation of this field to a 'Village Green' seems to be fuelled more by sour grapes than a genuine desire to set aside a field for the general use and enjoyment of residents of the village.

As far as I can recall the 'need' for a new village green has not been raised until this so-called committee decided that this is the best hope to stop the housing development. Unless I am mistaken the planning process has run its course and permission has been granted. Whether you are in favour or against the fact is that we live in a democracy and the democratic decision was to allow the housing.

Need for a new Village Green: We already have two open green spaces within the village at the playing fields and Coldwell End car park, both equipped with play areas for children. Where, therefore, does the need for a 'Village Green' come from?

According to the article in the Bugle there is a need for a village green because people need space to "run", "walk dogs", "walk" and "sledge".

Is the 'Alley Committee' and Mr Wilson seriously arguing that living where we do there is a lack of space and opportunity to do all of the above without the need to interfere in a landowner's rights to do with his land what he has been legally given permission to do?

For the sake of clarity and so that any inferences and assumptions regarding my motives for writing this can be clarified, I am neither for nor against the social housing. It makes no material difference to me whether social housing is built and, for any that may be wondering, I do have a family connection to the landowner. I have written this letter because it seems inherently wrong that since failing to stop the social housing development a new and somewhat incongruous argument has been put forward.

It sounds too good to be true, but the problem would be upkeep and costs. There would always be maintenance and repair work needed, grass cutting and reseeding (all those vellow patches from dog urine and gouged out areas from quad bikes), dog muck collection would be ongoing, especially when the Council no longer collects from existing bins. So who pays? Hardly the unfortunate present owner! The DDDC and Parish Council are desperately trying to make ever less money stretch ever further, so looking after five extra acres would be an impossibility. Any suggestion that the village's Council Taxes might rise to pay for the proposed new amenity would be met with a very negative response from all residents. Well, not quite all. The residents of Conksbury Avenue are clearly in favour of the common, so a substantial levy from each household might just cover expenses - like those exclusive London squares where the residents pay for the upkeep of the smart, railed-off gardens in the middle. A good solution, don't you think?

The Alley – at what cost? A recent enquiry of the County Council, specifically asking for the cost of processing applications for Village Greens, replied that the average cost to the County Council (and therefore taxpayers) of claims made between 2007 and 2010 is £26,854. Since 1 April 2008 a shocking 23

applications have been made. On eight of these sites planning permission for housing was applied for or indeed already granted. Another cost, perhaps more keenly felt by villagers, is the stress and anxiety placed on friendships and families. It's very difficult not to be involved, especially if you live overlooking the Alley, are a landowner or if you're one of those people wanting to live in your home village.

Private or Association housing? If you're housed by a Housing Association, you know what your rights and responsibilities are as a tenant; that your rent is fair, that your house is (as far as possible) appropriate to your needs and that it's maintained to an acceptable standard. Not all of these things are guaranteed when you're a private tenant. Many people prefer the security of tenure that a Housing Association can offer. As one resident put it, "I'd like to stay in this village but my tenancy agreement only gives me six months notice to quit - which is not a secure position. He's a fantastic landlord - but he might sell!"

What a boon for the village! Q: Who's going to build these houses? A: Any local company that feels able to handle the contract. Local craftsmen are always favoured because they're building with familiar materials, in their own communities. If a larger company gets the contract, they may well need to subcontract chippies, wallers, plumbers, electricians, plasterers, tilers, decorators... Are we ready?



Youlgrave Wildlife Notes for July & August

Birds of all types seem to have had a good season. I have had families of greenfinches, great, blue and coal tits, dunnocks, sparrows and blackbirds in my garden and reports of nuthatch and greater spotted woodpecker families on feeders. It was suggested to me that our swift population was down this year. As we have no actual data from previous

vears asked contributors to do some counting for next year. Swifts verv move fast indeed and the flocks tend to be very spread out so they are not easy to count but several people recorded about 16 birds over the Dale and eight down Conksbury Lane. My biggest



There seem to have been plenty of house martins this year. Numbers seemed to have gone down considerably compared with 30 years ago but do seem to be recovering. If the house martins do decide to nest on your house please feel honoured. I know they make a bit of a mess but you can always scrape it up and put it on the garden. It is also an offence to interfere with the nests so, please, just enjoy them.

I have had reports of second and even third broods of swallows. Other birds

include a redstart down by the swimming pool, a green woodpecker below the Wildlife Area and occasional buzzards.


On 22 July there were 32 species of wildflower in bloom on the Playing Field Wildlife area and 24 on 12 August, I have just started the 'big mow' on the Wildlife Area with sections of lesser interest. The majority of the area will be

I had a very good report and photo of hatching southern hawker dragonflies blue and damselflies from a garden pond off

Coldwell End. I know other small ponds in the village are also excellent for wildlife including newts and any information gratefully received. Butterflies have been plentiful recently with a new hatch of red admirals looking very smart indeed.

I have had a family of hedgehogs coming up my drive into the garden next door to feed and then returning. Please don't just set fire to any piles of wood or vegetation unless you are a partial to roast hedgehog. Dismantle the pile first. My thanks to all contributors. Please

Campaign against 'off-roading' making headway

Off-roading by 4x4s and trail bikes has reached such a pitch in the Peak District that residents all over the Peak Park are saying 'enough is enough'. The Peak District Green Lanes Alliance was set up to do something about it.

Our first target is the Peak Park Authority. Since 2007 it has had the legal power to ban 4x4s and motor bikes wherever they endanger other people or damage the environment. Instead of using these powers, we believe it has allowed off-roading to destroy green lanes all over the Peak District. Rather than banning vehicles, in our view it has wasted time and money trying to monitor and 'manage' them. Meanwhile the damage gets worse.

Two green lanes around Youlgreave are at risk because the off-roaders have claimed them as 'Byways Open to All Traffic'. The first is the route from Over Haddon via Lathkill Dale, Meadow Place Grange and Conksbury at Back Lane. The second is from Dark Lane at Alport and on up towards Norton Barn Farm.

For nearly a year now, the Alliance has been putting intense pressure on the Peak Park to change its tune – with some success. There is now a ban (albeit

temporary) on vehicles on Chapel Gate, near Edale. And at a meeting in July the Peak Park decided it must do more to stop the damage and a full review of its current policy on off-roading is underway.

We are also putting pressure on Derbyshire County Council, the main highway authority in the National Park. Like the PDNPA, it has legal powers to use Traffic Regulation Orders to ban vehicles. Rather than use its powers, it prefers to waste public money on repairs, only to see lanes being rutted again by the off-roaders once repairs are done.

Finally, we are pressing the Police and the Crown Prosecution Service for vigorous action against drivers caught off-roading on lanes where it is already illegal. So far Derbyshire Police have taken a deliberately softly, softly approach. This is giving all the wrong signals to the off-roading community. Between them, PDNPA, Derbyshire County Council and the Police have made the Peak District an off-roading free-for-all for 4x4s and trail bike riders from all over the country.

You can help the campaign to stop the 4x4s and trail bikes by telling the Peak Park off-roading review group how you feel about off-roading and what you want them to do about it. Hansel & Gretel in Youlgrave



What better way to start a review of the London Youth Opera's performance of Humperdinck's Hansel and Gretel, presented in Youlgrave Church on 23 July, than a note from the director: "Hansel and Gretel is about dreams and nightmares, reality and invention and the world through the eyes of two poor, confused, lost children."

It came almost at the end of two weeks of the Buxton Festival, when members of the lamentably small audience could have been excused from feeling that they had had a surfeit of music and drama. But not so. London Youth Opera could hold its own with Buxton. Is this a rave review? Of course it is! They acted and sang with the enthusiasm of youth and the skill of professionals.

In the best traditions of the Brothers Grimm, this is no pretty fairy tale but disturbing juxtaposition of the real world of inadequate parents and the imaginary world of the forest and its terrifying, and potentially murderous, witch. So, though there is a conventional happy ending, one leaves disturbed as well an invigorated.

It is tempting to name one's favourite performers, but unfair, for this is the essentially a team effort from the principals to the chorus, who are also the stage hands. The performance was skilfully but unobtrusively carried along by the conductor and accompanist.

Many members of the group are already very experienced and I hope we shall hear much more of them. I hope also that they will not forget to come back to Youlgrave.
