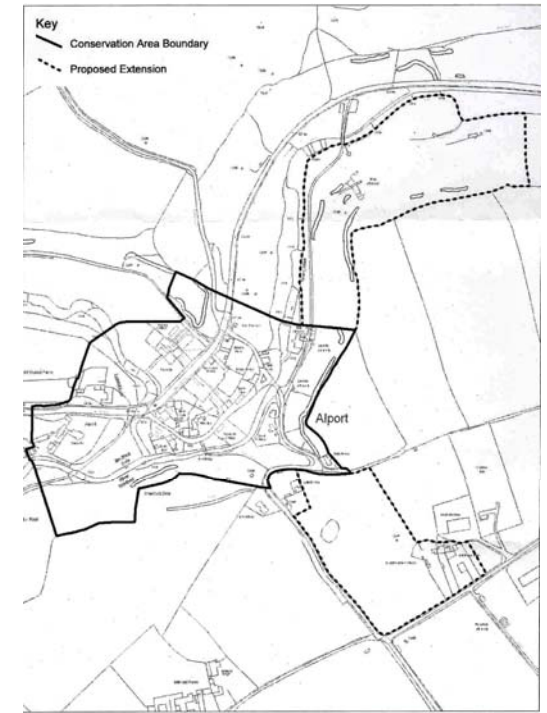
Give your views on historic Alport

The Peak District National Park Authority is reviewing the make-up and scope of the Alport Conservation Area – and it wants your views.

There are over 100 Conservation Areas in the National Park, designated for their special architectural or historic interest and which include the traditional cores of Alport, Middleton by Youlgrave and Youlgrave. Conservation Area status gives added protection to buildings and land in terms of the planning process; but it also means that householders and landowners may be eligible for grants towards the cost of the repair and restoration of external architectural features to buildings and even important stone boundary walls.

The National Park Authority has a duty to periodically review Conservation Areas and, as part of the formal appraisal of the Alport's, two extensions to the boundary are being proposed. The first to the north-east includes the remains of the former Alport Lead Smelt Mill; and the other is to the south-east to take in 1 to 3 Broadmeadow Cottages and Old Forge Farm along Lawns Lane.

Public consultation on the draft plans runs until Friday 13 April. The document can be viewed on-line at www.peakdistrict.gov.uk/living-in/ca/caa/

Youlgrave Parish Council Chairman's Annual Report

The last 12 months have been a period of change and transition for the Parish Council. In May of last year an election to the Parish Council was held and five new councillors were elected, but despite the changes in line-up the commitment, enthusiasm and hard work has continued.

We have been successful in having the Alport Lane playing field designated as an official Queen Elizabeth II Playing Field, which means that the grounds will be held in perpetuity for public recreation and enjoyment. Only a handful in Derbyshire have so far been chosen. Furthermore, we are planning to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee with a public event on the playing field on Sunday 3rd June and we are applying for funding to develop and improve the existing sporting facilities. Our village sporting teams continue to use the playing field year-round, including the successful Youlgrave United football team who last season won both their league and a cup competition.

During the last year the Parish Council actively supported the relocation of the village post office to Parkers shop. We are delighted that its immediate future has been secured and wish to thank Roger Easton for over a decade's service as Youlgrave's subpostmaster.

We continue to manage the popular and well-tended allotments at Coldwell End and we endeavour to keep the rents affordable and encourage self-sufficiency. We support local needy causes which benefit villagers, making small annual donations to Bakewell & Eyam Community Transport and Air

Ambulance. The Carnival and Well Dressing committees remain in the parish council's jurisdiction, so that we can reduce their overheads by covering their activities under our insurance policy.

This year we have once more kept the Precept unchanged, and in fact because Youlgrave's taxable base (ie the number of properties eligible for Council Tax) has slightly altered we are in fact charging you less!

Although our own powers are relatively limited, an important aspect of what we do is to liaise with the District and County Councils over their services to the village. For instance, during the last year we received complaints by residents on Mawstone Lane about vehicles speeding into the village past their properties and endangering the families that live there. We invited officers from the Highways Authority (Derbyshire County Council) for a site visit to examine the issues and meet local people, with the result that a new village gateway, road signs and markings have been introduced to make it clear that drivers are entering the village and should slow down.

Planning issues continue to give the Parish Council cause for concern. The Peak District National Park Authority is obliged to consult us on planning applications made within our parish, and although they don't have to follow our recommendations they should take our views into consideration when making decisions. Over the last year parish councils generally have been encouraged to make their consultation responses clearer and more specific, so that the planners understand any

relevant local issues. However, despite doing just this we have seen a steady number of decisions taken that are wholly contrary to our recommendations, and while we recognise that decisions will not always go our way there seems little evidence in the decision letters or committee minutes to suggest that Youlgrave Parish Council's view counts for much. We intend to convey this frustration to the National Park Authority and keep pressing them to demonstrate that they are properly listening to and communicating with their communities; and where necessary justify their decisions to us.

I would like to conclude by thanking all the Parish Councillors for their commitment and hard work, including those who left office last year.

Report to Youlgrave Annual Parish Meeting by PC Sandra Wetton

Since last March to date there have been ten crimes in Youlgrave and five in Alport. The Youlgrave crimes consist of three theft/attempt theft from sheds, one theft from a barn, one theft from a farmyard, one theft from a disused quarry, one attempt theft of brass door furniture and one theft of headlights. The other two crimes were theft of lead from church roof and damage to a vehicle.

The Alport crimes were two attempted thefts of Land Rovers, theft from a quarry, theft of electric fencing/battery and theft of cables.

There have been no reports of anti-social behaviour in Youlgrave in the last year. But there is a general increase in theft of heating oil and diesel. It is also worth noting that thefts of Land Rover Defenders are on the increase and our Crime Prevention officer is able to sell suitable Disclocks for £60, which is markedly cheaper than in the shops.

People can also buy discounted shed alarms and residents are being encouraged to take steps to help protect the valuable items they store in their sheds. The alarms have been provided by the Derbyshire Dales Community Safety Partnership, which includes Derbyshire police, the county and district councils. They are on offer to buy for £4 from police stations in Bakewell and Matlock and free security warning signs can be collected with the alarm or from Matlock Town Hall.

YOULGRAVE & DISTRICT BRANCH OF THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

The year 2011 will go down as a very mixed year in the history of the branch. First of all, the branch sadly lost five of its members, the last being Mr Jack Elliott (see tribute below).

On a more positive note, in 2011 the Youlgreave Branch Ladies section joined up with us to celebrate the 90th anniversary of the Royal British Legion with a service of Thanksgiving conducted by the branch chaplain, Reverend Garry Griffiths, in the parish church.

The branch also welcomed three new members: Mr Bill Brindley, Mr Boden, and Captain Nick Barnwell who at the time of

joining the branch was a serving officer in the army. We are grateful to him for taking the office of branch secretary.

The 2011 Poppy Appeal was a huge success, raising the sum of £2,948.06. Thanks to all who helped in any way, including local businesses, the ladies of Stanton WI and the staff and pupils of Youlgrave School. Our special thanks must go to Mrs Joan Roper who has now retired as the local Poppy Appeal Organiser. Joan has filled this office for the past seven years, and along with the ladies of the woman's section they have for many years supported the Poppy

Jack Elliott (1920-2011)

Jack was born at Stanton in Peak in 1920, later moving to Birchover. He attended school at Stanton walking the one and a half miles over the moor with his friends to the school. He left at the age of 14 and started work in Ackroyd's Quarry, which was situated at the top of Birchover. Jack had many interests, including football, having played for Birchover in local leagues. He was a passionate supporter of Derby County and as a season ticket holder he would travel to the Baseball Ground to watch them play. He also enjoyed photography, as well as being a founding member of the Holywell Players and involved with the village Pantomime.

Seeing that war was coming he joined the Royal Navy two weeks before it was declared as a volunteer, his reason being that he wanted to have the choice which of the services he was to serve in. During the Second World War Jack served on several ships as a leading telegraph operator, including the destroyer HMS Cossack and the corvette HMS Hydrangea, seeing action in several theatres of war. The commander of the corvette flotilla was Nicholas Monserat who wrote the book 'Three Corvettes', Jack's ship being one of them.

Jack finished his naval service in 1946 when he was demobbed while being based in Gibraltar. After leaving the Navy and settling down to family life, Jack helped other ex-service men in the village form the local branch of the Royal British Legion, holding the office of chairman for many years. At the time of his death he was the branch's Vice Chairman. DC

TWENTY'S PLENTY

I was walking past the Old Bakery recently when a 4x4 wagon roared past, making me jump hurriedly aside into the shop doorway. It was intimidating. I'm sure he wasn't breaking the speed limit – but he was, nevertheless, going too fast. When we consulted on the Village Plan proposals in 2008 a 20mph speed limit came top of the list and is now Parish Council policy. Highway authorities have been reluctant to move from the 30mph minimum, but Government guidance is changing. So I hope we can achieve it soon, as it will be a clear warning to traffic that you have to take greater care in the village.

However, I decided that while we campaign for this change I should adopt the policy myself – so now I try to drive no faster than 20mph anywhere in the village. It has been quite revealing because I do get impatient people pushing me from behind. But along Alport Lane, past the surgery, past Granby House and the school, 30mph is too fast and at the other end of the village cars often come in at speed through Coldwell End.

And by the way, the guy was on his mobile phone too!

Welcome to Youlgrave's Granby House

Who is Granby House for? Granby House on Alport Lane is a well-respected home for the independent elderly, founded for those who want more company but don't need residential care or a nursing home. Residents usually have a local connection, either a relative living in the area or they have lived nearby all their lives.

What is Granby House like? It has eight bed sitting rooms, all with en suite facilities. There is a conservatory, dining room, utility room with washing machine, and a large bathroom with a bath lift in the bath, plus a big sit down shower for those that need help with bathing. All rooms are self contained with a lockable front door. Granby House is opposite the Doctors' surgery and there are great views over the fields towards Over Haddon.

What do residents get? They can bring their own furniture, each room has a TV and phone point, plus an alarm button, and all heating is included in the price – the only extra is phone rental. Lunch and tea are provided and residents can make their own breakfast so can get up when they want.

What's it like to live there? Residents come and go as they like and are visited at any time. There are monthly outings and fortnightly whist drives, plus a variety of clubs and churches in the village which is a short walk on the flat. The bus to Bakewell stops outside and residents spend as much, or as little, time in their room as they wish.

What about individual care? Many residents get home care aides support from the Council and some get help with washing and or dressing. There are staff on duty during the day at Granby House and residents are encouraged to wear an arm band call button in case of emergencies. We have an on-call member of staff available every night should a resident need help.

How much does it cost? There is a weekly charge of £210 but those without large capital savings pay much less than that. Most residents get supporting people payments and housing benefit and those who need home helps etc are likely to get attendance allowance. In practice, most residents pay around £50 a week from their pension, leaving plenty of money for saving or spending.



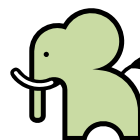

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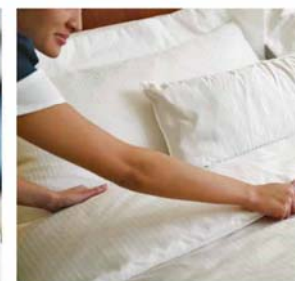
