

Football match tribute to Wilf Lincoln

Friday 26 August this year saw the second annual challenge match between Youlgrave and Bakewell Football teams as a tribute to a well respected local footballer. Wilf Lincoln, Captain of Youlgrave between 1952 and 1962, died in 2009 after suffering from Alzheimer's for 12 years. His widow, Ella, felt she would like to give something to the village which would recognise her late husband's contribution to the local community over many years and so the Wilf Lincoln Trophy was born.

Last year Bakewell won 2-1 in Youlgrave. This year, after a hard fought, competitive encounter,

We look forward to 2013 when the cup might possibly come back to Wilf's home village of Youlgrave.

Church Farm Diary, October 2012

After harvesting over 11,000 big round bales and tonnes of chopped silage I think that the silage season

is nearly over. It has been a struggle this year with the weather against us nearly every day. Dakin decided not to whole-crop the corn that he had grown but to get Henry Holland to combine it in the few nice days we had in mid August. Whole-cropping is cutting the whole corn ears and stalk and baling or silaging all together this is done usually before the corn is ripe. Dakin would like to thanks all the lads that have helped him in this year's silaging season — without a good team you can't carry on.

Dakin is ploughing the fields this month getting everything prepared for next season. He will probably put wheat in or put the ground back to grass.

Our ground is not as wet as some of the ground in other areas as we farm on limestone, so the rain drains a lot better.

He has started to get the sheds ready to house the cattle for the winter months, concreting and mending the cubicles, welding gates and making sure the water supply is working. They have also been putting some Yorkshire boarding down the walls to protect from the wind. This way of boarding up gives protection but also enables the air to circulate, which is very important because without clean air the cattle can soon catch virus pneumonia which effect their breathing and can bring on death.

The cattle are grazing on the Youlgrave moor ground, giving the ground in the village chance to recover

and grow for another eating before the winter sets in. It's always fun and games when we move the cattle to the moor, lots of help is needed, standing at openings and guiding the cattle up the lane. If anyone is just happening to be having a walk we will ask them to stop at gateways. Most people are very obliging. When we had milk cows and they were moved everyday they knew their own way to the fields. Years ago when I milked at Church Farm the milk cows, including the bull, were driven up the street to Old Hall farm ground. They would cause chaos now with all the cars parked on the street!

On 21st October we are having a Tractor Run at Church Farm. If anyone is interested in tractors they will be very welcome to come, since we are expecting about 50 to 60 tractors. Last year the run was at Palterton, running through Hardwick Hall, and the year before Mark Walker hosted the run. Everyone gets involved and has a great day.

Paperwork is always a big issue, when you have come in from a heavy day's work you don't always feel like getting started in the office, but of course the bills have to go out or you can't pay your own bills. Sarah does Dakin's VAT and I do Michael's. Years ago there was hardly any paperwork to do; now it takes up a lot of your time. Life is not so hectic this month with the harvest finished and the cattle outside, but it won't last long so we will have to make the most of it.

"Ambulance station closure will hit service to villages"

A local Paramedic has voiced his misgivings at proposals announced by East Midlands Ambulance Service which could see the closure of the local ambulance station at Bakewell. "I am profoundly worried about the level of cover that will be left for the town and the surrounding villages," says the Paramedic, who cannot be named. "The Ambulance trust is putting its case for the closure across to the public in a manner that appears to be good for the majority of the public, but the staff are all deeply concerned." He says that the proposal is to close all the local ambulance stations in the county and have two 'super stations' at Derby and Chesterfield. Ambulances will be sent to local tactical deployment points – but there's no planned point at Bakewell and the nearest to Youlgrave would be Buxton or Matlock. "We feel that the level of cover at Chesterfield and Derby will increase," he says, "and therefore Trust targets will be achieved by hitting the larger populated towns – but the smaller towns and villages will be denied a life-saving service."

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
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Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: September 2012

Owing to an injury I was unable to do any maintenance work on the Playing Field Wildlife Area until the end of June. was certainly looking pretty wild by then. The main path was just visible but the seats were sinking in long grass and the side paths had totally disappeared. On 28 August the Derbyshire Wildlife Trust sent in a team of 15 as part of their "Minihabitats" scheme set up to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Trust. The team totally strimmed the whole area, started repairing a drystone wall, and painted the seats. The Area is now in tip-top condition for the spring flowers next year. My thanks go to them, especially as some of the team offered further help.


Though late in the season there are still some wildflowers about. On 23 September Icky Picky, which is becoming my favourite wildflower bank in the area, still had harebells, field scabious, pig nut and yarrow in flower, though the rare plants mentioned in the last article have now finished. The large

dandelion-like flowers that have been giving some colour to the grass verges are perennial sow thistles, an ugly name for a rather attractive late flowering plant.

This is changeover time for the birds. Though I think our swifts departed around 5 August, I did see a big flock at the top of Long Rake on 27 August. I assume that these were on migration. There are still a few swallows and martins about and a big flock did fly up the Dale on 15 September. These were not flying randomly as they appear to do when feeding but definitely flying with a destination in mind. Though our summer

visitors are fast departing it won't be long before the winter visitors arrive, particularly our two winter thrushes, the redwing (like a song thrush with a red wing patch and a distinct eye stripe) and the fieldfare (like a grey mistle thrush). Our resident birds are still very active. Recently I had a flock of long-tailed tits and, unusually for this time of year, a siskin on the feeders. There have been plenty of buzzards and I have seen kestrels around the village recently, making a lot of noise while being mobbed by crows, attention more often given to sparrowhawks and probably with more cause.

Few birds are singing now but the robins



on 23 September just above Alport.

Finally, the hedgehogs have been much in evidence. There have been several sightings in the garden and also their distinctive tarry black droppings. One dropping I found was full of iridescent little beetle wings.

Please keep your observations coming in, particularly sightings of redwing and fieldfare, but anything of interest appreciated.

HARVEST APPEAL 2012 (for Youlgrave-Bangbutt Village Link)

Doesn't time fly? It's Harvest time again, when we are so grateful for continuing good harvests in our country, compared to millions of people around the world. We can't solve all the world's problems, but in our different ways many of us try to help in some small way. Here in Youlgrave we have this link (Youlgrave Bangbutt Village Link) with a number of very poor rural communities in Sierra Leone. Most of you know about the work we've done in the past in one such village – Bangbutt. We've helped them build a well, 21 latrines, a school, start a goat herd, a tailoring course and various other educational trainings.

Now we have moved on to work for a while with mums and their babies. Did vou know that one in eight pregnant women in Sierra Leone dies in or as a result of childbirth? And two out of five children die before their fifth birthday? In a small way we are easing this situation by helping to train more traditional birth attendants (TBAs) who work in rural areas, coping with the more problematic pregnancies and childbirth situations, and giving general hygiene and childcare training.

Alongside this we've been working through WaterAid with another partner to fund a WASH (Water Sanitation and Hygiene) project in one of the most remote areas of Sierra Leone near the Liberian border.

We are so grateful for your support, both by some of you giving annual donations and by many of you spending money at our fund raising events. To mention a few, the Table Top Sale around the village raised over £750, and was great fun. The

Breakfast Bistro continues to be in great demand and the recent Village Hall Sunday Café raised nearly £500. We are grateful to the Weslevan Reform, who continue to support us with their Harvest Festival coffee morning. This will take place on Saturday 20 October - please come and join us. We also have a Barn Dance on 10 November with a live band and 2-course supper.

There is still so much work to be done in Sierra Leone, but we can only do it with your continuing support. Annual donations help us to budget for the work we can do and don't forget, if the donation is Gift Aided, we can claim back 25p for every pound donated, from the Tax-man.

It is good to know that here in Youlgrave we are linked with one small corner of the world, in Sierra Leone, and make a difference.

It did not matter, as Gloria both entertained and educated us about bees and one or two other "local matters". She is rumoured that the hive is happier with them. passionate about her bees and combines scientific knowledge with a more natural of Troway Hall goodies. understanding of bees and their importance in maintainina our natural environment.

There is a great deal to know about bees before we were and evidence of the healing Gloria gave us a thought-provoking account of the social structure of a hive. Every bee has a role to play in maintaining the hive. There are three types of bee: the alfa or queen, the beta or worker and the gamma or drone bee. A bee is born to his or her role. The queen, and there is only ever one, lives the longest and is the biggest. She is sexually active and fed on royal jelly by the worker bees, about 50,000 of them. The 500 or so drones have one ambition only - to mate with the Queen and are totally dependent on the worker bees who hand feed them. 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Do you want to be a Snow Warden for Youlgrave Parish Council?

Derbyshire County Council is looking to appoint volunteer 'Snow Wardens' to act on behalf of their Parish Councils between October and April each year. This is an unpaid position that will operate via defined lines of communication. Duties include:

- Provide information on local conditions (to Environmental Services): Snow Wardens will be required to report the latest position on conditions in their local areas during extreme weather to the nominated contact in Environmental Services, supporting delivery of the overall Winter Service.
- Act as a single point of contact within the Town or Parish: Enable the
 distribution of information to local residents within the community, including
 reports affecting vulnerable residents.
- Act as a Co-ordinator for local volunteers: Provide a local co-ordination service amongst Town or Parish volunteers, to enable best use to be made of the local resources. This may include distributing information via the most appropriate method, co-ordinating snow clearing activities, liaison with local schools and distribution of local salt stocks.
- Report empty grit bins: Monitor and report on the status of grit bins within local communities to enable stores to be held in readiness for extreme weather condition: Snow Wardens will be expected to make use of the agreed process for the refilling of bins.
- Act as an ambassador for County Council Winter Service: Act as a local ambassador between residents and the Derbyshire County Council Winter Service during times of extreme weather, aiming to improve overall service delivery to communities in Derbyshire

Rio or bust – setting sail on an epic journey

Youlgrave's **John Turner** previews his forthcoming 5,300-mile voyage across the Atlantic to South America on a tall ship.

"Avast there ye land lubbers!" At 60 I ought to know better, but I just couldn't resist this adventure, so I am taking time out to sail in a tall ship across the Atlantic. I am joining the crew of the Lord Nelson, the first sailing ship in the world to be designed and built to take a mixed crew of all abilities, from able bodied to wheelchairs. It's run by the Jubilee Sailing Trust which promotes the integration of men and women of all physical abilities through the challenge and adventure of tall ship sailing. My voyage is the first of 10 legs in a two year long Sail the World challenge. We set sail on 21 October, which is Trafalgar Day! Do you get the drift?

We are sailing 5,300 miles from Southampton to Rio de Janeiro via the Canaries and Cape Verde Islands and depending on Neptune (and the weather) it will take around 55 days. There will be plenty of opportunities and one of my personal challenges is to go up the rigging; another is to steer the ship in rough weather.

Everyone is expected to muck in with the day to day chores. The welfare and safety of the ship is a 24/7 process from, watch-keeping, galley work, cleaning and scrubbing decks, painting, repairs and maintenance, navigation and steering, changing course and setting sails. And yes, there is a bar on board, so there is a social side to enjoy too. It's not only sailing the ship which interests me but also how we work together and foster a team spirit. Fun and humour will be key and the 'buddy buddy' system is an essential part of

the ship's ethos. I imagine and hope there will be many exciting moments along the way.

I will miss my wonderful wife Mary (nee Holland) and my supportive family and friends who encouraged me to follow my dreams. A special thanks to my workmates at Bakewell & Eyam Community Transport who allowed me time off. Big thanks to all the staff at Youlgrave Surgery in helping me to get fit and healthy once more. 
BROADBAND CAMPAIGN UPDATE

First, the application which we made to DEFRA has been given a status of "deferred". DEFRA said that the application had strengths but needed further work and more information was required. Eight reasons were listed in their justification. I shall not list all here but one was "Further work required with the community to demonstrate the level of demand and the costs which customers would be prepared to pay for the service" and given that we only had 76 addresses from a total of approximately 800 in the village, it's not too surprising. In terms of getting the initiative moving this is the only part where we need immediate and active support. Those interested in a village wide, high speed internet connection need to register support at http://youlgravebroadband.org or there is little to no chance of super-fast broadband in the short or even medium term and the village will miss a great opportunity. One other thing which DEFRA said was that we may consider

working with a nearby community, and I know that a condition of the Monyash application is that they must "help us"!

On a more positive note, I was getting 1.6 Mbits/ sec. I complained four times to BT, which was a boring and frustrating task, but I am now getting 6.5. I think it is just a switch that needs setting at exchange, but BT would never admit this and require you do a bunch of tests beforehand. Your slow speed is down to BT not your broadband provider, eg Plusnet. So while we wait for our super -fast service there is at least something which can be done to improve the speed of those of us with these very slow speeds.
