New book celebrates River Bradford


A River in Time: The Story of a Peak District River is the title of a newly-published book all about the River Bradford. It explores the geology, heritage and natural history of the river, as well as the important role that water has played in the lives of the people of Alport, Middleton and Youlgrave.

The book features interviews with local residents, including accounts of what the river and the dale were like many years ago. But it also looks at how environmental issues are affecting the flow and life cycle of the Bradford.

The book was inspired by the Bradford River Action Group, which was formed by a group of local people who wanted to better understand the problems of inconsistent flow and how we should respond to the increasing incidents of drought and flood.

A River in Time was researched and written by local writer and photographer Christine Gregory, who for over 20 years lived in Youlgrave. Her previous title was a high acclaimed study of Derbyshire's brown hares.

Production of the book about the River Bradford was made possible by a grant from the Peak District National Park Authority; and profits from its sales will be distributed via a locally-administered fund that will seek to aid river- or water-related conservation



work in the River Bradford locality. More details on this will be announced in due course.

A River in Time costs £15.99 and is published by Grafika of Bakewell. Copies are available locally from Youlgrave Post Office, Bakewell Bookshop and the Peak National Park Visitor Centre; or it can be ordered online via www.riverintime.org.uk.

Donald was a great asset to any organisation. He was connected with not least the Village Hall. assisting with the maintenance and making scenery and props for the many productions

and also front of house.

One activity that some of you won't associate Don with is travel, but along with some old friends from Sheffield Don travelled through quite a lot of Europe. Now although he didn't speak any other language than his native Pommy, wunner, conner, munner, shunner, he didn't let that trouble him. In his later years he never stopped

working and helping his friends and family. He could be seen gardening at David's home and offices, along with his close friend Fred and sometimes Margaret. They were given the name of the 'Ground Force', Margaret being Charlie Dimmock.

Don was never happier than when he was in his beloved shed, repairing or making some of his many useful and much sought-after gadgets. Don was equally at home working with wood as he was with metal. I spent some happy

> times, as did my son Richard and I'm sure many others, watching him skilfully fashioning

presents useful articles from his store of wood and steel. When Don moved down to Bakewell to live I offered to move his lathe, tools, etc, to a new shed,

where he intended to do some work, but because of his health that never came about. But when I finished Don offered his still strong hand and thanked me and gave me a spirit level, which I treasure very much; and it reminds me of a wonderful dear friend when I use it dependable. truthful, strong uncomplicated.

Don's world was one of strength, kindness, honesty, loyalty and totally uncomplicated. Anyone who had Don as a friend should feel honoured and humble, as I know I do. Thank you Don, God Bless.

Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: September 2013

Although there are a few plants such as the yellow dandelion-like perennial sow thistle still giving some colour to the grass verges, it is the fruits and seeds produced by the prolific flowering earlier in the year that are giving the botanical interest. The rowans are heavily laden with their bright orange berries and, so far, seem to be ignored by the birds. Usually the rowans in our garden are barely ripe before the blackbirds have them, but this year there seems to be so much other food about that they are lasting much longer. This should ensure plenty of food for our winter visitors, such as fieldfares and redwings, but it should be remembered that we also get large immigrations of birds that we think of as residents, such as blackbirds.

The ash keys on the tree on the Wildlife Area were so abundant that they weighed some lower branches down to the ground which made mowing round them a bit awkward. The Indian summer we have been enjoying has kept the butterflies active and we have had red admirals and small tortoiseshells in the garden in the last few days; and I had a report of a painted lady down Brookleton. The peacocks are already moving into the church tower, hibernating clinging to the walls of the staircase leading to the ringing chamber.

It is always easier to record first sightings of birds for the year than last sightings. I was sent some lovely photos of mainly house martins covering the roofs of caravans at Lower Greenfields on 8 September and they disappeared soon afterwards. However this was not the end as there were both swallows and house martins in some numbers over the village on the 13th and I had a report of some on the 22nd. They do seem to have all departed now, though there's always the chance of a passing straggler for a while yet. On 29 August we had a

greater spotted woodpecker trying to make holes in the telegraph pole by our front gate. On 6 September I was standing by the window and thought a sparrow hawk was going to join me in the dining room. Fortunately it turned away just before hitting the window.

Other bird reports were a kingfisher near Alport Bridge on the 24th, a whole family of jays visiting a garden at Coldwell End and three buzzards slowly soaring down the Dale. After a distinct lack of interest in the bird feeders for some time the small birds such as goldfinches, greenfinches, chaffinches, sparrows and tits are once again trying to eat me out of house and home. Small birds generally seem to have had a successful breeding season and I will include more detailed reports of nest box use in next month's article. My thanks to all contributors. Sightings of winter visitors much appreciated and please keep your reports coming in.

Parish Council awarded grants to develop new village website and all-weather sports area

Youlgrave Parish Council's meeting on 24 September was marked by two important success stories. County Councillor Simon Spencer presented a cheque to enable the creation of the new village website; and the meeting was informed that SITA's QEII Fields Fund had awarded us £25,000 towards the Multi Use Games Area which is to be sited on one of our two tennis courts and marked out for basketball, five-a-side football and tennis. There will be more about both these important developments and how local residents can get involved in future issues of the Bugle.

Cllr Spencer stayed on at the meeting to join the discussions with a representative from Bankside on our three years of frustration trying to get Bankside regularly cleared of vegetation. Owing to it being classed as a Public Highway it requires Derbyshire County Council approved operatives to clear. But they sub-contract to Derbyshire Dales District Council who have not been carrying out this work as they have it logged as a road that tractors can get along. The handrail repair has also been on the County's 'to do' list since June 2011. Cllr Spencer promised to chase this up and the Parish Council will ask the District Councillor to do likewise.

The grit bin survey has been completed and Council will install 12 bins around the village (six being provided by Derbyshire County Council). It will also enter into a contract with a local supplier to refill these. We would be pleased to know if parishioners wish to take part in a scheme to supply cheap bags of salt to households? Youlgrave Garage has kindly offered to store a stock on our behalf for residents to purchase.

A proposal by younger parishioners for a track with ramps for bikes was met with enthusiasm by Council, but with our commitment to complete the Multi Use Games Area project this year we will need to consider at our November Budget meeting how to fund this and are exploring the costs involved.

Fund raising continues for the village defibrillator – hopefully enough monies will be raised to provide two and Council will be writing to local businesses for support shortly. A decision on their location will be made once funds are pledged.

The next meeting is on Tuesday 22 October at 7.15pm in the Committee Room.

Potato and Cheese Chicken

Ingredients

1tbs olive oil

9 oz cup mushrooms sliced 3oz bacon lardons

1 lb skinless chicken breasts cut into bite size pieces

Onion sliced or garlic

1oz plain flour

½ pint milk

3oz frozen peas or veg of your choice

For the Topping

1 medium-large potato about 12 oz 3 oz mature cheddar cheese grated

Method

Oven 180C, 160C fan

Heat the oil in a flame proof pan (I use a large frying pan with lid and then transfer to a casserole dish for the oven).

Fry the mushrooms, lardons and onion and chicken until the chicken is just cooked through.

Add the flour and cook for 1 min. Take the pan off the heat and gradually stir in the milk until the sauce has thickened then add the peas and seasoning. Peel and coarsely grate the potato, taking small handfuls and squeezing out any liquid from the potato. (When I do a double amount I put the potato into a clean tea towel and squeeze it out.) Once the potato has been squeezed add in the grated cheese, mix and scatter over the chicken mixture that has been poured into a ovenproof dish and cook for about 30mins until the topping is golden.



Most people in Youlgrave know about the work Youlgrave-Bangbutt Village Link has done in the past in Bangbutt and the surrounding area. After the 10 year civil war we helped the community to rebuild their lives by building a school, a well and 21 latrines. We also started a goat herd and funded a tailoring course. We continue to have a link with the village and, this year, have given £530 to buy equipment for the school.

Over the last few years we have extended our support to other needy projects in Sierra Leone. This year we have sent a second £2,000 to Health, Poverty, Action (HPA) who are training Maternal Health Promoters (MHP) who

work in rural areas helping women before, during and after giving birth. Hopefully this will help reduce the very high mortality rate of women and babies at this vulnerable time in their lives. We have a useful contact called Kadi (one of the TBAs) who writes to us

and tells us about her work and her life. We have also donated £2,000 to the Aberdeen Fistula hospital which does amazing work by operating on women who have suffered internal damage during childbirth which has caused incontinence and meant that they have been ostracised by their communities.

Through our contact with Village Aid in Bakewell we have donated £2,000 to help fund a restaurant project at an orphanage in Mile 91. This will provide training and work for the orphans when they leave school, as well as providing funds for the orphanage.

We are also continuing our link with WaterAid. We co-funded a WASH (Water, Sanitation and Hygiene) project

in one of the most remote areas of Sierra Leone near the Liberian border. When Barbara was in London recently she visited Rebecca, who has just come back from the area, for an update on the project. We are very impressed by the impact the work they are doing is having on peoples' lives.

We are so grateful for your support, both by annual donations and by spending money at our fund raising events. Our Barn Dance last November raised £702, the Breakfast Bistro continues to be very popular and raised £545. We had a coffee morning in April and an All Day Café in July. We are very grateful to the Wesleyan Reform who

continue to support us with their Harvest Festival coffee morning and also to Gill and Brian who donate money from their regular tea gardens. Our next event is Sing Africa on 19th October which promises to be a very enjoyable evening.

There is still so much work

to be done in Sierra Leone but we can only do it with your continued support. Annual donations help us to budget for the work we can do and don't forget if the donation is Gift Aided, we can claim back 25p for every pound donated, from the Tax-man!

At least we know that here in Youlgrave we are able to be linked with one small corner of the world, in Sierra Leone, and make a difference.
