Holiday Time Again

The Village Market, teas and the Welldressing collection box benefited nicely. The Village Market takings were £957.90 and the weekend teas raised £674.10, which will be used for

the running costs and upkeep of the Village Hall. On Tuesday and Wednesday teas were served in aid of Middleton Church, raising £105 and £60 was donated by visitors in the church. The Welldressing collection box total reached £557.51 allowing, after expenses, a donation of £500 to be sent to the orphanage and school in Kathmandu.

Youlgrave Welldressers are, as I write, beginning their week's work so I hope when you read this they will have had an equally successful week.

A stalwart team of villagers is fighting to keep Youlgrave Carnival alive. Life-long organisers, Sylvia Birds and Anne Hodgekinson are leading the team with their priceless experience whilst Youlgrave School is kindly organising the children's sports activities.

Traditional events including the Treasure Hunt, Children's Sports, Rounders, Six and Five-a-side Football and a variety concert in the Village Hall are running throughout the week running up to Carnival Saturday 10th July.

Programmes are available from Roses Newsagents or from Carnival Committee Members for full details of Carnival Events, priced at only 40 pence. As in previous years, each programme will be numbered with a Grand Prize Draw taking place. The prizes include a Portable Colour Television (donated by The George Hotel), a Meal for Four (donated by the Bulls Head), a Gallon of Beer (donated by the Farmyard) and £50 cash with many other smaller items too.

Village Design Statements

The Countryside Agency and the current government are both keen to promote Village Design Statements in order to put control of certain aspects of planning back in the hands of local people.

A Village Design Statement would be the fourth tier in the legal planning framework that will consist of :- Planning Statute, as defined by the Government; The Derbyshire County Council Structure Plan; The Local Plan by Peak National Park

Authority and The Village Design Statement.

Once approved the statement would have the legal status of supplementary planning guidance and would need to be taken into account in considering planning applications and by the planning authorities in the case of appeals. It does not have to address such detail as the design of windows and doors that people normally associate with planners but can deal with broader issues such as encouraging appropriate employment. transport issues, bus services or car parking, and protection of open spaces within and around the village. It allows very local priorities to be considered in the planning process and reinforces and strengthens the role of the Parish Council when

consulted over planning issues.

They advise that a working party be set up to steer the process and that working party be representative of the entire village. Although such a group would need the support of the Parish Council it should be independent of it. Past experience would suggest that it would take 18 months to 2 years to complete such a statement and get it approved by the appropriate people. Public consultation would be a major feature of the process.

Are there any readers of the 'Bugle' who have recollections of an artist named Knighton Hammond who, circa 1905, had a studio at Lathkill House in Church Street, Youlgrave?

He became friendly with members of the Rutland Family and issued a series of postcards depicting the various parts of Haddon Hall and many local scenes eg Fisherman's Cottage, Tufa Rocks at Alport and many others.

He also painted pictures of Alport Mill and the mill in Middleton Dale. There is, however, one mill that I cannot place. Perhaps it could be the one at Eagle Tor. The connection is most likely through the Millers S and E Johnson, who ran all three mills at one time.

Peter Norris, who is writing the story of Hammond and has sought this help, lives in Somerset but the 'Bugle' will pass on any information people may dig up. Thank you all in advance.

MILLENNIUM EDITION


Following our call for photographs to include in the January 2000 edition of 'The Bugle', we have received some very interesting pictures.

More Rural Remedies

Dock - We all know of the healing effect of dock rubbed on nettle stings. One year a five-year-old in my care hadly nettled both legs. Only one single dock leaf could be found and this was rubbed on one leg only. Two hours later the treated leg was clear but the untreated one was still red and inflamed. Proof indeed!

I have also been told that a dock leaf placed in the sole of a shoe in summer time, prevents perspiring feet and so keeps socks smelling sweet.

Celandine - sometimes known as pilewort. Ancient herbalists and anothecaries used plants that resembled parts of the body as a cure for ailments relating to that part. Dig up the root and you will see how it got its alternative name.

Dandelions - Although hated by gardeners, one must admit that a field of them is a beautiful sight. Boiled leaves have been used as a general tonic and for indigestion and kidney problems. The country name 'pissthe-bed' and the French 'pissen lit', could well relate to this improvement of kidney function.

Buttercaps - were frequently used in folk medicine as a cure for all manner of skin problems. Insect bites, sores, bruises and ulcers of the skin have all been treated with a concoction made from the petals.

From the Cookhouse Door

'Secret' Fruit Loaf

Ingredients

20z margarine 12oz dried mixed fruit 1 cup 'water' 2 cups S R flour 1 cup castor sugar 1 level tsp baking powder

1 beaten egg

Method

Put the margarine, fruit and 'water' into a saucepan and heat gently until the margarine is melted. Take the pan from heat and add the flour, sugar and baking powder and mix together with the egg. Put into a 21b loaf tin and bake on the middle shelf of the oven for 1 hour at 350°F or gas mark 4. The 'secret' is to substitute ½ cup (or more) of sherry for the water !!



Tae Kwon-Do

Tae Kwon-Do is a Korean martial art which is known for its flying and spinning kicks. Choi Hong Hi, a Korean General, founded Tae Kwon-Do in 1955. He developed the art by combining a traditional Korean footfighting technique called Tae Kyon with Japanese Karate.

Bakewell Tae Kwon-Do has been running for 5 years under Mr M Hilton (2nd Degree Black Belt). The club has been successful in both gradings and competitions, where it has had a number of national and area medal

The class consists of members of all ages, some of whom are from

Youlgrave. Training sessions are held Tuesdays and Fridays at St John's Brigade Hall, Bakewell, Juniors (under 16's) 6.45 to 7.45pm and Seniors 7.45 to 9.00pm. The training onsists of patterns, sparring, bag work, self defence and work is done to improve students' strength and flexibility.
