The Bull's Head returns to traditional ways

The new tenants of the Bull's Head on Youlgrave's Fountain Square say they're keen to welcome residents and visitors alike and will be playing to the strengths of the traditional village pub.

Vicky and Neil already have another pub in north Shropshire, which they've run for the last five years, so they bring plenty of experience to Youlgrave. In particular, they want to build on several awards for keeping good quality real ale and will be aiming to offer up to five traditional cask ales, with beer festivals planned for the Spring and Summer.

At the beginning of December they began serving food, offering a traditional and seasonal menu, and hoping to source plenty of local produce and ingredients. Families and dogs are welcome and there is free wi-fi throughout the pub.

As well as being publicans, Vicky's background is as a chef and Neil's is in plastering, which may come in handy for renovating the Bull's Head since they plan to offer en-suite accommodation from next Spring. Already the pool room has been refurbished and, together with other traditional tap room games such as dominoes and darts, they're recruiting for teams in 2015. The Sunday Quiz team is once more resident at the pub.

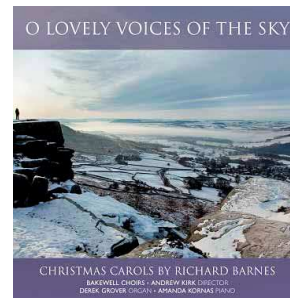

Concern over future of Darley Dale Surgery site

Concerns have been raised over the future of the Darley Dale medical centre, with uncertainty over a move to a new location. (Youlgrave and Winstar Surgeries are part of the same practice.)

For some time, practice managers have been looking to find new premises in Darley Dale to accommodate more staff in order to cope with the increasing number of patients registering at the surgery. Despite submitting a business case to NHS England earlier in the year they have been told that a decision will not be made until well in to 2015. The existing surgery building at Darley Dale is rented and the 25-year lease expires in 2016, at which point it seems likely that the landlord will develop the site for new housing. However, a new surgery can't be built without prior approval from NHS England.

Dr Ben Milton told the Bugle: "We continue to work hard with NHS England to try and secure the required funding to progress the development of a new surgery in Darley Dale and are very grateful to those patients who have already written to NHSE to raise their concerns. We have also recently met with

Patrick McLoughlin MP to ask for his support, as well as working with the Town Council in Darley Dale regarding the potential sites. Once built the surgery will allow us to provide an increased number of consultations and additional services from the Darley base, which should provide benefits to all patients across the practice area."

The number of staff at Darley Dale has risen dramatically just to keep up with patients' needs. In 1998 there were four doctors and no advanced nurse practitioners, but by 2014 there were 11 doctors and one advanced nurse practitioner to care for 7,550 patients. With hundreds of new homes either approved or being built in the area, neighbouring GP practices in Matlock and Bakewell are also already at full capacity.

However, Dr Milton stressed that the new surgery at Darley Dale is about providing additional capacity to meet local needs. "It is not a threat to the surgeries at Winstar and Youlgrave," he said, "both of which remain core to our strategy going forwards."

Cafe of the Year award

Congratulations to Youlgrave's Nicola Hill and her business partner, Jane Stone, whose cafe at Matlock Bath was voted Best Cafe of 2014 by readers of the Matlock Mercury. Nicola and Jane opened 'When the Clock Strikes 3' on North Parade last year, buying the cafe after both took voluntary redundancy from their nursing jobs. They serve breakfast and lunch as well as tasty afternoon teas, and have recently begun to offer catering services for special events. When the Clock Strikes 3 is open at weekends during the winter months.

Andrea helps you get that special look

Newly moved to Youlgrave with her young family, Andrea Willans knows a thing or two about getting ready for the big occasion.

At 19 Andrea went to Greasepaint make-up school in London to be a professional make-up artist and after qualifying as a professional make-up artist she worked as a freelancer for five years in London. "My early 20s were spent lugging my heavy make-up box on and off tube trains travelling to shoots!" she says. "However, I met politicians, opera singers, actors, comedians and dancers – it was a brilliant experience!" For 18 months she worked at RTE in Dublin and says her most prestigious job was making up the Irish Prime minister ("my Irish father was particularly proud!").

In her late twenties Andrea decided to take a step back from media make-up



and since then she has embraced one-off shoots for artist's promotional photos, historical make-up demonstrations (Georgian, 1920s, 1940s), make-up lessons (including scar coverage techniques) and wedding make-ups.

"This summer has been busy settling into our new country life and fulfilling some make-up bookings in London. I am now starting to fill the diary with wedding trials for Derbyshire Brides. The summer months get booked up fast and the winter weddings are rare but magical!"

Andrea says that when a bride calls she books her in for a trial, to create a look. For some this is a dramatic polished make-up, but for others it is a fresh natural look. "On the day of the wedding I arrive in good time. I bring my own make-up chair so that we can sit in the best light. The bride then enjoys some quiet time, having her make-up applied, usually sipping some bubbles!"

And what are Andrea's tips? "The secret to a professional finish is highly pigmented make-up, good clean brushes and an understanding of face shapes, skin tones and colour. A passion for fashion helps too!"

Conksbury housing project takes shape

Back in October, the Peak District Rural Housing Association Board came to Youlgrave to inspect the Housing Project. In hard hats and high-viz jackets, we went on site. The top bungalow had been boarded out ready for plastering and plumbing and heating pipes had been installed. It was really taking shape. The rooms are surprisingly spacious and the lounge has French doors onto the garden that looks down the street. There is to be an area on the other side of the house for a whirly-gig to dry washing, two parking spaces and a sitting-out area for catching the rays. The perimeter walls have been built and the roofs are nearly complete, which means that work can progress inside.

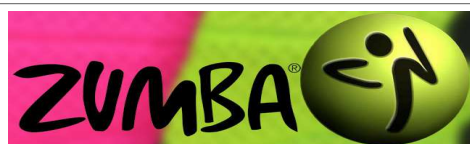
There have of course been delays; the supply of stone could not come fast enough from the quarry. The other issue is the roadworks on Conksbury Lane. Richard Dunnet, the site manager explained how, at one point, they were working around eight different service cables and pipes and through solid rock - they even hit a seam of lead! So a lot of the digging had to be done by hand. The build is now nearly two months behind schedule, so we hope good progress can be made through the winter months.

Time to think about the Conksbury Community Orchard

Once the new houses are finished in February/March we can begin to plan the community orchard that will lie between Hannah Bowman Way and Conksbury Avenue. We hope that the new residents will want to get involved, also community groups, uniformed youth groups and the school too. People might like to dedicate a tree in remembrance of a loved one. Also, in this centenary year of the First World War, perhaps we could commemorate the men of Youlgrave who died. There could be up to 60 plantings on the site so there's lots of scope!

Help us draw up a list of local fruit trees by telling us what varieties grow in your garden or what grew in your parents' garden years ago. If you want to get involved ring me on 636887. And if you are not already a member of the CLT why not join us?

Oatcakes

I have been asked to put in a recipe for oatcakes. This is one that my father used to make, they are delicious fried at breakfast or toasted. I usually buy mine from David Figg's, but on occasions it is nice to have made your own.

1lb fine oatmeal

½ lb wholemeal flour

½ oz salt

2 pints of warm water

1oz yeast

Mix the oatmeal and flour, warm the water just under blood heat and add the salt and yeast to it, add the dry ingredients and beat well. It should be like a Yorkshire Pudding batter. Stand in a warm place for 20 mins, if it drops stir it up again.

Lightly grease a hot plate or griddle or large frying pan. When hot pour a ladle full of the mixture in the centre and bake for about 5 mins, then turn and repeat on the other side. Don't over cook the as they will be heated up again when you use them.

Braised red cabbage

As it will soon be Christmas this is the recipe I use for braised red cabbage to go with the turkey.

2oz butter

1 medium onion peeled and sliced

1 clove garlic crushed

1lb red cabbage shredded

1 cooking apple sliced

3 tbsp white wine vinegar

3 tbsp water

1 oz sugar

Salt and pepper

Heat the butter in a large frying pan and fry the onions and garlic, add the cabbage and apples and cook for 5 mins. Spoon into a ovenproof dish, combine the vinegar, water and sugar and season, pour this over the cabbage mixture and cook in the oven for about 45 mins.

Youlgrave Foodbank

Youlgrave Foodbank started last Christmas. During the year the support has fluctuated up and down, but mainly been well supported. It now appears to be part of Youlgrave's continuing social response to a sadly growing need in our country.

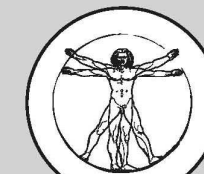

Please help the Monday Club keep going

Youlgrave Day Centre offers valuable support for our older residents, but it urgently needs more helpers. Can you spare just a few hours each week?

Youlgrave Day Centre, also known as the Monday Club, was started in 1983 mainly as a result of an initiative by members of staff from Youlgrave Surgery. It meets most weeks with the exception of peak August holiday time. Its purpose, as with other centres, is to offer social activities, friendship and a hot, two-course meal to anyone over 60 years old. Essentially it is an opportunity to meet for those who, often through age or infirmity, find it difficult to meet outside their own home. Transport is arranged where necessary through the excellent Bakewell & Eym Community Transport project.

Trips and entertainment

Most activities take place at the village hall and the project is heavily subsidised by the Village Hall Management Committee, being a prime example of the charitable aims of the hall. Occasionally outside trips are arranged such as lunch at a local pub, perhaps combined with a Community Transport trip around the countryside or a visit and picnic in Chatsworth gardens. Local amateur choirs have provided entertainment, especially during the festive season, occasional talks by a local personality, and an after-lunch bingo session is a popular activity. Board games such as scrabble and dominoes are also popular.

Initially the Centre catered for up to 40 regular attendees, including a group travelling from Winster. More recently numbers sitting down for a meal usually number 18-20, including a number of volunteer helpers who are themselves often of pensionable age. Meals are provided on a three weekly rota by

three of Youlgrave's best (volunteer) cooks!

More volunteers needed

For the last 12 years the Day Centre has been organised by Lise Marple, but family circumstances mean that Lise now urgently needs to find a successor. The responsibilities involve finance – collecting a small meal charge and paying all expenses, checking availability and organising volunteer helpers, and arranging trips, transport and entertainments. The role could possibly be shared with two or possibly more people working closely together.

More volunteers would also be warmly welcomed. They help to serve meals and morning/afternoon tea and coffee, to wash up afterwards, to compere the important bingo session and to generally assist attendees with their needs.

Recently the Day Centre had to be cancelled due to a shortage on the day of enough volunteers. The need for a new organiser is also very important, with the risk that the Day Centre could have to close if no one comes forward. With the baby-boomer generation entering the veteran stage, the demand for the Day Centre facility is likely to increase in years to come. The only reward for putting your name forward is the knowledge that you have helped someone else in need – but that in itself can bring great satisfaction.

Youlgrave Parish Council report, November 2014

The November Council meeting agreed to set the precept for 2015/16 at the same level as the current year. Council has managed to adjust its budgets to ensure no increase is needed, while allowing for essential repairs to aging play equipment. The main project will be for a shelter to compliment the MUGA (multi use games area) and the adaptation of the paths through the edge of the wildlife area into a children's cycle trail. Council is grateful to the trustees of the former Youth Club who have transferred the balance of their funds to us, which will go a long way towards paying for this.

The Holywell Lane toilet block will see a transformation this winter, using monies provided to us when the building was transferred. Council wishes to thank the landlady of the Bulls Head for agreeing to allow the pub toilets to be an alternative for the week when the block will be closed.

We continue to press County Council on road repairs and street/path cleaning. We are obtaining new lights for the churchyard Christmas Tree, providing small grants to essential village services and have adopted new financial regulations to allow safeguarded internet banking for the first time.

Council has again obtained a supply of 25kg winter salt bags which are on sale to parishioners at a heavily discounted price at Youlgrave Garage and is continuing with its refill contract with Long Rake Spar to ensure that its own bins are refilled should the snows descend. The Parish Council wishes residents a peaceful Christmas and looks forward to the challenges of 2015.

Youlgrave Village Hall: changes to our hire charges

There are rumours circulating that the Village Hall is "putting the prices up again", "turning it into a business" and "stopping people using the hall". So are they true?

We have been looking at how we charge for using the hall. It has been three years since the current prices were set, so a review was well overdue. What we didn't want to do was just add a bit to cover inflation, though we have had to reflect the significant price rises, particularly in the cost of energy, in this review. But we did want to take the opportunity to look at the overall pricing structure, to try to make it reflect better how the hall is actually used, and at the same time to encourage more usage for activities that benefit the community.

Also, as a Committee, we have to be very mindful of the fact that for the last three years the hall has run at a deficit. Prices at the hall are subsidised by income we generate from other activities, like the pantomime, but in recent years that has not been enough to balance the books. We need to get to a position where the income we generate covers our costs, allows us to improve the facilities for everyone, but also allows us to maintain our reserves for a rainy day (which, as with any building as old as the hall, come around all too often).

But we are not raising prices across the board. Some groups will actually see a reduction in the charges they pay. We have also compared our pricing against a number of other, similar village halls in the area and we will still be one of, if not the, lowest priced in the area.

So what will change from 1 April 2015? We currently offer the hall out in half-day or whole evening sessions. This works for some, but many only require a shorter hire period. So from April, like the vast majority of village halls across the county, we are moving to hourly pricing. This will give people choice. For example, if you want to hire the main hall for your party –

no problem, but you will have to pay for all the time you use. However, if you prefer, you can now do all the preparation off-site and just hire the hall for a much shorter time. So, a local person can have a children's party for three hours in the main hall for £21.60 (less than half you would pay at similar sized halls in the area).

Not everything will be cheaper. Some activities will be slightly more expensive, some facilities will now be charged for additionally and, for example, we will no longer be offering any discounts for private commercial hire, irrespective of where the hirer resides. However, to encourage usage that benefits the community we will offer discounts to certain groups (or individuals). In a short article like this, it is not possible to explain all the details, but to give you an idea how this will work in practice, here are some more examples: start a local badminton club in the Main Hall for two hours a week – £12; or a craft group in the Social Room for a couple of hours – £7; or an evening book club in the Committee Room, again for a couple of hours – £5; or how about organising a local yoga group for a one hour session in the Social Room for £3.50?

So yes, some prices are going up, but equally some are coming down. We are not turning the hall into a commercial business, but yes we are trying to be more business-like to ensure the long-term sustainability of the hall, and to put all hirers on a fair and equal footing. And, contrary to the rumours, we are not stopping anyone using the hall (within reason!). In fact the reverse, we are focusing our subsidies on hirers who benefit the community as a whole, and trying to encourage more people to use the hall. Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: November 2014

The mild weather at the end of October and beginning of November meant that butterflies were still flying, with red admiral and small tortoiseshell in the garden up to 3rd November. A southern hawker dragonfly was also present on the same day. Bees were flying well from the hives, bringing in lots of orange and green pollen. The first heavy frost was on the 6th, but the weather has been generally mild up to a heavy frost on the 24th. Very heavy rain on the 14th put the fishing platforms on the New Dam well under water.

The generally mild weather has also meant some wild flowers have continued to bloom. I found 12 species in flower on the 23rd, mainly occasional plants, but groundsel was quite common alongside some pavements.

Migrant birds are now here in large numbers. Starlings have been common in the village with flocks of about 20, but there were at least 100 feeding near the New Dam on the 23rd and I have seen very big flocks at Parsley Hay, official numbers being put at 5,000. These birds fly north in the evenings, presumably to join the huge murmuration above Stoney Middleton. Fieldfare have now arrived in force and I saw a flock of several hundred below Mawstone on the 16th. There have been some redwings too. I am hoping that the blackbirds will leave some garden cotoneaster berries for the fieldfares and redwings when the abundant food in the fields starts to run out. Garden birds have been very active with sparrows and greenfinches

emptying the feeders at an incredible rate with tits, dunnocks, robins, goldfinches and chaffinches all present in good numbers. The river birds have been doing very well with dippers and grey wagtails for most of the length. There have been two resident dabchicks but the star must be the kingfisher, which has been seen every day from well up the dams to below Bradford Bridge. It even sat still long enough for a photo on the 23rd.

Birds of prey have been well recorded with plenty of buzzards, often soaring high and calling, a kestrel being mobbed by jackdaws and occasional lightning visits to the garden by a sparrowhawk. The prize, however, goes to a peregrine sitting on a garden table down Holywell Lane. Nuthatch, woodpecker and even a jay have been reported from the Bank. Eight magpies

together must presumably portend something. Tawny owls have been hooting a lot down the Dale and were very vocal near the church on the 23rd. I saw a little owl near Conksbury Bridge on the 3rd.

Lastly a hedgehog strolled across our lawn on the 15th. In the summer this would be a very welcome sight, but at this time of year it really should be safely hibernating.

My thanks to John, Simon, Pete, Louise, Lesley and Maggie for some especially interesting reports this month and please keep them coming in.
