Ebola – first hand experience in a Sierra Leone treatment centre

Following the Coffee Morning, the Annual General Meeting will be held from 12 midday onwards. In addition to the usual brief business meeting, there will be a talk by Dianna Blackshaw on her recent first hand experiences of working as a volunteer in Sierra Leone. Dianna is a bio-medical scientist at the Wythenshawe Hospital who answered an appeal for volunteers and is currently testing for the ebola virus in a treatment centre. The committee is particularly pleased that Dianna is willing to come and talk about her work on the ground and feel sure that this is something that will be of great interest. Do, please, come and hear what Dianna has to say. As a consequence of the ebola crisis, schools in Sierra Leone have been closed, but there are attempts to carry on education through open air schools. Youlgrave-Bangbutt Village Link is currently providing funding for one such Air School in Bangbutt.

Dear Editor

I have been researching my family history and wondered if it would be possible for you to ask a question of your readers to see if they can shed any light on the following for me.

My great grandfather left Youlgrave to find employment in Burnley, but before him all my direct relatives lived in Youlgrave. The family name is Garratt and you note in one of your past issues that this was one of the most common surnames in the village in 1851. My great great grandfather was called Joseph Garratt, married to Mary Ann and was a lead miner (she was employed in the lace making cottage industry). They had four children born in Youlgrave, Eliza, Earnest, Hartley and Joseph but the fifth child, William, was born in Germany around 1849 at which time the eldest child would only have been around 10.

Can anyone suggest a reason why a lead miner's child would have been born in Germany at that time?

Joseph must have returned to Youlgrave because he married a second time to Julia and had more children.

News from Youlgrave School

NEW HEAD TEACHER APPOINTED

The Governing Body is delighted to announce the appointment of Mrs Heather Stelling as the School's new Head Teacher. Mrs Stelling is currently a Deputy Head at another Derbyshire School and will be starting at All Saints after Easter.

Youlgrave Parish Council report

The February Parish Council meeting discussed waste collection issues on Bankside, the inadequate litter/dog bin provision on Moor Lane and gave two planning applications its support. It also received permission from the Parochial Church Council to plant a tree in the churchyard at Church Corner to grow for future use as the village's illuminated Christmas tree. The toilet block on Holywell Lane has been closed for refurbishment and the internal works are nearing completion. For the QEII Alport Lane playing fields, Council discussed plans to replace the toddler swing, extend the path to the multi use game area, replace the spectator shelter and construct a children's cycle trail, which are all planned to start once the ground firms up.

The restored public footpath from the bottom of Bankside, along the north bank of the River Bradford and up through the woods to King Street at the very top of the village, just needs the river stretch resurfacing to make it properly usable once more, and a volunteer group is being organised to carry this out in March.

Derbyshire Dales District Council's Dog Order in Public Spaces was passed by committee on Thursday 26 February. Youlgrave is specifically covered by this for the Coldwell End play area, the allotments and the QEII Alport Lane Playing Fields in the categories of Complete Exclusion and the offence of Dog Fouling. It will become law on 1 April 2015 with a £100 fine for offenders.

Shimwells return to milking

After over 25 years, milking has started again for the Shimwells. Dakin and his family (wife Sarah and children Lucy and Joseph) have started milking with a robot milker. This is an ambition that they have always wanted to do, so after a lot of thought and research they have made it happen. Even though this may be the wrong time to start this venture with the price of milk on the floor, we can only hope that this will be resolved soon.

When you can buy milk cheaper than water you know that something is wrong with the system, and when you cost how to get the water into the bottles and then compare what goes into getting milk into bottles there is no comparison.

For the first time in living memory there are fewer than 10,000 dairy farmers in the UK. Up to 400 of those have quit the industry just this year. For consumers, falling milk prices may look good, but do we want fresh safely produced milk from British farms or do we want imported milk and products? I can only wish Dakin and family good



luck and hope that they are successful and that the price will soon be sorted out.

The milking system is absolutely amazing! The cows go into the robot and are milked without anyone touching them. They are milked automatically and they can be milked three times a day. One tried it 26 times in 24 hours, but of course the computer would not give her corn so she went straight through. Sarah is very good with the computer, she soon presses the buttons to see which cow has been milked or needs attention. She is also good at the book work, entering new cattle and calve numbers for the Ministry.

The cows have a responder round their necks and this connects to the main system which tells the computer what cow is in and how much corn she needs. It even tells if she is "in bulling" by the cow's temperature and if she has mastitis. When she has been milked the front gate opens, she walks out, the gate shuts and then the back gate opens to let in another cow which

is usually waiting.

As I am writing this and you are reading it, a cow will be milking. There is no more looking at the clock and planning your life round the time to milk, as Michael and I used to do. Your life can go on as normal and you are able to do other jobs. The cows are very content as there is no noise and no one herding them around as you would get in a parlour shed.

My Great uncle Tom would be falling off his milking stool at the progress that has been made. He wasn't very happy when my Dad had a milking machine put in. Uncle Tom still liked to milk by hand. He would have his flat cap turned backwards on his head so that he could rest his head on the cow and he always had some lard under his stool to put on the cows teats to make them smooth in his hands.

The cleaning of the sheds and feeding the cows still has to be done, so Michael goes up every morning to help. There are calves to look after and I have some to feed here at Church Farm, while Sarah, Lucy and Joseph have some on the moor.

The cattle have just been tested for TB and have passed. This is always a great relief, because if you go down with TB all movement on the farm is restricted and the only way to sell any stock is to go straight for slaughter. This is OK if the animal is ready for killing, but if you were wanting to sell young stock (store cattle) you would have to wait until they were fat and of course this takes a lot of money and time.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

I thought a recipe using milk would be appropriate this month. It is a delicious way of serving baked custard.

Country Cream

Ingredients

1 pint milk
2 oz sugar
4 eggs beaten

To finish

3 tablespoons raspberry jam
1/3 pint whipping cream
1 oz dark cooking chocolate grated
Oven Gas 3 - 160 C

Method

Heat the milk with the sugar and pour onto the eggs, strain the mixture into a 2 pint ovenproof dish. Cover with foil and stand in a baking tin with a little water. Bake in a slow oven for 1 to 1 1/2 hrs until set. When the custard is cool spread the jam over the top, lightly whip the cream and spoon over the jam and top with the grated chocolate.

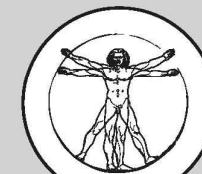

Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: February 2015

Firstly, a correction. In the last article I referred to a close encounter with a large male deer I called a stag. It has been pointed out to me that, as this was a black fallow deer, I should have called it a buck, as fallow deer males are bucks not stags.

Apart from the snowdrops, which have been wonderful, there has been very little flower activity. The birds, however, have been tremendous. At the end of January over 90 lapwings, accompanied by fieldfare, were reported on Haddon Fields. I saw around 150 fieldfare above the New Dam on the 4th. Along the river,

dippers, dabchicks, grey wagtails and kingfishers have all been seen regularly. My last sighting of a kingfisher, twice and well apart, was on the 22nd. I could only find one dabchick on that day, but it was going into summer plumage and looking very smart. A coot was sitting on a nest.

Last month's bird of the month, the little egret, is still around and was reported in the swimming pool area on the 21st. I had recently seen it below Hawley's Bridge and Alport. Three cygnets, herons and occasional tufted ducks have also been seen. On the Dale side greater spotted woodpeckers have been drumming and are frequent visitors, along with bullfinches and long tailed tits on the feeders. In the garden, blue, great and coal tits, greenfinches, bullfinches, goldfinches, chaffinches, dunnocks, robins, sparrows and blackbirds have all been plentiful, with jackdaws and about seven pheasants clearing up under the feeders.

Bird of the month this time is definitely a brambling that was in the garden on the 1st. This northern migrant version of the chaffinch has not been seen much this winter, but has recently been recorded in Darley Dale. Another migrant, pink footed geese, have been flying high over the village in 'V' shaped skeins. Apparently these arctic nesting birds have been commuting between their overwintering areas on Morecombe Bay and the Wash, passing over Youlgrave. They can be distinguished in flight from our local Canada geese by their less strident call.

Hares have been seen around the village and I had a second hand report of a water vole near the swimming pool. Any more information on this would be much appreciated.

Last year was a good year for nesting tits. Six out of ten nest boxes below the playing field and two out of four in the garden had been

occupied. Finally, now is the time to start listening for bird songs and perhaps learning a few. The great tit's "teacher teacher" call is an easy one. Both robins and dunnocks sing from prominent perches, so you can associate the song with the bird. The song thrush has a phrase which is repeated three or four times.

My thanks to Robert, John C, Jim, John Y, Simon, Keith, Ruth and Lesley for their valuable contributions. All reports gratefully received.
