Jack Goodwin (1949-2016)

Jack was part of Youlgrave for all of his life. He was born here in 1949, went to school here, and lived all his life here, beginning on Stoneyside, then Mawstone Lane and Conksbury Lane, and for the last 28 years on New Road.

His working life never took him far from this village. He worked first in farming, then at Mawstone Mine and after that at Friden brickworks, where he was very proud of getting his 25 years service award. And he was even more proud of getting his 40 years service award – a rare achievement.

1979 was a very special year for Jack. He met Jayne in January, they got engaged in April and were married in December. In due course their relationship was made even more special by the birth of their two sons, Jack and Michael, in 1984.

Jack had a huge and generous personality, a wonderful sense of humour and a selfless care for everyone. Jack was always looking for something new to do for charity – he was very famous for sitting in a bath of peas, beans, custard and gravy for eight hours outside The George to raise money for Youlgrave School (see picture below).

Jack loved children and a lot of his charity work was to raise money for them. He shaved his hair and beard for Children in Need, and on another occasion dyed his hair, allowing the school children to



choose the colour (which was bright pink!). Many will remember Jack as Jacko the Clown, something he did for children's parties which all the children loved to watch.

Along with spending time with his family, Jack loved going on walking holidays with friends from work, walks which would often lead to pubs! He welcomed everyone as a friend, and had that rare quality of being able to be on the receiving end of a joke as well as telling one.

Jack will be sadly missed by everyone who knew him.

Bikeability: All Saints pupils practise their cycle skills

It was a fun experience to ride my bike on the road and it was really cool. We learned many new things: including a u-turn, safety check, secondary and primary position and the M and ABC check. Our instructors were called Reece and Lee; they taught us everything. My bike wasn't safe so I had to go on my sister's tiny bike. It was hard to ride, trust me! It was scary being on the road with traffic but our instructor taught us how to signal to traffic on a junction which made me feel a bit safer. **By Adam O.**

Bikeability is a memorable activity: you learn how to ride your bike properly on the road with your friends. For level 1, we practised riding our bike on the playground. The year sixes were split into two groups. In level 1 we played a game where Tara set out some cones in a circle. She kept on making it smaller and you weren't allowed to go out of it or put your foot down and Lily won. Level 2 was also very exciting but this time it was on the road. We did it on Grove Place and New Road. On the way to Grove Place we rode in the snake (where you go in pairs riding on the road). Our instructors taught us to signal to traffic, right and left hand turns, u- turns, primary and secondary positions and what to do at a junction. It was a very enjoyable experience.

Vandalism rears its ugly head again

In recent months Youlgrave has been suffering a spate of mindless vandalism and theft, in particular on our village playing fields. It is disruptive and costly, diverting village funds – YOUR tax-payers' money – to cover continuous repairs and replacements.

Whilst individually most are low level and petty in nature, there has been a steady accumulation. At the Alport Lane Playing Field toilet block this has included:

- Soap and hanging baskets stolen and toilet paper strewn around.
- Deliberate use of the toilet block as a target to kick balls at the windows, roof and gutter, breaking sections of gutter and gutter brackets and damaging slates and end pointing.
- Attacking the plastic window units with a sharp instrument to try to break through.
- Methodically hacking off paint to the panel joints to the inner door to the service room.

And at the Parish Council's Coldwell End toilets:

- Throwing small stones through the air brick vents to fill the basin and block it, cracking the pan in the process and providing unnecessary work for the cleaner to unblock.

Other mindless incidents have seen branches broken from trees and several attempts to break the fencing to the recently provided multi-use games area by a group of youths.

The most heartless incident was reported immediately prior to the meeting when it was discovered that the recently planted memorial tree on the playing field had been destroyed and the plaque to the memory of Ron Clark, a much loved village footballer

and cricketer, had disappeared.

The Parish Council has made the Police aware of all these incidents, but would urge all parishioners whose local tax makes possible the provision of our village facilities to be vigilant and asks all members of our community – young and old – to show respect for community possessions and think of those who clean and maintain them on your behalf.

Council has just applied for funding to provide 'trim trail' exercise equipment on the playing field for adults, but can only provide its contribution if it hasn't needlessly spent funds elsewhere. It also has to consider whether the continued vandalism means it should kerb spending on new equipment if the existing continues to be mistreated and enjoyment spoilt by the selfish spiteful acts of a few.

Yum, Yum! Help us create a Village in a Cake

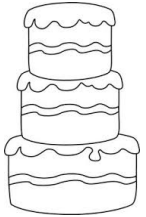
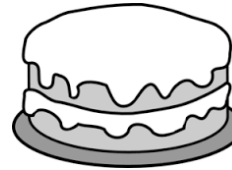

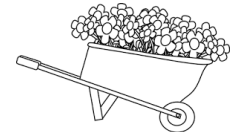

News from 100 years ago

Derbyshire men 'doing their Bit'

It is interesting to read the reporting in the local press of the battles during WW1.

A week after the start of The Somme offensive in July 1916 there was a somewhat 'tempered' report of progress.

The Derbyshire Times: 'The long expected move on the part of the British and French Armies has commenced; and our readers will see that the men of Derbyshire are taking a worthy and notable part in that movement, which is the beginning of the allied offensive. In estimating the true significance of the advances of the British and French Armies we have to bear in mind its relations to the whole field of hostilities. The Central Powers have always hitherto enjoyed the great advantages of their internal lines to concentrate their forces at any point which seems to them desirable at any particular moment. The British and French Armies have moved on as they never ventured before over a front of 25 miles and their successes have given the greatest satisfaction to our military authorities.'

The Battle of The Somme officially lasted from 1st July 1916 to 18th November – some 140 days. Three soldiers from Youlgreave are known to have died in the Battle:

Private John Hubert Slaney – Australian Infantry on 28 July

Private Walter James Cowie – Gordon Highlanders on 23 August

Gunner Charles Brassington – Royal Horse Artillery on 27 October.

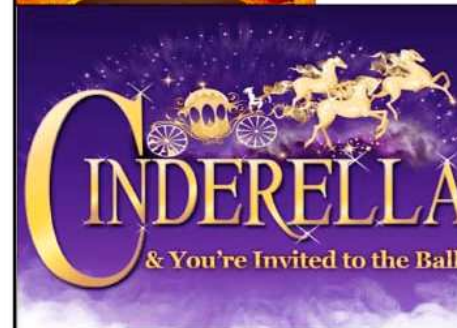

Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: June 2016

The warmer weather has changed things a lot since the last article. Our garden looked like a jungle after only 10 days neglect and new plants are flowering while some have finished. Young birds are starting to leave the nest and I have had reports of a family of redstarts at Alport, young starlings learning how to extract food from feeders and families of tits looking rather scruffy in early life.

On the river there are ducklings and young coots. Coots leave the nest very soon after hatching and are quite red which can cause confusion with young moorhens. A group of four buzzards over the village on the 24th may well have been a family group and buzzards

have been mobbed by crows. Birds of prey have caused interest with a red kite over Stanton and a sparrowhawk kill on our drive. I was alerted by the calls of some very agitated mistle thrushes. These were dive bombing a male sparrowhawk that was plucking and eating a collared dove. I watched this for over an hour when the hawk flew off taking the remains of its meal with it. A collared dove is quite a large kill for a male sparrowhawk, so perhaps it was getting food for a family.

Other birds of interest have been a singing blackcap, linnets, bullfinches, siskins and lots of goldfinches that seem to be doing very well indeed recently. Butterflies have not been numerous so far this year, with overwintering peacocks and small tortoiseshells most often seen; but the meadow browns have recently appeared.

A pair of red damsel flies were watched mating on a new garden pond and there have been several reports of cockchafers. Cockchafers used to be considered a pest as their larvae feed on the roots of plants and became very scarce with the older pesticides. The grubs spend up to five years in the ground until they emerge as the flying adults that can bash repeatedly into your outside lights. The adults live only a few weeks. The grubs have been considered a delicacy in parts of the world.

One hedgehog has been reported. My pre-writing walk on 23 June found 72 species of plants in flower. Water cress has joined the water crowfoot in turning the river white, with help from the ladies smock. The common spotted orchid in my lawn has produced only one flower this year, but the clump in the Dale has about 23 flowers in it, though not quite out yet. Another orchid, the twayblade, is in full bloom, with its green flower deserving closer inspection. Our rare leadwort, spring sandwort, is now in full flower on the spoil heaps around Icky Picky. A linnet on a wall above Hollow Farm was a welcome sight.

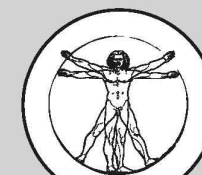
