

St Stephen's Pie

4 oz breadcrumbs; 2 oz self-raising flour; 2 oz soft brown sugar; 3 oz suet; 4 oz raisins; 2 medium cooking apples, peeled and grated; Grated rind of a lemon; 1 egg; 1 tbsp milk; pinch of salt.

Method

- 1. Combine all the dry ingredients in a large bowl, add the raisins, apples and lemon rind and stir well.
- 2. Beat the egg into the milk and stir into the mixture.
- Press the mixture into a well greased 2 pint pudding basin.
- Cover tightly with greaseproof paper and then foil and secure with string.
- Steam the pudding for 2 hours.
