## Youlgrave Pantomime

Not every household in Youlgrave had a television set 40 years ago, but a fair and growing part of the population were already riveted by this brought-to-your-parlour entertainment. So a village pantomime hardly seemed a good bet to lure customers to the paybox and administer the kiss of life to a Village Hall struggling back to financial viability from near-terminal dilapidation. That it instantly became a star attraction says as

much about the nature of rural communities as about the wealth of home-grown talent available to the producer.

Actually, it was not such a leap in the dark as it may have seemed. There had been three or four productions under auspices Major Mockett thirty years previously and there were still a few of the old-stagers, like Bernard Hadfield, ready and willing to tread the boards again: and they were joined by natural entertainers like Harry Sandell and Tom Rhodes, not to mention renowned singers Mary Witham and Vivienne Wragg and.

of course, a band of eager beginners. A couple of concerts in 1960/61 demonstrated the potential for an audience swelled by game-for-anything neighbours like Auntie Polly and her party from Biggin. But what really guaranteed success was the know-how and experience of people the audience never

saw: Brenda Birds and Dorothy Sandell, George Ollerenshaw and that most brilliant of musical virtuosos, Ida Smith. About the only person who didn't know one end of a pantomime horse from the other was Management Council Secretary, Norman Wilson, whose only apparent qualification for the job of writing and producing – as it turned out – 'Babes in the Wood' was that he drew the short straw.

However, he did know enough to pack the cast with children, thereby guaranteeing an appreciative audience of fond parents. And a few other wheezes were employed to edge the scales of success onto the credit side, most of them the work of WB Carter, the Council Chairman, who was not averse to

stoking up the boilers during the first half of a performance in order to sell more ice-cream in the interval.

The fact that the Village Hall, forty years on, is in very good shape and solvent is due in no small measure to the proceeds from an annual pantomime that has gone from strength to strength. Norman Wilson's major contribution was not, as it turned out, to produce the first five editions of this. by now, celebrated district attraction but to produce a wife to sustain it. Jan's productions have been filling the Village Hall for a remarkable 24 years but, like the husband whose fourth production she came from south of the

county to see, she considers the great strength of Youlgrave lies in the splendid team, both offstage and on. Faces change over 40 years, but the spirit of 1962 lives on and 'Puss in Boots' this year's production, written by Jan and set in the ancient Kingdom of lolagrove, will be a tribute to it.

## Sites of Meaning First Stone Installed

Sites of Meaning is a community arts project that began as part of Middleton's Millennium celebration. The team aims to install a marker stone with words chosen by parishioners at each of the 17 sites where a right of way crosses the parish boundary.

#### **Progress Report**

We are now well into the project and at last results are beginning to show. Two

stones are now installed, a single stone near Arbor Low (Site 13) and a pair of gateposts at the Youlgrave end of the Friden road (Site 17).

The Rowlow Brook clapper bridge (Site 6) has been tidied up and is awaiting its inscription, and a stone for the Green Lane crossing with the old Roman road (Site 12)

can be seen in front of Square House. We are hoping to order Longdale (Site 9) and Lowfield Drive (Site 7) stones soon. Negotiations with Haddon Estates are reaching a conclusion on a suitable placement near the small concrete bridge in Middleton Dale (Site 5). We have permission from the highways authority to replace concrete kerbstones with gritstone at Roughwood Hollow (Site 1).

#### Residency

Bringing the project closer to the village has been a priority. And what could be closer than a stone carved in the village!?

> Next year there will be a sculpture residency in the playground area, coinciding with village Welldressina in June. selected artist will develop a stone to be added to the Sites of Meaning collection.

The residency

will be sponsored by the Regional Arts Lottery Programme, through East Midlands Arts, and Derbyshire Dales District Council. It will include workshops and other activities for local schools, colleges and residents.

## From the Cookhouse Door

### Chocolate Supercake

## **Ingredients**

6oz butter, softened; 6oz sugar; 4 eggs, separated; 1 tablespoon ginger marmalade; 6oz plain flour; 2 teaspoons baking powder; 2oz ground almonds; 4oz cooking chocolate, melted.

#### Method

Cream the butter and sugar and add the marmalade. Beat in the egg yolks and melted chocolate. Fold in the flour, baking powder and ground almonds. In a separate bowl, whisk the egg whites until stiff and then fold into the cake mixture. Bake in a greased and lined 8" cake tin for 1hr 25mins, Gas Mark 3.

For the topping: Cream together 4 oz unsalted butter, 6oz icing sugar and 2oz drinking chocolate powder. Moisten with 3 pudding spoons of liquid, either water <u>or</u> brandy <u>or</u> a mixture of both! Spread over the cake and grate a little chocolate on top or ginger pieces.
