Youlgrave Cinema awarded grant

As the *Bugle* went to press, it was confirmed that Youlgrave Cinema, the newly-re-launched village film club, has been awarded a grant of over £9,200 by the Countryside Agency. The money will go towards the purchase of projection equipment and hire of films, and the club is hopeful that the first full season of films will go ahead early in 2004, subject to planned renovation work at the Village Hall.

Last month Youlgrave Cinema held its second successful screening, attracting over 100 people to a showing of the 1997 Oscar-winning film 'Moulin Rouge'.

Moving tales from the Great War

The devastating effect of the Great War on the everyday life of ordinary men and women in the Peak District is related in a touching new production that is being performed locally this month.

Written by Youlgrave-based actor David Frederickson, who also is among the cast of the Cotton Grass Theatre, 'The Unreturning Army' combines music and readings – including the poems of Siegfried Sassoon and Wilfred Owen. David said that the idea came to him after visiting the graves of local men on the Somme battlefield. He went on to research their individual tales, and looked through local records. "I found this fascinating array of stories, from the humorous to the deeply moving," he said.

One such story is that of Horace Johnson, who was born in Youlgrave and lived in Winster from the 1930s. He fought at Gallipoli, and tells

how his breakfast of bully beef and biscuits was interrupted when 'the earth started dancing' as 800 guns begun firing at once. Another story concerns Vera Brittain from Buxton, mother of politician Shirley Williams. Her fiancé and brother were killed at the Front, and the production looks at the devastating effect that this had on her life.

'The Unreturning Army' will be performed at Highfield School, Matlock (5 Nov), Bakewell Medway Centre (6 Nov), St Oswald's Church, Ashbourne (7 Nov), Wirksworth Town Hall (8 Nov) and the Pauper's Pit, Buxton (9 Nov). Shows begin at 7.30pm, with tickets from £6-£8. A donation from ticket sales will be made to the charity St Dunstan's, which helps blind exservicemen and women.

ALBERT SHIMWELL

Youlgrave Band mourns the passing of Albert Shimwell, a dedicated bandsman who started playing as a boy before the Second World War. He played in the Band right through to 1991, playing various instruments on the way - including cornet, euphonium and trombone, finally becoming Conductor. He always did his best for the Band, which he regarded as an important part of village life. Indeed in his final days he told a current member of the band that he wanted it to continue and prosper, which we shall endeavour to do in his memory.

Joseph Gilbert, High Constable for High Peak (1804-37)

The office of High Constable was a very important role. According to the ancient Mander's Derbyshire Miners Glossary of 1824, it was the role of Chief of the Hundred or Wapentoke (Danish origin) who would enter the field on a certain day and accept the homage of the men of that Hundred by the tipping of lances to chow respect and unity under his leadership.

Over the centuries it assumed an administrative role, presiding over and issuing Precept notices, warrants, summons or orders by Commissioners of Taxes, JPs and Deputy Lieutenants. There were Orders of Court, legal documents, duplicate tax returns, lists for jury service and general quarter session notices, as well as the appointment of Overseers of the Poor, licensing of ale houses and collecting, levying and being responsible for

county rates, highway meetings and latterly obtaining returns for the Secretary of State's office regarding population. Fines were levied for evading militia quotas, and many other things.

Thus it can be seen that this was a very responsible office indeed. Joseph Gilbert was a Gentleman Farmer, and his eldest son was a Justice of the Peace, while his other sons, Henry and Theophilas, were schoolmasters between 1841-51 at Stanton in the Peak. His daughters married lawyers and skilled stonemasons, and some of their descendants now live in Virginia, USA. Most of us are still living in Stanton, Youlgrave and the rest of Derbyshire, and some are policemen today in the 21st century, so carrying on his role in a modern manner.
