# Church roof appeal launched

A 'Roof Repair Fund' is being launched this month to help raise £100,000 for a new roof for Youlgrave Church.

Standing at the very heart of Youlgrave, the magnificent building of All Saints dates back to

the 1150s, and has served our community for almost 1,000 years. Like so many of our historic buildings, however, we have seen the cost of maintenance and repairs escalate in recent years, and now we are faced with one of the greatest challenges – the need to replace the entire roof.

Most of us have close links with All Saints: marriage, baptism, confirmation, and funerals of loved ones, and we mark the seasons at important religious festivals like Christmas, Lent, Easter and Harvest. As such, All Saints is so much more than just an imposing historic building: it is very much an integral and much-loved part of our community.

A special Fundraising
Committee has been set up to oversee a programme of activities over the next two years. If we are to succeed in raising such a substantial sum of money, however, we need your help too, be it as a member of the Fundraising Group, a volunteer or by way of a donation to the Roof Repair Fund.

The Fund includes a 'buy a tile' campaign, inviting you to sponsor a 'tile' for as little as £1, so look out for donation boxes in the shops in the coming weeks. There will also be a display up in the Church, illustrating our progress!

We are also looking for enthusiastic iam and pickle makers and clean jars. The jars can be dropped off and collected from Hollands Butchers, where you can also register as a iam/pickle donator, and we will be happy to supply any produce necessary for your jam and pickle making. Cakes, buns etc, would also be very welcome, as we hope to have a stall in the Church during Welldressing Week and at services throughout the summer.

We will also be staging various events over the coming two years, including a hog roast on the Bank Holiday weekend of Saturday 28 August.

Pheasants were imported into this country as a food source and that they still are. They are hand-reared so as not to take unsupplied stock from the wild. They are not purposely bred to be shot. The shooting season is short and for the rest of the time the birds are left alone.

Regarding housing, I too am extremely concerned that we have so many holiday cottages and empty or rarely used houses. Unfortunately these houses are usually at the 'cheaper' end of the market. Something must be done before the village loses its next generation and soul.

Affordable Housing still looms large as an issue cricket team. that remains unsolved. Recent requests for land to build on, voiced in the Bugle, have to date, vielded no response. Landowners have been approached but none is willing to negotiate.

We are in receipt of plans for new road markings the length of the main street through

the village. The object of the plans is to make easier a pedestrian route and also to maintain a reasonable flow and free passage of farm, emergency and public transport vehicles. After public consultation and possible amendment, these will be returned to County for speedy implementation

There has been no further progress to date on the Quiet Lanes Project. There have been some problems with signage. (Some falling over, others disappearing!) But I am hopeful that proposals for phase two will appear shortly.

New railings for Church Corner will be put in place shortly, and should be a great improvement on the utilitarian ones currently on site.

The Playing Field sub-committee has worked hard with risk assessment audits and the setting of contracts for maintenance of the playing field and the facilities. Members of the community are working hard towards the re-establishment of a

The three-day Music Fest was very successful. Improved policing will hopefully deter any troublemakers at the 2004 event.

As usual we have received many plans from people seeking approval for extensions to their houses and farm buildings. Two plans however

> will have more significant impact on village residents. First was one from the school proposing significant changes to the inside of school, providing a reception, library/IT room, staff room and Head Teacher's room separate from the office. Secondly, we approved plans from John Frederick's to extend

and refurbish Thimble Hall. We will view the launch of his new product Thimble Hall Organic Ice Cream with great interest.

At last a streetlight has been fitted at the top of Holywell Lane and we can see our way to the Village Hall!

Finally, we gave many thanks to Ingrid Newman, our parish clerk, for her seven years of service and hard work for the Council. We welcome our new clerk Veronica Kemble.

The AGM of Bakewell District Neighbourhood Watch was held at the Agricultural Business Centre on 31 March 2004. It was well attended and the evening proved to be interesting.

After a talk by Carol Brister about her work correct loc with the Police Authority, Inspector Dean chances dr Wheeldon of Bakewell gave us some pleasing statistics regarding crime in our area and "Derbyshire is one of

regarding crime in our area and the role of Neighbourhood Watch in helping to combat it. It seems that Derbyshire is one of the safest parts of the country and Bakewell Section is the safest part of Derbyshire! Last year's crime figures for

Bakewell Section are the lowest on record (excluding the foot and mouth disease period). The Section has highest detection rate in Derbyshire for both violent crime and vehicle crime. With the exception of burglary (which increased by only one) all categories of crime were reduced. All detected house burglaries came about as a result of information from members of Neighbourhood Watch and other vigilant members of the public.

Insurance figures show that houses in an active Neighbourhood Watch area have a 1 in 344 chance of being burgled compared with the national average of 1 in 34. If you have correct locks on doors and windows your chances drop to 1 in 1350.

If you want advice on home security you can obtain this directly from the police or through Neighbourhood Watch. If you want information about Neighbourhood Watch please contact Bridget Ardley on (01629) 636611.

We were also told about a new scheme called *Data Link*.

This is a free emergency medical information scheme. It makes essential information readily available to the Emergency Services should you or anyone in your family suffer an accident or sudden illness at home. If you would like to make use of this very useful scheme, please contact Bridget Ardley.

#### POSTCARD FROM SPAIN

Thousands of Spaniards and visitors alike have been participating in the numerous processions to celebrate Holy Week or Semana Santa. Malaga is considered to be one of the most important centres of Spain for the celebration of this historic week.

Semana Santa involves the marching in procession of brotherhoods (cofridias) of the Church and penitents, followed by elaborate floats on which sit images of the Virgin or Christ.

For months beforehand, the bands practice their short flamenco style hymns about the Passion and the Virgin's sorrow throughout Fuengirola. The float, carried by in excess of 100 men, some blindfolded and barefooted, winds its way through the streets from the early afternoon onwards, returning to its resting place many hours later.

Good Friday is the climax, when the procession leaves the church at midnight and moves through the town for most of the night. On the Thursday, the older local women tend to wear black and it's considered disrespectful for tourists to wear t-shirts and shorts.

The people who wear the purple hats are called the Nazarenes or penitentes, but obviously have nothing to do with the Ku Klux Klan, despite their resemblance; their tunics are made of velvet and satin and they carry flickering candles, while some carry sceptres. Music is important in the procedure and band and bugles play marches and the procession stops at certain points for a solo religious song. All along the route of the procession, crowds chant 'Viva, Viva'.

Semana Santa in the south of Spain is becoming one of the biggest tourist attractions of the year, and for most people their first experience of this spectacular showing of religious fervour, but it's well worth a look at how different cultures celebrate what we call Easter.

Easter Eggs tend to take a back seat at this time of year in Spain.

### Islay bound...



The trip offers a unique insight not only into the way whisky is produced on the island, but also into how whisky complements the culture and spirit of the island and the inhabitants. Whisky is very much a people's drink, particularly in the Hebrides. Islay whisky is bold and robust in character, yet warm and comforting. These are the same qualities found in the people of Islay.
