Youths sentenced over assaults on playing fields

Three teenage boys were given supervision orders and ordered to pay compensation after admitting their part in two serious assaults on the Alport Lane playing fields during last year's Youlgrave Music Festival.

Ryan Astley, Mark Harlock and Adam O'Nyons, all from Tideswell, were accused of assaulting two other boys on the Saturday evening of the Festival, in an incident that happened away from the supervised marquee. The three assailants were part of a group who had camped at a nearby farm, and appeared to have had little interest in attending the festival to listen to the music. Their conviction was only secured after other young people from the Youlgrave area came

forward as witnesses, with the final case being decided earlier this summer when the last of the three changed his plea to guilty on the eve of his trial. The three were convicted of two assaults each, Astley receiving a 12-month Supervision Order, O'Nyons 10 months and Harlock 8 months. In addition, they were each ordered to pay £50 compensation to both victims. A fourth offender received a police reprimand.

The Police commended the youngsters from the Youlgrave area for coming forward as witnesses, as well as being prepared to make several visits to Court to give evidence.

Welldressing donations

Youlgrave Welldressing Committee has donated £500 to Youlgrave Playgroup to help fund the children's play area on the Alport Lane playing fields, and £500 to Youlgrave School to help fund exterior improvements as part of the refurbishment (benches and planters).



For accommodation we stayed at youth hostels at Belfast, Enniskillen and Bushmills, and together with a boat trip on Lough Erne and a short railway journey back from the Giant's Causeway, we travelled around about entirely on public transport. And with full backpacks it was no mean achievement. Well done to everyone!

The first is a production of Izaak Walton's The Compleat Angler, adapted by Louise Page, and which will staged at Youlgrave Village Hall on Monday 4 October. This is the fisherman's tale to end all tales. As Izaak Walton fights the unequal battle between man and fish, he regales his audience with jokes, songs and jigs.
