New look to Village Hall

Improvements at Youlgrave Village Hall have been given a boost with the news that Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd (WREN) has offered us a grant of over £28,000 to refurbish our kitchen, and improve both the central heating and lighting. WREN uses tax credits to distribute grants to communities who live within a ten-mile radius of a landfill site.

Previously, the National Lotteries Board granted the Village Hall over £127,000 for refurbishments. Sadly the lowest of three tenders was some 33% above our estimate, and we had to settle for refurbishing the exterior including heat and noise barrier, providing ramp and toilet for people with disabilities, improving our sound system including a guard against excessive noise, and adding a fire alarm.

Enthusiasts in DIY have created a new 'Social Room' by knocking two small back rooms into one. The Management Committee is grateful to the many people who have contributed to that effort and to the fundraising that surrounds it. With a little more effort, Youlgrave will achieve everything that we have planned for the Village Hall starting with that new roof in 1998.

When the *Bugle* first appeared in January 1998 it was printed by Jim Bower at Reprint, in Youlgrave - for free! His generosity allowed the Buale to find its editorial feet and not become preoccupied with financial concerns, while at the same time remaining a free publication delivered to the whole community.

As local sponsorship trickled in, the Bugle built up a modest but vital cash reserve, helping to pay, amongst other things, for the special Millennium publication 'Bugle 2000'. Inevitably the Bugle grew and developed, and when Jim decided to call it a day we had to find another printer, and of course pay for their services. We currently use Greenaway Workshop in Darley Dale, a DSS-assisted venture that provides work for people with disabilities. Their prices are extremely reasonable, and we have a very good relationship with them.

However, despite a few new sponsors over the last couple of years, our cash reserves have dwindled and are nearly empty - especially when we run to 16 pages, as we have done these last two months! So, come the New Year, we will have to raise our sponsorship rates to £20 for businesses. Individuals can also sponsor the Bugle at the current rate of £15 - you will be thanked and issued with a receipt, but you don't have to have your name listed on the back page unless you specifically want to. We already rely on the generosity of a number of local people, and more still must be sought if we are to continue to remain a free monthly newsletter for all the people of Alport. Middleton and Youlgrave.

Finally, just to reiterate in case there's any doubt, the Bugle remains, as it is always has done, a wholly voluntary effort. Neither the editorial team nor the deliverers get paid, and our books are inspected annually.

Wildlife Garden go-ahead

Plans to develop Bankside Wildlife Garden have been given the go-ahead, after the Peak National Park approved a planning application to turn the small terraced plot into a community garden, and also to rebuild the historic summer house. Then, a few days before the Bugle went to print, it was announced that an application for a grant had been successful. The Sustainable Development Fund, administered by the Peak National Park, has awarded the garden over £8,000 towards rebuilding drystone walls, erecting fencing, laying a path and digging a small pond, plus the careful renovation of the summer house. NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOULGRAVE'S YOUNG PEOPLE?

A small but enthusiastic and positive meeting in the Reading Room a fortnight ago decided to push vigorously for better recreation and leisure opportunities for local residents.

The meeting unfortunately clashed with other events, and many locals have expressed their disappointment at missing the occasion.

The discussion centred on helping young people achieve a wider range of activities, though it was recognised that all ages deserve better facilities.

Present were former members of the Youth Club, who recalled that one of its strongest advantages was the opportunity it gave for talking together.

A strong point made by the Chair, Andrew McCloy, was that young people themselves should decide their priorities, without being dictated to by older residents. The possibility of establishing a Junior Council, believed to exist elsewhere in the district, met with approval.

Andrew and Bill Moore are to make various enquiries about finance, regulations and red tape, and a second meeting will be held in the Reading Room on Friday 15th October.

Aromatherapy: The art of making people smell nice?

Youlgrave-based **Anna Goodall** has launched a new business as an aromatherapist. Here she outlines the background to his ancient practice.

The use of essential oils for healing is as old as time. The medicinal properties of aromatic plants, flowers and woods were known to all the Great Ancient civilisations, including Egypt, Babylon, China, India, Arabia, Greece and Rome. Indeed, it tells us in the Old

India, Arabia, Greece and Rome. Indeed, it tells us in the Old Testament of these plants which provided us with 'medicines out of the earth'.

However, the word 'aromatherapy' only came into being in the early 20th century. Its true meaning is a therapy using only the aromas of plants, ie the essential oils, not the plants in their entirety such as herbalism.

Essential oils can be extracted from all the various parts of a plant or tree including leaves, flowers, bark, seeds, root, wood, balsam and resin. This is done using a variety of methods, the most common being steam distillation.

During the Middle Ages the monasteries cultivated aromatic plants. In the 14th century, Frankincense and Pine were burned in the streets to try to combat the deadly plague (Black Death) which raged throughout Europe at that time. At the end of the 15th century Parcelus was born. This famous physician and alchemist did not turn base metals into gold, but developed medicines using extracts from healing plants which he named the 'quinta essentia'.

By 1600 essential oils such as Cedarwood, Cinnamon, Frankincense, Myrrh, Rose, Rosemary and Sage were well known to pharmacists; and a century later essential oils were widely used in mainstream medicine until the science of chemistry allowed the creation of materials in the laboratory.

At the turn of the 20th century, chemical science was becoming increasingly important. The ability to produce the active therapeutic properties of plants was a less

costly exercise and enabled large, standardized quantities to be available.

In the late 1950s, the use of essential oils under the name 'aromatherapy' reached Britain. Aromatherapy was not introduced via the medical profession, but via beauty therapists, qualified in massage techniques. This is why for so many years aromatherapy has appeared to be a 'massage using essential oils'.

Today, aromatherapy in its many forms is recognised by doctors and psychiatrists as having beneficial effects. It is used to relieve stress, tension and emotional trauma as well as healing physical damage to the muscles and skeletal supporting tissues. Not only does aromatherapy massage soothe tires aching muscles and joints, but it also:

- Eases stress
- Improves circulation
- Helps to keep wrinkles at bay

New growth for Playing Field Wildlife Area

About ten years ago, the old tip site below the playing field was cleared to form a wildlife area for the village. Trees were planted in the upper part, the lower part was intended as a wildflower area and seating stones were provided. Unfortunately, the site was not managed to maintain this early work and it became overgrown with nettles and rank grasses.

Last autumn, it was decided to recover the site and restore it to its intended use. The area was mown and raked. This removed much unwanted dead matted vegetation and started the process of reducing the fertility of the soil. Reducing fertility discourages larger weeds and rank grasses and gives wild flowers a better chance.

During this year, parts of the nettle areas have been repeatedly mown and a footpath has been kept clear through the site. No attempt has been made to clear all the nettles

as a number of larger wild flowers such as cow parsley and hogweed grow amongst them and nettles are a source of food for butterflies such as small tortoiseshell. The use of herbicides has been avoided and results so far are encouraging. A total of 39 species of plants have flowered during the year, not counting trees. A good range of birds has been seen and field voles are present. The area has now been cut again after waiting for late flowering plants to seed. Next year, it is hoped to further attack the nettle area, maintain the path and continue the process of reducing the taller grasses to encourage wildflowers.

At last, we have a meaningful contact from Freetown, who is keen to help us create a more substantial friendship with our villagers in Sierra Leone. For some time, we have been trying to assess what are the most pressing needs for the people of Bangbutt, struggling to rebuild their lives after a bitter and vicious Civil War. Time and again, we always come back to one issue: we

really need to talk to them face to face. It was out of this realisation that Barbara Scrivener and Peter Ryder are planning to visit Bangbutt in January. Now they will have a very good friend in Freetown to help them – Zynab, who spent a great day with us here in Youlgrave early in September.

Zynab is a wonderful 27year-old woman, a Temne Tricia Donnison parcels up the mountain
by birth, as are our friends of toys that were kindly given for
in Bangbutt, and has been Bangbutt. Many thanks to you all!
appointed to Action Aid in

Freetown and will help to oversee our links with Bangbutt. She is planning to visit the village with a tape recorder to find out from the people themselves – children, adults, village elders – what are the issues that most concern them and how it might be possible for villagers at the other side of the world to help them.

Zynab brought with her an envelope full of lovely letters and pictures done by Bangbutt schoolchildren, with two interesting letters of thanks from the Head Teacher and from Mr Tarawalie. There were also seven brilliant photos of last Christmas's parcel of educational posters being opened. They will be passed round and on display soon.

After a shared lunch, kindly hosted by Chris and Louise at Turret House, some of us took Zynab to visit the School and Church before going on a dog walk along Bradford Dale. It was a picture-book afternoon, with children playing in the river, a pony ambling through Brookleton, and a clear river positively bursting with trout! Zynab kept saying she couldn't believe how beautiful it was and how lucky we all were.

Later she looked at the soft toys we were

planning to send to Bangbutt and said the children there would be delighted with them. So, a very warm **THANKS** to everyone who brought those fabulous toys, etc to the collection we held in Church. Charlotte Bright then promised four boxes of jeans 'seconds' from Philip Wildbore's business 'Fillbar', a great bonus for the villagers of Bangbutt. She can arrange for the toys, jeans

and some extra clothes (please see the clothes collection notice below) to be sent, free of charge to our shipping agent in London via their delivery van. *Many thanks to Fillbar*. Tricia and Barbara then spent an afternoon (in the Figgs' back room!) boxing all the toys.

During our walk with Zynab, she told us that she had been a regular actor in a television soap opera in Sierra Leone. It was particularly interesting as

they use this as a means of dealing with really difficult and sensitive issues: peace, reconciliation, and Aids being big priorities. In spite of her work at Action Aid, she will probably still continue to do at least a few more episodes. So, our Bangbutt contact, an Aid worker and Soap Star! It also turned out that Zynab has a dog and wanted to take home a new, smart dog collar for it. Sometimes, what might be a strange world can be very familiar.

POSTCARD FROM SPAIN...on cars and parking

Well, all our visitors from Madrid, Seville and numerous other places in Spain have finally returned home now that the weather has cooled down a little. Sometimes the temperature has reached 40 degrees in some parts of Spain this August. The Malaga region, being on the coast, only reaches about 35 or 36

degrees, so for the whole of August, Fuengirola has a large influx of holiday makers from these hotter regions, plus English and German tourists.

Fuengirola is a lot like Youlgrave in some respects: they both rely quite heavily on tourism and the extra money that this tourism brings is welcomed by shop keepers and bar owners alike.

I do have some consolation though, I very rarely have to walk in the rain and some Spanish youngsters have only ever seen snow on postcards. Windscreen scrapers, de-icer and antifreeze for the radiator I'm glad to say don't exist.

The Spaniard also has a different outlook on cars to the average Englishman. To the latter the car is his second most treasured possession after the house, but to the Spaniard the car ranks somewhere between the family pet and the wife's mother, as long it starts, stops and goes from A to B. What's a couple of bumps and scratches?

So think of me when you next park up, because I bet you can see your car out of your bedroom window.
