Silver Band graces the airwaves of Derbyshire

Youlgrave Band played four pieces live on BBC Radio Derby's Shane O'Connor Show on Wednesday 22 September, and several members of the Band were interviewed – John Roper (the conductor), Arthur Gilbert, John Cooper, Trudy Roe, Helen Beeston, Andrew and Ivan Robinson, Eddie Walker and Peter Knowles – together with members of the audience, including Mary Hollis whose birthday it was. Shane persuaded the Band to sing 'Happy Birthday' to her! This part of the show, which took an hour, has been recorded on CD. The other two hours of the programme included interviews with other people in Youlgrave, at various locations.

Transmission problems meant that the whole programme was relayed to the Derby Studios via the phone line of a Band member.

The programme was a preamble to Radio Derby's **Money Mountain Appeal** which the Band had applied to for a grant of £5,000 in order to buy new instruments. This culminated in the Appeal itself, which occupied the whole of Sunday 10 October on

Radio Derby.

Five members of the Band volunteered to help with this by manning the telephones for four hours in the very crowded studio, alongside pairs of presenters in two-hour shifts chattering away, together with producers, chalkers writing up incoming bids shouted out by the phone operators on a board, supervisors and caterers, all in a studio the size of your average living room. It was chaotic, it was noisy, it was exhausting but it was fun and a triumph of organisation.

During our shift, the Appeal fund reached £1 million over its 22-year life. We were asked to play a fanfare, in less than ideal conditions, crouched on the floor between the tables whilst the phones rang around us. Well done to Janet and Alan, Ivan, Ian and Peter.

The Band's next appearance will be at a concert in the Wesleyan Reform Chapel, Holywell Lane, at 7.30 pm on Saturday 20 November.

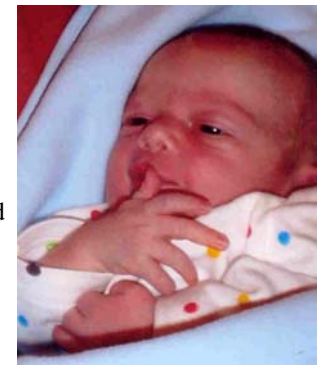

Tasty reward for environmental health check

Cutting costs to their pockets and the planet earned some Youlgrave residents a prize hamper of top quality, locally-produced food.

Residents of the Abbeyfield Society sheltered housing association on Alport Lane were the winners in a prize draw, after requesting a free Environmental Health Check as part of the Peak District National Park's Skills for Sustainable Business project. The check, carried out by project officer Pete Spriggs, helped the housing association identify ways they could reduce their waste, water and energy – and in the process save money.

"The Environmental Health Check threw up a whole host of ideas," said Pete, "from simple measures such as fitting energy-efficient light-bulbs or running the dishwasher on its economy setting, to bigger issues such as checking the energy rating when buying

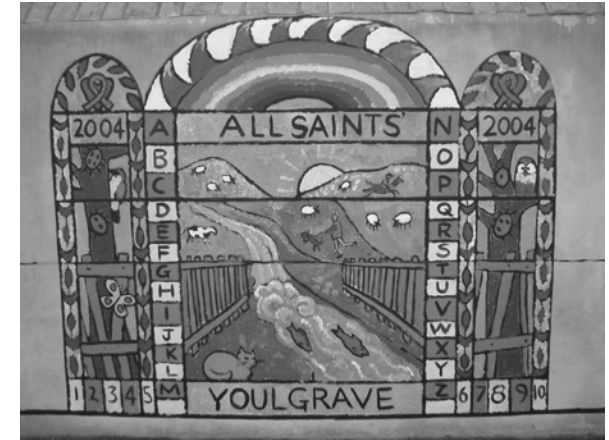
Youlgrave School's new Play Wall

Garden Open Day to celebrate funding award

Last month, the small group of local volunteers behind the planned wildlife garden on Bankside was celebrating the news that they had been awarded over £12,000 from the Peak National Park's Sustainable Development Fund to develop the community nature reserve.

As a result there is to be an Open Day on Saturday 13th November, between 11am-3pm, to share our exciting plans to develop a small overgrown terrace into a peaceful haven for wildlife for everyone to enjoy.

The idea is to turn what at the moment is a piece of scrubland high up on the River Bradford's northern bank into a community garden for the whole village.

A period summer house, currently derelict, will be carefully renovated to provide a shelter and possibly some basic natural history interpretation. Walls and fences will be restored – which, like the summer house, will involve local contractors – and there are plans to dig a pond and lay a simple nature trail. Bird and bat boxes, selective planting, and so on, are all under consideration.

Over the last couple of years there have been several working parties that have helped keep the rampant vegetation under control, including groups from the British Trust for Conservation Volunteers and 1st Youlgrave Guides. Now, with the promise of substantial funding, the work can begin in earnest – and although this might not be an especially active time of year for most gardeners there is still plenty to do on the small plot of land on Bankside.

So come along on Saturday 13th November and see for yourself what plans are afoot. There will be some light refreshments, plenty of good conversation, and perhaps even a little scrub clearance and a small bonfire to end the day. And, as always, new helpers and supporters are very welcome. If you would more details about Bankside Wildlife Garden contact me on 636189. The garden is located just beyond (and below) Rising Moon Cottage, which is half way down Bankside on the right... see signs on the day!

POSTCARD FROM SPAIN



Fuengirola Feria starts on 6 October every year and lasts for a full week, a week when all non-essential services close, basically leaving only bars, restaurants and medical services still fully operational. In fact, bars are busier than usual with people celebrating the week's festivities. As usual, the festival has a religious base and in this case it is dedicated to Fuengirola's patron Saint, Señora del Rosario. The FERIA kicks off on the opening morning with the highly entertaining, if not highly dangerous, 'Bull Run', where about 150 of the town's young men are chased for about a mile through the town by 3 or 4 young bulls (novillas) into Fuengirola's Bull Ring. I remember 2 or 3 years ago a couple of lads from Youlgrave did the Bull Run and commented that perhaps they preferred not to compete again; well not in the foreseeable future anyway.

The locals all wear national costume, the men dress up as Gauchos in their riding gear with leg chaps and leather boots and hats, and the women dress in their 'Trajes', highly decorative and colourful dresses, which according to a friend of my wife cost a fortune to buy and usually the same one is worn every year, being taken in, or let out according to the woman's change in vital statistics.

The bars are open nearly 24 hours a day, but it is rare to see many drunken revellers because everything is taken at a measured and leisurely pace, so the practice of so called 'binge' drinking never occurs. It is more common to be drinking in a bar with a Spaniard sat astride his horse and drinking Fino sherry. Every night of the week there are musicians performing in the local square, mostly Flamenco music, but sometimes there are younger musicians who play more up to date music not unlike the music the youngsters in England appreciate, and all absolutely free! For a whole week the town is full of horses and their riders, and the mess they leave behind must keep rose growers with ample stocks of manure for months to come.

At the end of the FERIA, everybody walks down to the local fairground, to the dodgem cars, waltzers, big dipper and the like, with stalls selling produce like 'Jamon Serrano' (cured ham), Boquerones (small pickled fish) and other local delicacies, followed by one of the biggest firework displays I have ever seen. It lasts for about three quarters of an hour, and the resulting noise can be heard all over town, then home to bed, work next day, and that's the FERIA finished for another year. All we have to look forward to now is Navidad (Christmas), but that's another story.

Go wild in the garden!



Consciously cultivating nettles and brambles and doing useful things with old tyres was the accepted image of 'wildlife' gardening. Looking like Bob Flowerdew and getting animated about compost also helped. But things have moved on and the wildlife garden is now accepted as a wonderful and satisfying haven for the human animal too, as we shall see in the coming months as our own village wildlife garden unfolds.

One of the most pleasing gardens I have seen in years of garden visits was the garden of the RSPB headquarters in Bedfordshire. Here lovely features like perennial borders alive with butterflies and bees and a wildflower lawn raised to eye level were set in a beautifully designed plot. Even the compost area was a delight, and I am not obsessed with compost!



Autumn wildlife projects



Small efforts yield great results. The soil is still warm enough for planting perennials and shrubs. Choose daisy-flowered plants and aster, pentstemon, scabious, verbascum, astringent, achillea and sedum to provide food for butterflies and insects. Useful shrubs in this respect are buddleia, lilac, privet, lavender and ornamental elder. Hedgehogs are now rummaging around for safe and dry hibernation sites. Piles of dry leaves and brushwood left where they won't be disturbed are useful, or a custom built wooden hibernation box is even better. Derbyshire Wildlife Trust, on 01773 881188, will be able to help.

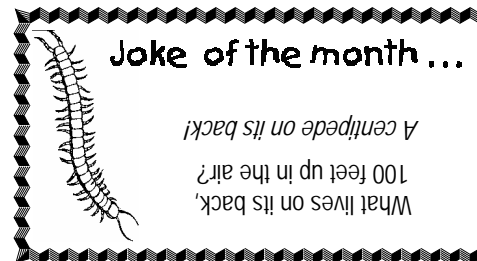
