
We are investigating the organisation of outings, to sports centres, bowls, ice skating, and the cinema.



Go wild in the garden!

The breeding season is now in full swing and there is bird activity everywhere. Migrant warblers like chiff-chaff, willow warbler, blackcap and whitethroat are singing loudly in the woods and hedges. Gardens are a major habitat for small birds, seeking food. cover and nest sites. In a small garden additional possibilities can be created with climbers and wall shrubs whilst adding an extra planting dimension. Recommended easy shrubs to grow against walls are ceanothus and honevsuckle on a sunny aspect and pyracantha and ivv on a shady aspect. Climbing hydrangea will also form a dense self-supporting cover, on a shadier wall. Sometimes bats will also use dense wall plants to roost in.



Wildlife project of the month

It is important that your wildlife pond has a good natural-looking planting

around it. A boggy area adjacent to the pond can be easily created by a hollow lined with pond liner with some holes in the bottom. The edge can be disguised with turf. Marsh marigolds are easy to grow. Purple loosestrife, sweet flag, meadowsweet and hemp agrimony will also add to that natural look and attract insects, bees and butterflies. Water mint is also excellent but will need controlling in a small space.
