# It's your heritage... so have your say!

Thanks to a grant of up to £28,700 from the Heritage Lottery Fund, Youlgrave's historic welldressing displays will soon be immortalised in a permanent photographic exhibition. And to follow that, another exhibition in pictures and words will highlight the diversity of Youlgrave's history.

The quality of our traditional methods ranks Youlgrave high in the Premier League of Derbyshire Welldressings. Youlgrave Welldressing Committee preserves photographs recording tap dressings over the past 40 years and more. Because photographs, stored in albums, are hidden from general view, a selection is to be copied digitally, reproduced in collages, and displayed in a semi-permanent exhibition mounted on the walls of the Village Hall. We expect the photographic exhibition to be on display before next Christmas.

The second exhibition will take six months to plan. Because of the wide spectrum of topics that could be displayed, we expect to involve an equally wide spectrum of

enthusiasts. What makes a suitable subject? For a start, we are lucky to live amongst some of the finest scenery in the country. And our village is surrounded by prehistoric monuments such as Arbor Low. All Saints Church compares Norman and Gothic arches; is there a dramatic story behind these rival technologies? Instead of conventional twinning with some European village, we link with Bangbut and we are helping that wartorn African village reinstate its water supply. Water is close to the heart of Youlgrave since our system belongs to the residents. Live arts thrive: our pantomime: our Silver Band: our theatres. Youlgrave Cinema tells anecdotes of its past and now enjoys a present-day revival.

# **Royal British Legion outing to Eden Camp**

On a cold St George's day, members of the Mens and Ladies section, along with their friends, departed from Grove Place for a visit to Eden Camp, situated near Malton, North Yorkshire. It is the only modern history theme museum of its type in the world.

After a very smooth journey and an enjoyable comfort stop we arrived outside the camp gates at eleven o'clock, and after alighting from our coach we were able to watch a memorial service for Second World War escape lines. These organisations helped a large number of allied servicemen to escape from countries occupied by the Germans under harsh and dangerous conditions. In 1942 a sergeant and a small contingent of army personnel arrived at Malton. Their immediate task was to construct a barbed wire enclosure and erect tents to house the flow

of enemy prisoners of war captured in North Africa. The site was named Eden Camp, being close to Eden House and farm.

The first inmates were Italian prisoners. They were put to work and constructed a permanent camp consisting of forty-five huts. The Italians left the camp in 1944, and the next batch of prisoners to arrive were the Germans who stayed until 1948. Like the Italians, the German prisoners of war worked on the local farms under the control of the war agricultural officer.

POW Camp 83, as it became known, was discovered virtually intact in 1986 by a local business man, Stan Johnson. Up to 35 of the original huts were in roughly the same condition as they were when the last of the 1,200 inmates left for the 'Fatherland', Germany, in 1948.

The huts were re-equipped to tell the story of civilian and military life during World War II. Each of the huts gives a wonderfully illustrated account, which begins with the rise of Hitler and outbreak of hostilities. Other huts deal with rationing, evacuees and the problems involved transporting them from the cities into the countryside and safer homes. Plus there were

details about the Home Guard, the Blitz, utility clothing and furniture, Land Army girls, Bomber Command (Ops Room) and pathfinders (dropped flares and incendiary bombs) to illuminate the targets for the bomber crews.

Equally well portrayed, in other huts, was the work of the auxiliary fire service, the WVS, the Red Cross, the rescue services, the 'Bevan Boys' (men directed to work down the mines to produce vital supplies of coal for industry and the railways). Other huts tells off military events which took place around the world and depict scenes of the miraculous retreat from Dunkirk, the Battle of Britain, North Africa (Tobruk, Bengazi and the decisive Battle of El Alamein), the Dambusters ram on the dams of the Rhur valley, and the bloody war in the Far East.

In the midst of our journey around the

enthralling look back at one of the darkest times of our nation's history, time was found to enjoy huts 16, 17, and 19. Here was the prisoners' canteen, officers' tea room, cinema, bar and ice cream parlour, all offering individual memories and treats. The canteen menu of sausage and mash, stew and dumplings, fish and chips, apple pie and other slimmers' delights were enjoyed along with the odd tipple.

The time passed all too quickly and we had to depart at 5pm. After another equally enjoyable comfort stop on our return journey we arrived back home just after 8pm. A very well deserved vote of thanks to Harry Hutchinson and Eddie Oldfield for supplying us with a comfortable coach and organising entry to the museum. After the great success of this particular outing, more, I hear, are being requested. Any suggestions would be most welcome.



# Bankside Wildlife Garden begins to take shape

At first glance it seems nothing more than an untidy bed of nettles, weeds and rogue saplings, but look again and you will see that the pieces are slowly falling into shape as Youlgrave's ground-breaking wildlife garden begins to take on a structure.

Last year, plans for developing the half-acre strip of terraced land below Maggie Ford's cottage on Bankside were boosted by the award of around £10,000 from the National Park's Sustainable Development Fund. This has helped to

In addition, a team from the British Trust for Conservation Volunteers has helped shift soil and dispose of rubbish, and there are plans for girls and boys from Youlgrave's newly-founded Duke of Edinburgh's Award group to help clear undergrowth, put up bird boxes and create a permanent path around the small garden. A pond is also going to be dug, and when the vegetation is brought a little more under control there is likely to be limited planting and sowing of indigenous flora.

There's still some way to go before the wildlife garden, a village resource aimed at the whole community, is fully opened to the public, but the first, firm steps have now been taken.




# Photographic exhibitions at Village

The first is devoted to existing photographs of past welldressings. However, this article relates solely to the second exhibition, which is devoted to

We have space for 19 more collages, each 1.5 metres high and 0.6 metres wide. In order to comply with the Disability Discrimination Act, the size of lettering is to be at least

Since at least half of each collage should consist of pictorial material, the absolute maximum number of words that can be accommodated is 325.

Some of the subjects that might be included are listed into groups with the number of collages available:

1 – 4 Youlgrave at work: lead mining (and origin of Youlgrave's name), the mine disaster, quarrying, geology and radon, Youlgrave Waterworks (including Fountain Square and taps), old mills.

# Hall to document the past and present

**5 – 8 Youlgrave arts**: pantomime, cinema, theatres, silver band, painting, Music Fest.

**9 – 11 Youlgrave countryside**: the dales and dams, walks around Youlgrave, Arbor Low, Stanton Moor and Robin Hood's Stride; appropriate map.



# Go wild in the garden!

A garden pond will be home to large numbers of dragonflies and damselflies. The way to tell the difference is in the flight.

Damselflies will flutter gently over the water whereas a dragonfly will dart powerfully around, particularly when mating. Eggs are laid on the stems of water plants so there must be a good supply of these in the pond, particularly taller ones. Good ones to use are common water crowfoot, frogbit, amphibious bistort and water lilies.



June is the time of roses in the garden and also when many native shrub roses come into flower. These are generally less demanding than other roses and their simple flowers provide nectar for insects and hips for birds. Rosa rugosa makes a lovely fragrant hedge with large hips. The common native dog rose looks pretty in a mixed wildlife hedge, as does the sweet briar, which has an apple scent. All of these give an informal feel to the wildlife garden.
