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

'Youlgrave Remembers': reaction and feedback

Dear Sir
The photograph featured here is of my father, Harold Bosley, and his war medals (some highly commended). He joined the Cheshire Regiment as a regular in 1927 and served until 1937, when he married my mother, Joyce Buxton, from Middleton. They lived in a cottage at Coldwell End. He was a regular reserve and was the first serviceman in Youlgarve to rejoin when war broke out.

He was at Dunkirk and stood waistdeep in water until being picked up by a fishing boat.

My uncle, Samuel Tunnecliffe Buxton from Middleton, was also in the Second World War. He fought on the front lines. He was invalided out when a lorry tipped over and broke his pelvis.

They spoke little of their experiences. Both men are loved and respected and remembered by myself, brothers and sister.

I have been asked whether copies will be available for sale. The answer is yes and no. There will be a few available on the night, but I am looking more to subscription, about which more later. I would like to think it could be used as a first chapter in an ongoing historical record - a kind of running time capsule, adapted and expanded by a village society. To what purpose? Well, think what life would be like in Youlgrave just a hundred years ago, when the fathers of some of us were already teenagers: no gas or electricity, no motor vehicles, no telephones, neither radio nor television and no computers. What would it be like to meet the farmers. the leadminers, the quarrymen and the

housewives, to hear their recollections and

opinions? We can't, of course, fascinating

though it would be, but we have no excuse for leaving our descendants equally mystified. We have the wherewithal: sophisticated vision and sound recording equipment is widely at hand to keep a living journal of our own lives and times for the enlightenment of future generations. To my mind, Youlgrave/Middleton is crying out for the kind of historical society

> that so many of our neighbouring villages already topics are boundless: a catalogue of places and their names, reminiscences from the older end and, for the young, an opportunity to write, produce and edit local docudramas en route to fame and fortune in television and films. Bored!

Whatever next?

And for now, 'Beyond the Bells and The Bull' could be extended to identify subscribers. They could be named in stills from the film or, if not appearing on any of the scenes, they could be digitally photographed and incorporated in an annexe. Perhaps a subscriber might choose to enshrine the memory of his parents or grandparents: an attached written list could establish family connections. The possibilities are boundless. Or am I just cooking up pie in the sky?

Youlgrave Village Hall Project nears completion

Starting with the new roof in 1998, Youlgrave Village Hall 'Project' is nearing completion. With financial help from The Big Lottery (formally Community Fund) we built the extension that houses the toilet for the disabled, replaced rusting corrugated iron walls with a modern material, and a whole lot more. Last February, with financial help from WREN (Waste Recovery Environmental Ltd), we refurbished the kitchen; this summer, we closed for a short period while we extended the lighting system and improved the central heating system by fitting low surface temperature radiators.

Funding has come from many other sources too, including local authorities, Welldressing, Youlgrave WI, and charities such as Help the Aged. Generous donations have supplemented the fund raising efforts through Attic Sales (next one is on 10th September). Most important of all, DIY effort has linked the project together and most recently supported the internal decoration.

Village hall activities continue to thrive: Youlgrave Women's Institute. Monday Club, Darby & Joan and Women's Section British Legion always welcome new members. Badminton. indoor bowls, afternoon tea dances, and table tennis use the hall regularly. Cinema, theatres, the annual band concert, art classes and, of course, our annual pantomime, all grow in stature, and soon these arts will be supplemented by the photographic exhibitions of Youlgrave Welldressings. and Youlgrave history past and present. The hall is still a popular venue for celebration parties though, unfortunately, the new government regulations on alcohol licensing will add complication and cost to hiring.

We re-opened on 20th August, and in celebration of the successful Project the Management Council is arranging an Open Day on 10th December as a "thank you" to all our sponsors and volunteers. Everyone in the Youlgrave, Middleton and Alport will be welcome.

A short history of the Youlgrave tennis courts

Tennis was first played on the new, purpose-built hard courts at the bottom of Alport Lane playing fields in the summer of 1987. It had taken several years of planning and preparation, and around 1,000 tons of material was needed to level the sloping

surface and provide firm foundations. Before then, tennis was played on grass courts.

The newly-founded Youlgrave Tennis Club raised almost £2,300 towards the total cost of £8,205, and further contributions came from the West Derbyshire Lottery and the Sports Council, with the latter also loaning the club £1,000.

The work was carried out on a shoestring budget, with machinery leant free of charge from nearby quarries (when they could be spared). Bad

weather delayed the work, as heavy vehicles were not allowed on the soft playing field.

However, despite the generosity of local quarries and some vigorous local fundraising, there was still a shortfall of

approaching £3,000, so the committee decided to introduce a joining fee for new members and set an annual subscription – the cost of which inevitably rose.

We want to encourage people of all ages and abilities to continue playing and enjoying

tennis on the courts, but you MUST be a member of Youlgrave Tennis Club. We have to meet various running costs – repairs to the nets and perimeter fences, maintaining the court surface and shelter, and so on. Go wild in the garden!

The Bankside Wildlife Garden is making excellent progress. The boundaries have been made safe with walling and fencing and work is in hand on the restoration of the summerhouse. This will provide a dry seating area and an information point for visitors. Much basic clearing of the site remains to be done until it can be seen where to best place features such as a pond, seating areas, woodland and spaces for native plants. Bird and bat boxes should be under production soon and a start made on digging the pond.

Wildlife project of the month

Attractive seedheads of grasses and perennials are appearing on verges and hedgerows. These not only look good but are a useful food source for many birds in autumn after providing nectar for insects. Luckily some of the best examples are lovely architectural flowers and grasses which look superb in the wildlife garden, and extend its season of interest into the winter. Teasels are fascinating in all seasons and finches feed on seed heads. Honesty and Fennel also come into this category. Globe thistle is an attractive grey-leaved plant for a sunny spot. Ladybirds love to overwinter inside its seedheads. Instead of trimming the border down in autumn leaving any likely-looking seedheads can be enormously useful to wintering wildlife.
