A few simple steps will ensure we stay a low crime area

Just because we live in an area with one of the lowest crime rates in the country doesn't mean we can be complacent. Youlgrave and nearby villages were recently the target of thieves who broke into several sheds and garages in one night. Our proximity to the A515 means we are periodically prone to visits by travelling criminals who can commit more crime in one night than Youlgrave generally experiences for the rest of the year.

The only way to combat this is 'target hardening', which basically means making your property as secure as it can be. This doesn't mean turning our properties into fortresses, but it does mean applying basic common sense, such as fitting decent padlocks to sheds and outbuildings and, where appropriate, shed alarms. Propertymarking assists when property is recovered, and the use of heavy duty chains and padlocks can deter thieves

from progressing further than your shed door. All of the above items are available at local police stations and the mobile police station, with **shed alarms** priced at £5 and heavy duty chains with **padlocks** at £8.

In addition, reporting anything suspicious in your neighbourhood and generally looking out for your neighbours is the best crime prevention method of all. At the Neighbourhood Watch meeting in May (see below) I will bring along the above items, together with property-marking pens and forms for membership of Derbyshire Constabulary's community message broadcasting service or 'Ringmaster'. This allows you to receive relevant information of crimes and suspicious activity in your area via phone or email.

I would like to reiterate that we **do** live in a low crime area, but following just a few simple steps will ensure we keep it that way.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Long-serving Parish Councillor decides to retire

After more than three decades as a Youlgrave Parish Councillor, Tom Gladwin of Coldwell End has announced that he will not be standing again this year. A full report and tribute to his long service will appear in the next Bugle.

Local elections

There will not be a Parish Council election for Youlgrave in May, and likewise Middleton and Smerrill Parish Council is also uncontested. However, the elections for the District Council will still take place on Thursday 3 May as advertised, including Lathkill and Bradford Ward.

New interpretation board

Youlgrave Parish Council is pleased to announce the unveiling of a new interpretation board at its Coldwell End car park. The project has been funded by Natural England and highlights, amongst other things, Lathkill Dale National Nature Reserve. But it also contains information supplied by the Parish Council about Youlgrave's local services (including shops, pubs and the garage), as well as some general details of village history.

Mawstone Mine disaster: Anniversary Service on 3 June

The 75th anniversary of the Mawstone Mine tragedy, when eight men lost their lives following a gas explosion in a local lead mine, will be remembered by a special service at All Saints Church. Well dressing – get your hands dirty!

Saturday 12 May is your chance to come to a workshop to learn all about the physical stuff involved in the wonderful tradition of well dressing.

Did you know?

It takes around 250-300 hours to petal a well dressing? That's at least six people doing a ten hour stint each day for five days, or 24 people doing two and a half hours each day. This doesn't include the time spent by our well dressing apprentices — our valuable petal pullers and flower collectors.

During well dressing week, we have practice boards at each well for the children to try out their designs and techniques, and the post office sells out of nail scissors!

The heavy stuff

Soaking the boards, preparing the clay, puddling, erecting and dismantling, takes a team of ten people about ten hours over three weeks — another 100 hours. We need fit, strong teenagers and adults for these jobs. It's not much of a time commitment, but we can't do it without you and it's great fun.

Whether you are arty and creative, would like to spend a couple of hours getting to know your village neighbours, or are or just intrigued to find out more about how much fun we all have in June every year, come along to the workshop or contact Fred Baker on 636768.

The workshop will give you a chance to meet the team, have a go, and hopefully be inspired to get involved in whatever way you can. Please bring a pair of small scissors.

The Battle of Copenhagen – or from Youlgrave to Yarmouth

In Youlgrave churchvard there is a gravestone for Joseph Oldfield, died 31 December 1864. It is inscribed with the legend "he served under Admiral Nelson" at the Battle of Copenhagen".

On the 31 March - 2 April 2007, a very moving event happened in Great Yarmouth at Middle Gate Gardens. The 1805 Club held this event which culminated in the unveiling of a monument entitled "Homage to all Heroes". The Battle was a very significant one but is rarely remembered, being overshadowed by Nelson's victory and death at Trafalgar in 1805. It proved a controversial battle, being received with more muted adulation when contrasted with the highly successful Battle of the Nile, but nevertheless it was a very important victory for the British.

A ceremony to mark true heroism and sacrifice by all engaged was held with a

civic dinner and a special service at St Nicholas' church.

The unveiling was done by Captain Niels A K Olsen. Danish Defence Attaché. The procession from the Town Hall to the Gardens comprised the Lord Lieutenant of Norfolk, Royal Naval officers, civic leaders and descendants of Nelson.

It was on 12 March 1801 that the British Fleet had sailed to Battle from Yarmouth Harbour. The Admiral in charge was Sir Hyde Parker. Tremendous feats of bravery, courage and humanity were displayed in the Battle of Copenhagen which took place on 2 April. The wounded were brought back to Yarmouth Harbour in the aftermath.

From Youlgrave to Yarmouth - to battle - and safely back again.

VILLAGE PLAN - THE FIRST STEPS

The first meeting of the group set up to lead the work on the Village Plan was held on Monday 16 April in Youlgrave Village Hall, with about a dozen people present. David Frederickson was elected chairman and Stella Sparrow will be the treasurer.

The first task was to put together a project outline which shows how we intend to consult widely and involve everybody in the village. The aim is to get a picture of how people see the strengths and weaknesses of their village - what they like and don't like about it and how it might be improved. This first stage will enable us to apply for grant aid from Derbyshire Rural Community Council to help pay for the costs of printing, venue hire, etc.

There are many issues that people want to see addressed – from lorries and litter to housing, parking, sustainability, provision for the young and the elderly and the future of village shops. What ought to stay the same and what should change for the better? The final Village Plan will reflect all of this and be an expression of how we see our village going forward.

We intend to hold a series of events to give everybody a chance to have their say. Watch this space – and the local noticeboards.

GO WILD IN THE **GARDEN**

Blackthorn or sloe is in resplendent bloom, shining out on gloomy days. The native hawthorn is loaded with buds and will soon be in flower, hopefully as unusually abundant as last year's show. Many native trees and shrubs are valuable additions to the garden situation. One of the best is Viburnum Opulus or Guelder Rose. It needs a bit of space but rewards with flowers. lovely translucent berries and autumn colour. Crab apple or Malus is a lovely small tree for the garden and will pollinate other apple trees. There are many attractive varieties for even the smallest garden. Ornamental forms of hazel. hawthorn and elder are manageable additions. In the case of hazel and elder. some garden varieties have golden or purple foliage.



WILDLIFE PROJECT

As well as creating a wildlife meadow in the garden native flowers can be included in other places in the borders. Primroses like a bank with dappled shade whilst cowslips like an open sunny site in short grass. For the bog garden area around the pond purple loosestrife, sweet flag, lady's smock and ragged robin will be happy with damp feet. To grow in the base and edges of a native hedgerow, violet, stitchwort, red campion, cranesbill, sweet cicely and white deadnettle should naturalise well. These will adapt well to the dry soil in the hedge bottom. When a hedge is well established wild clematis and dogrose can be added to scramble through.
