Get involved in the future of our village

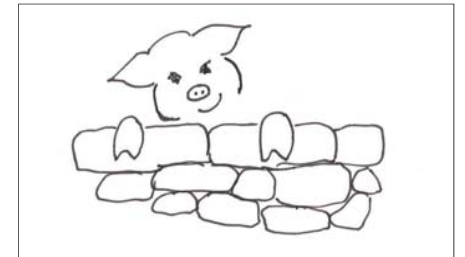
Youlgrave has embarked on a process to draw up a formal 'Village Plan', but to make it work everyone must have their say...

The Pommie Pig is stepping on to the stage – this time to invite us to have a good think about our village and make our opinions known about what we hold dear and what might be improved in Youlgrave.

Pippy the pig has become the mascot for the Village Plan and will be heading the paper and posters of six different groups. These will be looking at housing; shops and businesses; transport and access; the street and public spaces; youth issues; and sustainability.

All the thoughts and ideas from these groups will be pulled together and put into a document – the Village or Parish Plan – that can be used when we apply for grants or talk to local authorities about their plans for Youlgrave.

This initiative is backed by Youlgrave Parish Council and is being supported by Derbyshire Rural Community Council and the Peak District National Park Authority, as well as the Rural Housing Enabler employed by Derbyshire Dales District Council.

He has always lived in Youlgrave, where he was a joiner and undertaker. He is a life member of the Wesleyan Reform Church, where he is Treasurer and Steward.

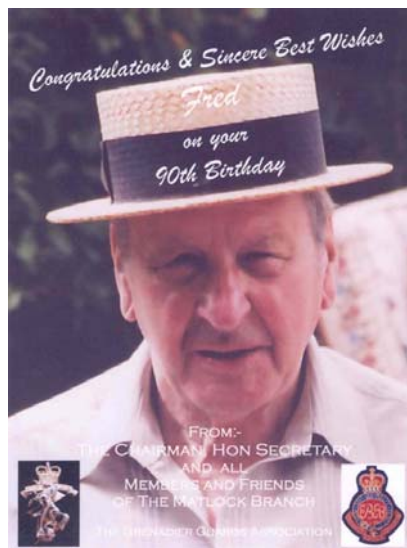
As a season ticket holder to a seat at Derbyshire Cricket Club, his favourite occupation is to take a bus to Derby and enjoy a good day's play.

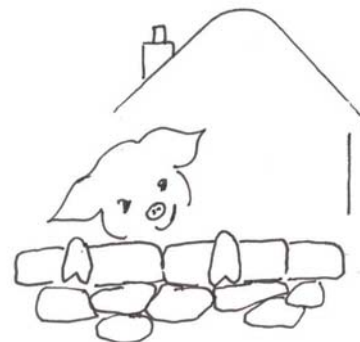

LETTERS: MIDDLETON WELLDRESSING, GENESIS AND CLIMATE CHANGE



Dear Editor,
The ladies of Middleton are to be congratulated on their design for this year's welldressing. It links two different topics, which have a deep meaning for all of us at this crucial time as we are experiencing the impact of climate change.

I do wonder how many of those who viewed the beautiful display have perceived the direct link, which begs the question: When did the Green movement really began?

The answer is to be found in Genesis, chapter 2, verse 15, where we are told that, prior to the Fall, the Creator placed Adam in the perfect garden to do two things: to **work** in it and to **keep** it, or to **take care** of it. The two Hebrew words, *abad* and *shamar*, are highly significant.

The first word *abad* means to **work as a husbandman**, and by implication to **serve** and even to be a **worshipper**. It clearly means that the Creator's design concept was for us to be active (not passive) in creation, having a very high regard for His gift to us, and not just to sit back and enjoy it and ignore His job description for us!

The second word, *shamar*, is also a compound word with several highly revealing meanings besides those mentioned above: to **protect**, to **attend to**, to **guard**, to **observe**, to **preserve**, to **watch over**. The last meaning appears elsewhere in the Old Testament for the man who sat at the gate of the walled village or town as a look out, watching for danger coming!

The Creator's command to our ancestor could not have been clearer, and this was




within a perfect environment! The responsibility is far greater after the Fall, when one of the three major consequences was a breakdown between man and the environment. Throughout history ever since, we have failed appallingly and selfishly in our responsibility to obey His requirements. We are now reaping

increasingly the result of our neglect of the command in His operating manual! (We Christians, along with Jews and Muslims, all of whom accept the authority of Genesis, carry an especial accountability.) Time has almost run out, we are repeatedly told, as one after another of the recent scientific studies inform us.

Where do we go from now? Back to the Creator's original command as prodigals, in repentance and

humble obedience. Thank you, Middleton Ladies, for reminding us!

MAYBE you have never been to our chapel – we'll always welcome you?



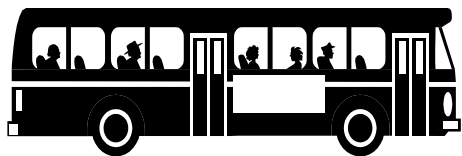

The garden is laid out in a series of connected 'compartments'. Visitors are taken on a journey of discovery through tunnels and pathways to individual

Youlgrave Cinema: new season of films for 2007/08

Hard to believe maybe, but the village film club is set to launch its *fifth* season of films this autumn – and our programme is, as ever, packed with a varied range of top quality movies.



Among the headline films coming up is THE QUEEN, featuring an Oscar-winning turn from Dame Helen Mirren as Queen Elizabeth II during the time of Princess Diana's death, as well as the highly-rated re-make of CASINO ROYALE starring Daniel Craig as the new James Bond.

LITTLE MISS SUNSHINE is a recent comedy about a family's hilarious cross-country journey in a VW bus as they strive to get their young daughter to the finals of a beauty pageant. October's film is TO KILL A MOCKINGBIRD starring Gregory Peck, the 1962 adaptation of Harper Lee's classic book about racial prejudice in the American Deep South.

We also travel overseas with IL POSTINO, a delightful film from Italy about a postman and poetry. BABEL is an Oscar-winning film starring Brad Pitt and Cate Blanchett, and tells the interlocking story of four different families in separate parts of the world.

Next April we ride into town with Clint Eastwood in THE UNFORGIVEN, an impressive Western from the 1990s that also features Morgan Freeman and Gene Hackman. Also look out for THE STATION AGENT, a comedy/drama that proves loneliness is much better to

bear when you have someone else to share it with.

As before, to see the films you have to become a member of Youlgrave Cinema (or come along as a pre-booked guest of a member). Prices have stayed the same as

last season: £28 for the season of eight films – that's just £3.50 per film, and for that you also get a short film before the main feature and free film notes!

GO WILD IN THE GARDEN

A garden pond will be home to large numbers of dragonflies and damselflies. The way to tell the difference is in the flight. Damselflies will flutter gently over the water whereas a dragonfly will dart powerfully around, particularly when mating. Eggs are laid on the stems of water plants so there must be a good supply of these in the pond, particularly taller ones. Good ones to use are common water crowfoot, frogbit, amphibious bistort and water lilies.



WILDLIFE PROJECT

July is the time of roses in the garden and also when native shrub roses come into flower. These are generally less demanding than other roses and their simple flowers provide nectar for insects and hips for birds. *Rosa rugosa* makes a lovely fragrant hedge with large hips. The common native dog rose looks pretty in a mixed wildlife hedge, as does the sweet briar, which has an apple scent. All of these give an informal feel to the wildlife garden.

Playing Field Wildlife Area sees new growth

A former tip at the bottom of the playing fields on Alport Lane is enjoying a new lease of life as a mini nature reserve.

About 15 years ago, the old tip site below the Parish Council-run playing field was cleared to form a wildlife area for the village. Trees were planted in the upper part, and the lower part was seeded as a wildflower area. A dipping pond was dug out, paths were laid and seating stones were provided. Unfortunately the site was not managed and this early work not maintained, and so it became overgrown with nettles and rank grasses.

In 2003 it was decided to restore the site and advice was sought from several sources. Derbyshire Wildlife Trust referred the Parish Council to one of its volunteers, Youlgrave resident Ian Weatherley, who agreed to take on the site and that autumn it was brush-cut and raked with help from volunteers. This reduces the fertility of the ground, discouraging large weeds and grasses and favouring more delicate wild flowers.

Since then the paths have been kept clear, better grass areas with plenty of flowers have been given an annual mow and rake in late summer after seeding, and nettle and other weeds have been mown more frequently. Some areas that used to be pure nettle or ground elder are now grassy with plenty of wild flowers. A total of 28 species were in bloom in early June this year.

Up to now the amount of restoration has been limited by the tools available. Last month Youlgrave Parish Council was awarded a grant of over £2,600 from the Breathing Spaces initiative (a Big Lottery Fund programme supported by the BBC)

to buy a high quality brush-cutter, a mower and bird nesting boxes. There will also be weatherproof notice boards so that more information, including photographs, of current wildlife can be displayed. Additional tools have been bought, so that there will be plenty of opportunity to get involved. It is intended to run occasional guided visits for those who would like to increase their enjoyment and knowledge of local wildlife.

The area is not intended as a wildlife garden and at times can look rather wild. It is, however, a place of great tranquillity where wildlife can flourish and can be appreciated. It's freely accessible to stroll round, look for the birds and flowers, or just sit on a stone and enjoy it.
